

Grace & Peace : From the Pastor's Desk

Boundaries, not the kind you put a fence around, or measure the distance from to build on property, but boundaries that are personal rules you set in place to make sure that no one takes advantage of you, hurts or harms you, or treats you with disrespect. An example of setting a boundary includes saying no to someone, cutting someone off in your life and just loving them from a distance, and walking away from a situation that may require you to abandon your faith or change the beliefs that you have. It can be difficult for a Christian to keep boundaries because we think we are being, well, unchristian when we do. However, there are Christian

boundaries that are meant to be kept. God set boundaries with Adam and Eve, who did not keep them and lost more than they ever imagined they could lose. Jesus set boundaries with his disciples. When he sent them into the world to preach the gospel and heal Jesus told his disciples. "If anyone will not welcome you or listen to your words, shake off the dust from your feet as you leave that house or town."

As God set up a boundary for Adam and Eve for a reason, God sets up boundaries in our lives for a reason, too, and if we break them, then there will be consequences. God knows what is best for us, and what could hurt us. When God sets up boundaries in your life, OBEY them. Trust in God. Believe that God is doing good in your life and is protecting you.

As you probably already know, we are in a constant state of spiritual warfare (Ephesians 6). The devil is doing all he can to distract us, tempt us, and drag us away from our faith and our purpose in life. We need to make sure that we are solely focusing on God alone, and God's will for our lives.

Self-control is essential to protect yourself from yourself. We are constantly at war with the desires of the flesh. Setting up boundaries for yourself will help to win spiritual battles. First, don't allow negative thoughts about yourself take over, you are precious and valuable to God. When your focus is on God those negative thoughts will disappear. To do this, pray daily, if not several times a day. Keeping in contact with God will help you to give God all your negativity, fears, and anxiety. Another part of self-control is saying "No", and not allowing others to pressure you into making bad choices or not allow your opinion to be heard.

When a person is disrespecting you, you can ask them "What exactly were you hoping to gain by saying that?" Or, "Sorry, what was that? I want to make sure I understand you completely." Or you can smile, say, "Thank you" and just walk away. Sometimes grace wins the day.

There will be moments in your life where you may need to correct others, especially Christians. There will also be times where you will need to speak the truth to others, regardless of their beliefs. God tells us to speak the truth in love. We shouldn't lie to others, especially if it puts them in some sort of danger. Let the Hely Spirit guide you on what to gay and how to gay it. "but speaking the truth in love, we


danger. Let the Holy Spirit guide you on what to say and how to say it. "but speaking the truth in love, we must grow up in every way into him who is the head, into Christ," (Eph. 4:15). It is okay for us, as Christians, to be friends with non-believers – I have many friends who are not Christian. However, we cannot let the friendship change our faith.

Setting up Biblical boundaries are important for many different areas of your life. They help you stay close to God, protect yourself from bad people entering your life, teach you self-control and self-respect, and to speak open and honestly with others in love.







BBQ-Glazed Hot Dogs

with Spicy Slaw

Get out the grill and give this recipe a try!!!

Brushing the dogs with barbecue sauce during grilling imparts a sweet, caramelized smokiness that pairs beautifully with a colorful tangle of jalapeño-spiked coleslaw heaped on top. A summer classic, upgraded!

Ingredients

•	3 tbs. mayonnaise	2 tsp whole-grain mustard
•	3 tbsp. pickled jalapenos (finely chopped)	1 1/2 tsp. of jalapeno juice
•	2 tbsp. + 2 tsp. BBQ sauce (divided)	2 1/2 cups thinly sliced red cabbage
•	2 1/2 cups thinly sliced green cabbage	1 medium coarsely grated carrot
•	2 thinly slice scallion	4 hot dogs & 4 hot dog buns

Directions

Step 1Heat grill to medium.

Step 2In large bowl, whisk together mayonnaise, mustard, pickling liquid, and 2 teaspoons barbecue sauce. Add cabbages, carrot, scallions, and jalapeños; toss to combine.

Step 3Using paring knife, make 3 diagonal slits across top of each hot dog, then 3 more in opposite direction, to create diamond pattern. Grill, rotating and glazing with remaining 2 tablespoons barbecue sauce, until charred, 3 to 5 minutes.

Step 4Transfer to plate and glaze with any remaining barbecue sauce. Serve each in bun, topped with 1/4 cup slaw and remaining slaw on side.

Why did Jesus fold the napkin?

Why did Jesus fold the linen burial cloth after His resurrection?

The Gospel of John (20:7) tells us that the napkin, which was placed over the face of Jesus was not just thrown aside like the grave clothes. The Bible takes an entire verse to tell us that the napkin was neatly folded, and was placed

The Bible takes an entire verse to tell us that the napkin was neatly folded, and was placed at the head of that stony coffin.

