

Parish Membership: Every family and single adult to be considered active members of St. Bartholomew's Parish must be properly registered in the parish, receiving and regularly using the parish weekly donation envelopes. Only in this way can the parish issue documents attesting to parish membership and Catholic practice, e.g. a letter to be a Godparent or Sponsor. New parishioners are requested to visit the parish office.

Sick & Shut-ins: The priests are available to administer the Sacraments to those who are unable to come to Church. The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is part of the healing ministry of the Church, and should be received early in an illness or before a serious operation.

Baptisms: Please call the parish office to make arrangements.

Marriages: In order to provide sufficient time for the Marriage Preparation Course, please call the parish office and ask to speak with the pastor at least six months in advance of the wedding.

Parish Council: Meets on the Monday evening after the third Sunday of the month.

Holy Name Society: Meets on the Monday evening after the second Sunday of the month. President, Joseph Chimenti

PUT YOUR FAITH INTO ACTION

Throughout Old Testament history, God's name was often invoked to smite the enemy or call for deliverance. But Isaiah does not call upon God to hurt those who beat him or deliver him from his suffering. No, Isaiah calls upon God in solidarity, sure that he is doing the right thing despite the abuse he's received, confident that he is carrying out God's will. He does not feel the need to call upon God for help because he knows that God is already on his side, or to put it another way, that he is on God's side.

Hearing God can be a double-edged sword. The deaf man whom we heard Jesus heal last week immediately got to hear the praise and wonder of his neighbors. Isaiah, however, who attests that "the Lord God opens my ears that I may hear" (50:4), is beaten and spat at by those who do not want to hear his criticism. Peter hears Jesus say he would suffer greatly and be killed, then immediately gets an earful when he rejects Jesus' shocking prediction. We are blessed to be able to hear the word of God and recognize what God is calling us to do, but there is no guarantee that what we hear will be welcome or easy. After all, Jesus follows His tongue-lashing of Peter with a warning to everyone: "Whoever wishes to come after me must deny himself, take up his cross, and follow me" (Mark 8:34). Openness to God's voice requires an openness to God's will.


But once we accept Jesus' command, we truly live out our faith. Living out our faith, say James in his letter means doing something concrete to show it. If we truly believe that all people are made in the image of God and that God's Son came to save the multitudes, then that faith should drive us to care for our neighbor, especially those in need of material assistance.

How do I put my faith into action? When do I resist putting my faith into action?




FIRST COMMUNION AND CONFIRMATION CLASSES:

The Rite of Christian Initiation (popularly known as RCIA) is the process designed by the Church for adults to receive the sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation and First Communion. Please contact Cheryl Duda at 914-476-6676 if you or somebody you know might be interested in the program.

The feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross is September 14th. The Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross came to be when St. Helena (mother of the Christian Roman Emperor Constantine) went to Jerusalem to find the holy places of Jesus Christ's life. She had the Temple of Aphrodite torn down, which tradition said was built over Jesus' tomb. During the excavation, workers found three crosses and burial tombs. The cross on which Jesus died was identified when a dying woman was healed after touching the cross. The Basilica of the Holy Sepulcher was built above the place where Jesus' cross was found. The cross immediately became an object of veneration and to this day the Catholic, Eastern and Orthodox Churches all celebrate the Exaltation of the Holy Cross on September 14th, which is the anniversary of the Basilica of the Holy Sepulcher's dedication. Can You Walk the Walk?

I've met and talked with enough people to feel confident that if you polled 100 fallen-away Catholics about why they didn't want anything to do with the Church, the term "accountability" would pop up in almost all of their answers.

And to be fair, a lack of accountability isn't just a Catholic problem. Talking the talk but not walking the walk has been a shortcoming handed down throughout the ages, across all creeds and nationalities.

Loving our neighbor, welcoming the stranger, clothing the naked, feeding the poor — it all sounds fantastic, especially when we're the ones saying it. But the doing — well, that's a different story, isn't it? We would do well to remember that Christ calls one of his best friends "Satan" when Peter tries to convince Jesus to stray from his destiny.

Have you ever been called Satan by one of your good buddies? I'll bet it's not a great feeling. But think about what Peter was doing. He had just said, "You are the Christ." And now, mere moments later, he's saying: "Don't say these things. Don't say you're going to suffer. Don't say you'll be killed."

He was telling Christ to squander what the Lord had given him. He was telling him that having faith was fine, but being faithful? It's just a little too hard. God has a destiny for you, too, and He's asking you to be open to it. Maybe it's not in your comfort zone. Maybe you don't think you can do it.

Lord, give us faith — but help us, also, to do the work.
