

### Sunday Reflection: Thirty-third Sunday in Ordinary Time

How would we respond if someone prophesied that our home, land, or place of worship would be destroyed? To the great consternation of the Jews, Jesus prophesied the destruction of their great temple at Jerusalem (Luke:21:5-19). The Jewish people took great pride in their temple, a marvel of the ancient world. The foretelling of this destruction was a dire warning of spiritual judgment in itself. They asked Jesus for a sign that would indicate

when this disastrous event would occur. Jesus admonished them to not look for signs that would indicate the exact timing of impending destruction, but rather to pray for God's intervention of grace and mercy.

Jesus' prophecy of the destruction of the temple at Jerusalem was a two-edged sword, because it pointed not only to God's judgment, but also to his saving action and mercy. Jesus foretold the destruction of Jerusalem and the dire consequences for all who would reject him and his saving message. While the destruction of Jerusalem's temple was determined (it was razed by the Romans in 70 A.D.), there remained for its inhabitants a narrow open door leading to deliverance. Jesus said: "I am the door; whoever enters by me will be saved" (John 10:9). Jesus willingly set his face toward Jerusalem, knowing that he would meet betrayal, rejection, and death on a cross. His death on the cross, however, brought about true freedom, peace, and victory over the powers of sin, evil, and death - not only for the inhabitants of Jerusalem, but for all - both Jew and Gentile alike - who would accept Jesus as their Lord and Savior. Do we really know the peace and security of a life submitted to the lordship of Jesus Christ?

# Saint of the Week ... St. Elizabeth of Hungary

Elizabeth was born in 1207 to King Andrew II of Hungary and Gertrude of Merania. While a life of luxury could easily have been hers, Elizabeth instead chose a life of penance which endeared her in the hearts of the common people throughout Europe. When she was just 6 years old, Elizabeth's mother was murdered. This caused the young girl's perspective on life to change and she sought peace with prayer.

At the age of 14, Elizabeth was married to Louis of Thuringia, whom she deeply loved. Together they had three children. Under the spiritual direction of a Franciscan friar, she led a life of prayer, sacrifice, and service to the poor and sick. Seeking to become one with the poor, she wore simple clothing. After six years of marriage, her husband died in the Crusades, and Elizabeth was grief-stricken. She vowed to never remarry and to live a life similar to a nun.

In 1228, Elizabeth joined the Secular Franciscan Order, spending the remaining few years of her life caring for the poor in a hospital which she founded in honor of Saint Francis of Assisi. Elizabeth's health declined, and she died before her 24th birthday in 1231.

One of her greatest known miracles occurred when she was still alive: the miracle of roses. It is said that during one of her trips delivering bread to the poor in secret, Louis met with her and asked her questions to erase everyone's suspicions that she was stealing treasures from the castle. He asked her to reveal the contents under her cloak, and as she did a vision of white and red roses was seen. St. Elizabeth was canonized in 1235. She is the patron saint of Catholic Charities, bakers, beggars, brides, homeless people and widows.