Early Sunday morning, while it was still dark. Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and found that the stone had been rolled away from the entrance. She ran and found Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved. She said, "they have taken the Lord's body out of the tomb, and I don't know where they have put him!"

Peter and the other disciple ran to the tome to see. The other disciple out ran Peter and got there first. He stopped and look in and saw the linen cloth lying there, but he didn't go in.

Then Simon Peter arrived and went inside. He also noticed the linen wrappings lying there, while the cloth that covered Jesus' head was folded up and lying to the side.

Was that important? Absolutely! Is it really significant? Yes! In order to understand the significance of the folded napkin, you have to understand a little bit about Hebrew tradition of that day.

The folded napkin had to do with the Master and Servant, and every Jewish boy knew this tradition. When the servant set the dinner table for the master, he made sure that it was exactly the way the master wanted it. The table was furnished perfectly, and then the servant would wait, just out of sight, until the master had finished eating, and the servant would not dare touch that table, until the master was finished.

Now if the master were done eating, he would rise from the table, wipe his finger, his mouth and clean his beard, he would wad up that napkin and toss it onto the table. The servant would then know to clear the table. For n those days, the wadded napkin meant, "I'm finished."

But, if the master got up from the table, and folded his napkin, and laid it beside his plate, the servant would not dare touch the table, because.....

The folded napkin meant, "I'm coming back!"

Summer's heat can be dangerous for your family pets. Follow these steps to take to help ensure your pet stays safe this summer.

Summer and Pets

- Don't leave your pet in a hot vehicle, even for a few minutes. The inside temperature of the car can quickly reach 120 degrees even with the windows cracked open.
- Animals can suffer heat stroke, a common problem for pets in the warmer weather. Dogs with short noses or snouts, like the boxer or bulldog, are especially prone to heat stroke, along with overweight pets, those with extremely thick fur coat or any pet with upper respiratory problems such as laryngeal paralysis or collapsing trachea.
- Some of the signs of heat stroke in your pet are heavy panting, being unable to calm down, even when lying down, brick red gum color, fast pulse rate and being unable to get up.

If you suspect your pet has heat stroke, take their temperature rectally. If the temperature is above 105 degrees, cool the animal down. The easiest way to do this is by using the water hose. Stop cooling the animal when the temperature reaches 103 degrees

Bring your pet to the veterinarian as soon as possible as heat stroke can lead to severe organ dysfunction and damage. Download the Red Cross <u>Pet First Aid app</u> for instant access on how to treat heat stroke, other emergencies and general care for cats and dogs and take the Cat and Dog First Aid Online Training course.

Lake Erie Still Struggles

Northwestern Pennsylvania includes approximately seventy-five miles of Lake Erie shoreline and tributaries. Modern day problems now unfolding hinder Lake Erie from achieving its potential as a part of God's creation. Since God's creation of Lake Erie through glacial action, it has provided habitat for animals, plants, and humans. Excessive industrial development in the lake's watershed during the 19th and 20th centuries became one of the key sparks that led to the National Environmental Protection Act of 1972. NEPA funding stimulated enforcement and research that led to tremendous improvements in Lake Erie waters in the last years of the 20th century. While Lake Erie has improved in many respects, threats still exist and are increasing daily. Growth in the human population near the lake, new chemicals and plastics introduced by humans, climate changes and reductions in research and protection have created a threat in the 21st century.

A November 13,2024 PA Department of Environment Protection (DEP) press release announced grants for the improvement of Pennsylvania's Lake Erie "coastal zone." These grants to several regional organizations support Lake Erie research, protection, and restoration. The federal National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) is the source of funding for these grants. An April 11,2025 report by CBS news describes vast impending budget cuts at NOAA. If these cuts continue, they could have great negative consequences for Lake Erie. (https://www.cbsnews.com/news/noaa-budget-cut-climate-research-draft-proposal/) Part of the NOAA budget addresses climate change matters. Reduction in attention to climate change can only create more stress on the fragile ecosystem of Lake Erie. In addition, planned cuts in the EPA budget and staff for air pollution research and enforcement of water regulation will threaten Lake Erie, among many other locations. (https://www.epa.gov/newsreleases/epa-launches-biggest-deregulatory -action-us-history)

Clearly the struggles of Lake Erie continue. However, we can take comfort in knowing that protection of Lake Erie is not completely reliant on governmental research and enforcement. Individuals and small groups can still take local actions to protect Lake Erie. We can reduce plastic use, waste of all sorts, pick up litter, do educational work in the community and contact government officials. That local effort, however, cannot completely replace the research and other far-reaching work that NOAA, EPA, and other agencies support. The preservation of Lake Erie requires collaborative efforts to maintain its ecological function in creation.

