The fruit of the Spirit abides in us and it is up to us to cultivate it so that we may experience the blessing and the full-ness of the Spirit. God is the husbandman..."He prunes, nurtures, waters and protects His own. The indwelling presence of the Holy Spirit will energize and control every faculty of our nature when our will joins the will of God. Then the "beauty of the Lord will be upon us" (Psalm 90:17) and "we shall bring forth fruit unto God" (Romans 7:4)."

#### THE FRUIT OF THE SPIRIT: LOVE

One definition for Love can be found in 1 Corinthians 13. Read this chapter every day for a deeper understanding. Other scriptures are found in John 3:16; Romans 5:5-8; Jeremiah 31:3; Ephesians 4:2, 3; Romans 12:9, 10, to name a few.

"If I had the gift of being able to speak in other languages without learning them, and could speak in every language there is in all of heaven and in earth, but didn't love others, I would only be making noise. If I had the gift of prophecy and knew all about what is going to happen in the future, knew everything about everything, but didn't love others, what good would it do? Even if I had the gift of faith so that I could speak to a mountain and make it move, I would still be worth nothing at all without love. If I gave everything I have to the poor people, and if I were burned alive for preaching the Gospel but didn't love others, it would be of no valve whatever. Love is very patient and kind, never jealous or envious, never boastful or proud, never haughty or selfish or rude. Love does not demand its own way. It is not irritable or touchy. It does not hold grudges and will hardly even notice when others do it wrong. It is never glad about injustice, but rejoices whenever truth wins out. If you love someone you will be loyal to him no matter what the cost. You will always believe in him, always expect the best of him and always stand your ground in defending him. All special gifts and

powers from God will someday come to an end, but love goes on forever. There are three things that remain faith, hope, and love and the greatest of these is love." (1 Corinthians 13:1-8, 13) The Living Bible.

Some signs that will help you recognize LOVE in action and will help you begin to cultivate the Fruit of LOVE in yourself: showing concern for others, obeying God's commandments, saving kind words, helping someone with their homework, obeying parents, being patient, being loyal to a friend or to your faith not irritated easily, not envious, not boastful, reading to a small child, visiting the convalescent homes, visiting the sick and shut-ins, sending cards to the sick and shut-ins, hello by serving meals, forgiving someone, doing good deeds, encouraging others, helping an elderly person, being unselfish and sharing with others, being happy when the truth is revealed, letting others get the praise, not rude, not jealous, not proud, reading to an elderly person, visiting the prisons, calling the sick and shut-ins, going on errands cheerfully, helping someone understand God's word. The list can go on. Use your own good judgment and the words found in scriptures to help you identify other deeds of LOVE.

Catch someone showing LOVE this month and let someone catch you being LOVING!!!!

#### THE FRUIT OF THE SPIRIT: JOY

JOY is the fruit of the Holy Spirit. It has its beginnings in God and is produced by Faith. It is based on the reality of God and His promises. JOY is not to be confused with happiness which is dependent upon favorable circumstances to sustain it.

The source of JOY must be the Lord. We are to share in the JOY of Christ by a daily walk with Him and a daily practice of rejoicing in the knowledge of Him and His salvation. Unlike worldly happiness, JOY often comes after great affliction and sufferings. JOY is the feeling Jesus had when he suffered for mankind. look for JOY in

   persons who are "happy in the Lord"
- persons who get excited when they talk about the things of God • persons who are looking forward to being with the Lord and sharing eternal JOY
- persons who love sharing the Gospel and



Amen. <sup>11</sup> rain of your Spirit upon earth, O God.

It excites me to anticipate the day when you will pour out your Spirit upon all flesh. Thank you for that stirring promise, Father. I believe is imminent, and when it

happens, the young men and women will prophesy, old men will dream dreams, and young men will see visions. 6 You, Lord God, will make bare your holy arm for all the world to see, and all the ends of the earth will see your salvation. <sup>7</sup> I seek your promised revival, Lord.

When the revival fires you promise are ignited, Father, you will do a new thing in our midst. You will make a way in the wilderness, and rivers in the desert.8 Thank you, Lord God. You will decree your judgment upon the people of the earth. 5

#### **EXALT!**

**Declaration:** 1 Corinthians 11:23-34

<sup>23</sup> For I received from the Lord what I also handed on to you, that the Lord Jesus on the night when he was betrayed took a loaf of bread, <sup>24</sup> and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, "This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me." <sup>25</sup> In the same way he took the cup also, after supper, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, remembrance of me." <sup>26</sup> For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the

Lord's death until he comes.

