Sunday Reflection: The Most Holy Trinity

Jesus made a claim which only God can make - he knows all things - the present and the past, as well as the future. Jesus not only claims to speak the truth, he calls himself the very source of truth when he proclaims that he is the way, the truth and the life (John 14:6). Now Jesus promises to send his disciples the Spirit of truth who will guide them in understanding all that Jesus came to say and do! Jesus tells his disciples that it is the role of the Holy Spirit

1 Corinthians 11:23-26 Luke 9:11b-17

to reveal what is true. It is through the gift and working of the Holy Spirit, who enlightens our hearts and minds, that we come to understand that the Godhead is a Trinity of persons - Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Jesus reveals the true nature of God the Father in an unheard-of sense. He is eternally Father by his relationship to his eternal and only-begotten Son, who, reciprocally, is Son only in relation to his Father (Matthew 11:27). The Spirit, likewise, is inseparably one with the Father and the Son. Jesus reveals the triune nature of God and the inseparable union of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

The mission of Jesus and of the Holy Spirit are the same - to reveal the glory of God and to share that glory with us by uniting us in a community of love with the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. That is why Jesus tells his disciples that the Spirit will reveal the glory of the Father and the Son and will speak what is true. The ultimate end, the purpose for which God created us, is the entry of God's creatures into the perfect unity of the blessed Trinity. In baptism we are called to share in the life of the Holy Trinity here on earth in faith, and after death in eternal light. It is the Holy Spirit who reveals the Father and the Son to us and who gives us the gift of faith to know and understand the truth of God's word. The Lord Jesus gives us his Holy Spirit as our divine Teacher and Helper that we may grow in the knowledge and wisdom of God. Do we seek the wisdom that comes from above and do we eagerly listen to God's word and obey it?

Saint of the Week ... St. Aloysius Gonzaga

Aloysius Gonzaga grew up in royal courts and army camps; his father wanted him to be a military hero. At age 7 Aloysius experienced a profound spiritual quickening. At age 9 he left his hometown for Florence to be educated, and by age 11 was teaching catechism to poor children and fasting three days a week. When he was 13, he traveled with his parents and the Empress of Austria to Spain, and acted as a page in the court of Philip II. The more Aloysius saw of court life, the more disillusioned he became, seeking relief in learning about the lives of saints.

A book about the experience of Jesuit missionaries in India suggested to him the idea of entering the Society of Jesus, and in Spain his decision became final. He then began a four-year contest with his father. Eminent churchmen and laypeople were pressed into service to persuade Aloysius to remain in his "normal" vocation. Finally he prevailed, was allowed to renounce his right to succession, and was received into the Jesuit novitiate.



Feast Day: June 21

In 1591, a plague struck Rome. The Jesuits opened a hospital of their own. The superior general himself and many other Jesuits rendered personal service. Because he nursed patients, washing them and making their beds, Aloysius caught the disease. A fever persisted after his recovery and he was so weak he could scarcely rise from bed. Yet he maintained his great discipline of prayer, and died three months later at the age of 23. Aloysius is the patron saint of Catholic youth, teenagers and seminarians.

History of Father's Day

Most West Virginians know that Mother's Day originated in our great state. But did you know that Father's Day got its start here too?

The first known Father's Day service was held in Fairmont on July 5, 1908 after hundreds of men died in the worst coal mining accident in U.S. history. The service honored all fathers, especially those who had perished in the mining event.

The following year all the way across the country, Sonora Smart Dodd, then age 27, of Spokane, Washington proposed the idea of an annual day honoring fathers. She was inspired at a Mother's Day service because her own father had raised his six children as a single parent after her mother died in childbirth.

She appealed to the Spokane Ministerial Association to set aside a Sunday in June to celebrate fathers. She proposed June 5, her father's birthday, but the ministers chose the third Sunday in June

so they would have more time after Mother's Day to prepare their sermons.

The first official Father's Day event was held the following year, and quickly spread to other parts of the country.

In 1913 the first bill to establish Father's Day as a national holiday was introduced in Congress but it did not pass, despite encouragement from President Woodrow Wilson.

In 1921 President Calvin Coolidge signed a resolution in favor of Father's Day to "establish better relations between fathers and their children and to impress upon fathers the full measure of their obligations."

In 1966, President Lyndon Johnson signed an executive order for the holiday to be celebrated annually on the third Sunday in June.

In 1972 Congress passed an act officially making Father's Day a national holiday.

Sonora Smart Dodd passed away six years later at the age of 96.