The Green Team's purpose is to "raise awareness of and advocate for the care of creation." Our mission is to support and encourage creation care ministries, raise awareness, model creation care advocacy consistent with ELCA teachings in our faith communities and public life.

What are the 3 beliefs of the Lutheran Church?

The three core beliefs of the Lutheran Church, often summarized as "sola", are grace alone, faith alone and Scripture alone. These principles, rooted in the teaching of Martin Luther, form the foundation of Lutheran theology.

• <u>Grace Alone (</u>Sola Gratia):

Lutherans believe that salvation is entirely a gift from God, not something earned through good works or human effort. God's grace is freely given, and humanity cannot contribute to their own salvation.

• Faith Alone (Sola Fide):

Salvation is received through faith in Jesus Christ, who died to redeem humanity from sin. This faith is a confident trust in God's promises of forgiveness and salvation.

<u>Scripture Alone (Sola Scriptura):</u>

The Bible is the ultimate authority for all matters of faith and practice. Lutherans believe that the Bible is the inspired word of God and the only source of knowledge about God's will for humanity.

History for the Month of May

May 5, 1865 - Decoration Day was first observed in the U.S., with the tradition of decorating soldiers' graves from the Civil War with flowers. The observance date was later moved to May 30th and included American graves from World War I and World War II, and became better known as Memorial Day. In 1971, Congress moved Memorial Day to the last Monday in May, thus creating a three-day holiday weekend.

May 6, 1937 - The German airship Hindenburg burst into flames at 7:20 p.m. as it neared the mooring mast at Lakehurst, New Jersey, following a trans-Atlantic voyage. Thirty six of the 97 passengers and crew were killed. The inferno was caught on film and also witnessed by a commentator who broke down amid the emotional impact and exclaimed, "Oh, the humanity!" The accident effectively ended commercial airship traffic.

May 8 Birthday - International Red Cross founder and Nobel Prize winner Henri Dunant (1828-1910) was born in Geneva, Switzerland. He was also a founder of the YMCA and organized the Geneva Conventions of 1863 and 1864.

May 12 Birthday - British nurse and public health activist Florence Nightingale (1820-1910) was born in Florence, Italy. She volunteered to aid British troops in Turkey where she improved hospital sanitary conditions and greatly reduced the death rate for wounded and sick soldiers. She received worldwide acclaim for her unselfish devotion to nursing, contributed to the development of modern nursing procedures, and emphasized the dignity of nursing as a profession for women.

May 17, 1792 - Two dozen merchants and brokers established the New York Stock Exchange. In good weather they operated under a buttonwood tree on Wall Street. In bad weather they moved inside to a coffeehouse to conduct business.

May 20, 1862 - President <u>Abraham Lincoln</u> signed the Homestead Act opening millions of acres of government owned land in the West to "homesteaders" who could acquire up to 160 acres by living on the land and cultivating it for five years, paying just \$1.25 per acre.

May 27, 1937 - In San Francisco, 200,000 people celebrated the grand opening of the Golden Gate Bridge by strolling across it.

May 29 Birthday - John Fitzgerald Kennedy (1917-1963) the 35th U.S. President was born in Brookline, Massachusetts. He was the youngest man ever elected to the presidency and the first Roman Catholic. He was assassinated in Dallas, November 22, 1963, the fourth President to killed by an assassin.

The Flower Moon:

The name of Mays full moon should be no surprise! In May flowers spring forth across North America in full abundance!

- The name "Flower Moon" has been attributed to the Algonquin's as confirmed by Christina Ruddy of The Algonquin Way Cultural Centre in Ontario.
- May's Moon was also called "Month of Flowers" by Jonathan Carver in his 1798 publication, *Travels Through the Interior Parts of North America*.
- Henry David Thoreau sparked the Native American Moon names as well, referencing the Flower Moon and Carver when he wrote about Native Americans.

Alternative May Moon Names:

May's Moon names tend to speak to the arrival of spring after long winter months! It is fitting that the names focus on spring and all it entails! The Cree names **Budding Moon** and **Leaf Budding Moon** celebrate the awakening of local flora, which really begins to leaf out now in many areas. Similarly, **Planting Moon** (Dakota, Lakota) marks the time when seeds should be started for the farming season ahead.

The activities of animals marked spring's arrival, too, which is highlighted by the Cree names **Egg Laying Moon** and **Frog Moon**, as well as the Oglala term **Moon of the Shedding Ponies**. All three names indicate that warmer weather is on the way!