<sup>27</sup> Whoever therefore, eats the bread or drinks the cup of the Lord in an unworthy manner will be answerable for the body and blood of the Lord. <sup>28</sup> Examine yourselves, and only then eat of the bread and drink of the cup. <sup>29</sup> for all who eat and drink without discerning the body, eat and drink judgement against themselves. 30 For this reason many of you are weak and ill, and some have died. 31 But if we judged ourselves, we would not be judged. <sup>32</sup> But when we are judged by the Lord, we are disciplined so that we may not be condemned along with the world.

<sup>33</sup> So then, my brothers and sisters, when you come together to eat, wait for one another. <sup>34</sup> If you are hungry, eat at home, so that when you come together, it will not be for your condemnation. About the other things I will give instructions.

#### **ENGAGE**

What were some the rules relating to meals that your family had when you were growing up? Did your meals begin with saying grace? Did the meal only start when everyone was seated at the table? Did people have specified seats in which they sat? Did some members of the family get larger portions than other members of the family? Did some members of the family get seconds before other members of the family?

It would be safe to assume that the rules relating to meals that your family had did not make you uncomfortable. However, did you

ever have an occasion to eat at the table of another friends or family member? Did any of their rules make you feel uncomfortable? Such as men eat before women? It being acceptable to drink alcohol as a part of the meal? People being permitted to eat at the table without shirts on?

Discuss the following: With what rules relating to the Lord's Supper, in your local church, are the members of your church comfortable, but which might make an unchurched visitor uncomfortable or a visitor from a different Christian tradition?


#### **EDUCATE**

The Scripture passage for today's lesson is one that allows us to view the development of one of the early churches. Like many others, this small budding community in Corinth experienced "growing pains" due to its diverse body of believers. The Apostle Paul wrote the Corinthian epistles to address a variety of theological, sociological, political, economic, and cultural issues impacting that church community. Of particular concern to the Corinthian church was the issue of disagreements among congregants during the Lord's Supper.

This early church was comprised of a mixture of people from a variety of backgrounds, which resulted in different classes forming a community of faith. Beginning in verse 17, we read about the aggressive and inappropriate behaviors of some church

## **Ephesians 6:10-20 (New King James Version)**

## Advent (December 3 - 24)

Benjamin Oliver Davis Sr. (1880 – November 26, 1970) was a United States Army officer. He was the first African-American to rise to the rank of general in the U.S. military. He was the father of Air Force General Benjamin O. Davis Jr.

#### Early life and education

Davis was born in Washington, D.C., the third child of Louis P. H. Davis and Henrietta (née Stewart) Davis. Biographer Marvin Fletcher has presented evidence that Davis was born in May 1880, citing a June 1880 census document. Fletcher concludes that Davis lied about his age so that he could enlist in the army without the permission of his parents. The birth date that appears on Davis's gravestone at Arlington National Cemetery is July 1, 1877, the date he provided to the army.

Davis attended M Street High School in Washington, where he participated in the school's cadet program. During his senior year of high school he took some classes at Howard University. His father, a messenger for the Interior Department, and his mother, a nurse, urged him to enroll in college after high school. Against his parents' wishes he determined to take a military career.

#### Career

After graduating from high school, in response to the start of the Spanish-American War, Davis entered the military service on July 13, 1898, as a temporary first lieutenant in the 8th United States Volunteer Infantry, an all-black unit. This regiment was stationed at Chickamauga Park, Georgia, from October 1898 until the unit was disbanded in March 1899. During the war, Davis briefly served in Company D, 1st Separate Battalion of the Washington D.C. National Guard.

Davis was mustered out on March 6. 1899, and on June 18, 1899, he enlisted as a private in Troop I, 9th Cavalry Regiment (one of the original Buffalo Soldier regiments), of the Regular Army. At his post in Fort Duchesne, Utah, he served first as

the troop's clerk and later as squadron sergeant major through 1900. In late 1900, Davis's unit was commanded by Lieutenant Charles Young, the only African-American officer serving in the US military at that time. Young encouraged Davis's ambition to become an officer. Young tutored Davis in all of the subjects that University, Alabama, as the professor were covered in the officer candidate test, especially mathematics, which had been Young's most difficult subject at the United States Military Academy at West Point. In early 1901 Davis passed the test at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, his highest score coming in the math section. (A second African American, John E. Green, passed the test along with 10 other soldiers.) On February 2, 1901, Davis was commissioned a second lieutenant of Cavalry in the Regular Army.

