



LVT EARNS PROLITERACY ACCREDITATION

The eagerly awaited news has arrived: Literacy Volunteers of the Tarrytowns has been reaccredited by ProLiteracy, the national literacy organization, for another four-year period.

"It is a pleasure to inform you that Literacy Volunteers of the Tarrytowns has been awarded ProLiteracy accreditation," wrote Peter Waite, Executive Director, and Mark Cass, Accreditation Coordinator.

"Accreditation is designed to recognize literacy organizations that are distinguished by superior professional leadership, effective programs, committed governing boards, and outstanding volunteer support. We are recognizing Literacy Volunteers of the Tarrytowns for its excellence in each of these areas. Please extend our congratulations to all of those within your organization who contributed to your success. Your students and your community are fortunate to have such a high-quality program available to them."

Marilyn Morgan, the site reviewer who met with our accreditation committee on June 30, scored LVT as acceptable in all of the 15 standards we had to meet: student recruitment, student intake, instruction, student progress, student support, student involvement, tutor/instructor recruitment, tutor/instructor intake, tutor/instructor support/supervision, training system, volunteer management, organizational planning, board responsibilities, community linkages, and fiscal management.

In her commendations, Marilyn noted that LVT was very well prepared for the site review. She remarked that while LVT is an all-volunteer organization –

the only one of its kind left in New York state – it operates at a professional level under the leadership of an extremely dedicated and well-organized Board of Directors. Her report cites LVT as a model for effective volunteer management.

In her recommendations Marilyn suggested we continue to bring in new volunteers—including board members—to keep the affiliate operating at its current high level; to consider ways to address the student waiting list; and to "keep up the good work!"

Committee members Joe Ambrose, Alice Brothers, Elisa Carrillo, Candie Frankel, and Lucille Hutchinson all took part in preparing for and attending the site review. They were joined at the review by board member Nelson Correa, who described and answered questions about LVT's new data base and web site for the reviewer.

ANNUAL AFFILIATE REPORT FILED

Statistician Nelson Correa completed and filed LVT's annual 2005-2006 ProLiteracy affiliate report in August. His summary shows that one basic literacy student was tutored for 61 hours, while 55 ESOL students were tutored for 2,177 hours. There were 66 potential students, including 56 who were on the waiting list and 10 who had been tutored for less than 12 hours. Non-tutoring volunteers gave 1,610 hours of service.

REPORT FROM NEW TUTORS

In meetings with Mary Jane Driscoll and Sharon Hart, new tutors have reported on their teaching experiences. Mary Jane reports:

Carol Tyler's student, Viviana from Chile, has lived here for six years. She knows a fair number of words but does not connect them well, and she has trouble with verbs. Carol is building lesson plans, and also using *Grammar Step by Step*. They are working on the verbs "to put," "to be," and "to have." Carol applied for and received a picture dictionary for Viviana and it has been useful.

Julie Jarosz and her daughter Kira are tutoring Raquel, 26, who came here from Peru to be with her husband. She was a nursery school teacher in Peru, and works here in housekeeping. Her goals are to speak English better (she reads it well), get a driver's license, get a car, and own a house. She has trouble pronouncing consonant combinations so Julie and Kira are helping with that. They are planning to use tape recorders in their lessons to reinforce the language they are helping Raquel to learn.

Melanie Tripp is tutoring Olga, a bright woman from Ecuador. She has lived here for seven years with her husband and her daughter plus other relatives. She wants to learn more English so that she can speak with her employers and her child's teacher. Melanie has been using *Grammar Step by Step* and making up dialogues to teach to Olga.

Betty Albertson is tutoring Carmen, from Peru. She has been here for one year and wants to learn English very

much. Betty hopes that Carmen will be able to continue but she does have transportation problems. She lives at a distance from the library and, pushing a small child in a stroller, has a very long walk to Tarrytown.

Brenda Bokenyi is tutoring Marcia, a woman in her forties from the Dominican Republic. She works in housekeeping at Phelps Hospital. She learned some accounting before she came to the U.S.A. and hopes to get a better job, perhaps in accounting. Two children are grown but she still has a little preschooler.

Brenda, who has a background in elementary education, feels that she will be a good resource for Marcia when it comes time for her to enroll her youngest child in school.

A few of the newer tutors have had problems contacting the students assigned to them. We hope the situation will improve with the launching of Best Plus.

**PROGRAMS FOR STUDENTS:
CROSSROADS CAFÉ and ON COMMON GROUND**

It was just four years ago that we wrote in our newsletter about the Crossroads Cafe program offered by the New York State Education Department and run in Westchester by Joan Uchitelle of Mount Vernon.

We have phoned Joan to ask about the program, and it is still available. There are 26 videos or DVDs and a book;

the student receives them one at a time, views them, and answers questions about them. As each video or DVD is sent back in an envelope provided, another one is sent to the student, etc. This program is for intermediate students.

There is just one change from four years ago. Students must now be tested using the Best Plus test, both before starting and at intervals. A student applying directly by calling 665-5696 would have to go to Mount Vernon to be tested.

However, our currently active students or those on the waiting list could apply to us. Joan said she could come here to test a group of three or four students. Or, we could test them and she would accept the results.

Another program, On Common Ground, has been added for advanced students. It deals with our government, the Constitution, individual rights, freedom of the press, the judicial system, etc. The State requires Best Plus testing as with Crossroads Café.

Joan reassured us that a student could be enrolled in LVT and in Crossroads Café or On Common Ground at the same time.

Crossroads Cafe might be a good program for someone on our waiting list, someone who had lost a tutor, or a student who wanted extra practice. On Common Ground might be a good solution for someone too advanced for our program.