In the spring of 1901, Troop I was posted overseas to serve in the Philippine-American War. In August 1901, Davis was assigned to Troop F, 10th Cavalry, where he assumed the duties of a second lieutenant. Troop F returned to the US in August 1902. Davis was then stationed at Fort Washakie, Wyoming, where he also served for several months with Troop M. In September 1905, he was assigned to Wilberforce University in Ohio as Professor of Military Science and Tactics, a post that he filled for four years.

In November 1909, shortly after being ordered to Regimental Headquarters, 9th Cavalry, Davis was reassigned for duty to Liberia. He left the United States for Liberia in April 1910, and served as a military attaché reporting on Liberia's military forces until October 1911. He returned to the United States in November 1911. In January 1912, Davis was assigned to Troop I, 9th Cavalry, stationed at Fort D. A. Russell, Wyoming. In 1913, the 9th Cavalry was assigned to patrol the Mexican-United States border. In February 1915, Davis was again assigned to Wilberforce University as Professor of Military Science and Tactics. From 1917 to 1920, Davis was assigned to the 9th Cavalry at Fort Stotsenburg, Philippine Islands,

as supply officer, commander of 3rd Squadron, and then of 1st Squadron. He reached the temporary rank of lieutenant colonel, but returned to the United States in March 1920 with the rank of captain.

Davis was assigned to the Tuskegee of military science and tactics from 1920 to 1924. He then served for five years as an instructor with 2nd Battalion, 372nd Regiment, Ohio National Guard, in Cleveland, Ohio. In September 1929, Davis returned to Wilberforce University as professor of military science and tactics. He was assigned to the Tuskegee Institute in the early part of 1931, and remained there for six years as professor of military science and tactics. During the summer months of 1930 to 1933, Davis escorted pilgrimages of World War I Gold Star mothers and widows to the burial places of their loved ones in Europe.

In August 1937, Davis returned to Wilberforce University as professor of military science and tactics. Davis was assigned to the 369th Regiment, New York National Guard, during the summer of 1938, and took command of the regiment a short time later. Davis was promoted to brigadier general on October 25, 1940, becoming the first African-American general in the United States Army.

#### World War II

Davis became commanding general of 4th Brigade, 2nd Cavalry Division at Fort Riley, Kansas, in January 1941. About six months later, he was assigned to Washington, D.C. as an assistant in the Office of the Inspector General. While serving in the Office of the Inspector General, Davis also served on the Advisory Committee on Negro Troop Policies. From 1941 to 1944, Davis conducted inspection tours of African-American soldiers in the United States Army. From September to November 1942 and again from July to November 1944, Davis made inspection tours of African-American soldiers stationed in Europe.

On November 10, 1944, Davis was reassigned to work under Lieutenant General John C. H. Lee as special assistant to the commanding general, Communications Zone, European Theater of Operations. He served with the General Inspectorate Section, European Theater of Operation (later the Office of the Inspector General on Europe) from January through May 1945. While serving in the European Theater of Operations, Davis was influential in the proposed policy of integration using replacement units.

#### Later life and death

After serving in the European Theater of Operations for more than a year, Davis returned to Washington, D.C. as Private – June 18, 1899 assistant to the inspector general. In 1947 he was assigned as a special assistant to the Secretary of the Army. In this capacity, he was sent to Liberia in July 1947 as a representative of the United States for the African country's centennial celebration. On July 20, 1948, after fifty years of military service, Davis retired in a public ceremony with President Harry S. Truman presiding. 6 days later on July 26, 1948, President Truman issued executive order 9981 which abolished racial discrimination in the armed forces.

From July 1953 through June 1961, he served as a member of the American Battle Monuments Commission. Davis died on November Decorations and honors 26, 1970, at Great Lakes Naval Hospital in Chicago, Illinois, and was buried at Arlington National Cemetery.

#### Legacy

In 1997, the U.S. Postal Service issued a 32-cent stamp honoring Davis.

#### Personal life

Davis married Elnora Dickerson in 1902—the two had known each other as neighbors for many years. Their first child was born in 1905, daughter Olive Davis. A son was born in 1912. Benjamin O. Davis Jr. In early 1916, a second daughter was born, but Davis's wife died a few days later from complications of childbirth. The

daughter, Elnora Davis, was named for her. Without a mother for the children, Davis relied upon the grandparents in Washington, D.C. for childcare while he was serving a tour of duty in the Philippines. In 1919 Davis married Sarah "Sadie" Overton, an English teacher at Wilberforce University. They were married for 47 years, the partnership ending at Sadie's death on October 25, 1966.

Davis's son became the first black general officer of the United States Air Force in October 1954.

General Davis' U.S. military decorations included the Distinguished Service Medal (DSM) and Bronze Star. His DSM medal, awarded by General Order 10, dated February 22, 1945, stated that Benjamin O. Davis was awarded the DSM "for exceptionally meritorious service to the Government in a duty of great responsibility from June 1941 to November 1944." The War Department release issued about General Davis' DSM on February 11, 1945, included the following citation:

For exceptionally meritorious service to the Government in a duty of great responsibility from June, 1941, to November, 1944, as an Inspector of troop units in the field, and as special War Department consultant on matters pertaining to Negro troops. The initiative, intelligence and sympathetic understanding displayed by him in conducting countless investigations concerning individual soldiers, troop units, and components of the War Department brought about a fair and equitable solution to many important problems which have since become the basis of farreaching War Department policy. His wise advice and counsel have made a direct contribution to the maintenance of soldier morale and troop discipline and has been of material assistance to the War Department and to responsible commanders in the field of understanding personnel matters as they pertain to the individual soldier.

Additionally, Davis was awarded an Honorary Degree of LL.D. from Atlanta University, Atlanta, Georgia. His foreign awards and honors include of the Croix de Guerre with Palm from France and the Grade of Commander of the Order of the Star of Africa from Liberia.

members. Since there were no church buildings, one of the wealthy church members hosted the gathering. Following the Greco-Roman tradition at meals, attendees received their meal by their class status. The "Best" wine, bread, and meat was served as designated by the host and the remaining food was served later to the "lesser" classes. The mixture of people from all segments of society - free, slave, laborer, merchants, farmers, shepherds, etc. - resulted in frustrations from the differing treatment the distinct classes received. In verses 20-21, upon hearing of the concerns, Paul writes the church members to address this cultural and social tradition impacting the church. He also addresses the accepted practice in the wealthy or leisure class of gluttony and drinking until intoxicated. Selected individual could eat all they wanted, while others may not have been served at all.

Addressing the division among the congregants, Paul explains the functions in this manner: "For there must be functions among you, that those who are approved may be recognized among you" (11:19, NKJV). Put another way, "It is necessary to have differences among you so that it is clear which of you have God's approval" (NCV). The Corinthians church is admonished so that they will remember that the purpose of the Lord's Supper is to focus on the Lord. Paul's admonitions also remind us of the importance of Communion within the Kingdom of God. Through Communion, we remember both the old covenant, as well as the new covenant, as well as the new covenant written in Jesus' blood.

Further, in verses 23-24, Paul gives a full explanation of the holy ritual, stating the words that Jesus gave to His disciples: "This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me." The chapter concludes with the reminder that when we participate in the Lord's Supper - eating the bread and drinking the cup - we are telling others about the Lord's death until He comes. In his correction of the church

at Corinth, Paul helped refocus the group on Christ. Then, as a body, the Corinthian church united around the New Covenant promise to "do this in remembrance" of our Lord.

Paul expected beneficiaries of the new covenant to participate in the Lord's Supper in a way that was consistent with the tenets of the Christian faith. It is for this reason that Paul used the phrase, "in an unworthy manner" (11:27) to explain how a person who does not explain their own conduct, will be guilty of "damnation to Paul encourages every believer to your soul" or "sinning against your body." Paul suggests that many have grown weak and sick, and others have died for this reason. Although unstated, it is implied, that if one properly takes the Lord's Supper, there are blessings for the believer.

At the close of the chapter, the Apostle Paul reminds the people that the Lord's Supper is about keeping the promise to "do this in remembrance of me." the Corinthians understood that to honor the process, they must leave customary behaviors to their home events. For the church, the sacred communal sharing of the bread, (Christ body) and of the wine, (His blood), are an equalizing and humbling experience for all participants.

#### **ELEVATE**

The first-century church at Corinth was challenged by what eventually made the epistle written to them great. Paul's letter is full of wise counsel and thoughtful instruction that continues to be meaningful today. For instance, the melding of all different kinds of people is a characteristic of the church. When we begin to think of our congregation as the body of Christ, we are united as believers to think of each other in a familial manner. "This is my brother, my sister, my elder and these are my children." The emotional VERSE OF THE WEEK: and spiritual bond that is created is an important part of church membership. This bonding requires spiritual growth and a commitment to becoming a new covenant church family. In the Corinthian church, the influences of a culturally-accepted tradition were an obstacle to melding the varied factions within the church.

The type of spiritual growth necessary to become a church family, requires individual self-examination. Have I left "old traditions and customs" behind? What happens in your church when someone new visits or joins the choir? Are there obstacles that stop that person from becoming a fully, equally, and accepted member of your congregation? Are there traditions that are interfering with the growth of your church family?

think carefully before participating in the Lord's Supper. We are still charged to avoid coming to the Lord's Supper in an "unworthy manner." if we come instead with a humble heart, a contrite spirit, and an eye focused on Jesus before coming to the Communion Table, then we too will be blessed!

#### I THINK:

Consider these three areas that were the focus of this week's Scripture. Church member soften have concerns with other members of the body of Christ, even though we are all beneficiaries of the new covenant.

- How should we resolve disagreements in the church? How can we honor God when church membership is challenging?
- 2. As believers, we are required to make and keep promises. However, many people make promises and then won't do their part. Are there steps we should take to address the concerns in a godly manner?
- 3. What kinds of preparation do you make as you prepare for the Lord's Supper? How does Communion support your growth as a Christian?



Wednesday, November 15 - Friday November 17 See page 15 (Sacred from page 1) sanctified the 7" day of the week, Saturday as the Sabbath, and declared it holy unto you. (Genesis 2:2; Exodus 20:8-11). God did not make a gentle suggestion for His people, the Israelites to rest from their own labors; instead, He mandated it.

## The Sabbath Has Two Purposes:

- 1. The Sabbath is a day commanded the Jews to rest from their own secular labors.
- 2. It is the 7<sup>th</sup> day of each week set aside to remember all that God has done for His people and to worship and praise Him for it.

The Omnipotent, Omniscient, and Omnipresent God set aside a day out of each week for his people and sanctified it as holv. He knew humankind needed a day out of each week to relinquish our hurried, bustled lives of rushing and hustling. Therefore, He mandated this day for praise, worship, and thanksgiving to Him, so He could refresh and renew our spirits. Only God can make us holy, because He is holy and He said in His Word:" Be ye holy as I am holy." Later in Old Testament times, the Jewish elders added their traditions to and Leviticus 19:9-10 prevented the simple Sabbath Law; so much so, that the law became burdensome and even foolish for the people. Then, in the New Testament, Jesus came teaching against the Jewish elders and leader's traditions, but not against and for the poor among the people. God's established Sabbath Law.

"New- moons" and "Sabbaths" refer to monthly offerings (Numbers 28:11-4) and weekly and special annual Sabbaths on the Day of Atonement and Feast of Tabernacles Leviticus 16:31; 23, 34, and 39).

The people worshipped but did not feel sorry for their sins; so they continued offering sacrifices for forgiveness. But gifts and sacrifices mean nothing to God, when they come from someone with a corrupt heart.

Sacrifices were to be an outward sign of their inward faith in God. Many people today are like the Israelites of old, who placed more importance on the rituals of their religion than on the God they worshipped.

Now, to answer the question asked in the lesson topic, Why Is **Sunday Sacred?** 

After the ascension of Jesus Christ, His disciples met on the ascension of Jesus Christ, his disciples met on the first day of each week for rest, praise and worship. The Jews celebrated both Sabbaths for awhile, but the Gentile Christians having never kept any such day before, celebrated only Sunday, the first day of the week was the day the New 'Testament Christians observed as the day Christ arose. When you're going to have a baby, it's like planning a fabulous trip - to Italy. You buy a bunch of guidebooks and make your wonderful plans. The Coliseum, The Michelangelo David. The gondolas in Venice. You may learn some handy phrases in Italian. It's all very, very exciting.

After months of eager anticipation, the day finally arrives. You pack your bags and off you go. Several hours later the plane lands. The flight attendant comes in and says, 'Welcome to Holland."

"Holland?!?" you say, 'What do you mean Holland? I signed up for Italy. I'm supposed to be in Italy! All my life I've dreamed of going to Italy."

But there's a change in the flight plan. They landed in Holland and you must stay.

The important thing is that they haven't taken you to a horrible, disgusting, filthy place, full of pestilence, famine and disease. It's just a different place.

So you must go out and buy new guidebooks. And you must learn a whole new language. And you will meet a whole new group of people you would never have met.

It's just a different place. It's slower-paced than Italy, less flashy than Italy. But after you've been there awhile and catch your breath, you begin to look around, and you begin to notice that Holland has windmills. Holland has tulips. Holland even has Rembrandts.

But everyone you know is busy coming and going from Italy, and they're bragging about what a wonderful time they had there. And for the rest of your life you will say, "Yes, that's where I was supposed to go. That's what I had planned."

And the pain will never, ever go away, because the loss of that dream is a very significant loss. But if you spend your life mourning the fact you didn't go to Italy, you may never be free to enjoy the very special, the very lovely things about Holland.
