Brothers and Sisters,

May God's grace give us the necessary joy, peace, and patience to love our neighbors.

We continue the five-part Beacon article series on the 'Theories of Atonement'. All Christians believe that the

life, death, and resurrection of Jesus saves us from our sins and reconciles us to God. However, there are many explanations as to **how** the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus does this. We call these explanations 'theories of atonement'. Two months ago (April), we discussed the 'Ransom theory'. Last month (May) we discussed the 'Christ as Victor theory'. This month (June), we discuss the 'Satisfaction/penal substitution theory'; in July, the



'Recapitulation/Divinization theory'; and lastly, in August, the 'Moral example/Scapegoat theory'.

The 'Satisfaction/penal substitution' theory is the most well-known theory among Western Christianity. When Christians say, "Jesus went to the cross to pay for our sins", they are referencing the 'Satisfaction/penal substitution' theory of atonement.

This theory, however, is a newer theory. It did not become an established theory of atonement until Anselm of Canterbury popularized it with his publication of "Why God Became a Man" sometime between 1094 and 1098 AD. It, therefore, did not become an accepted theory of atonement until over 1,000 years after Jesus' resurrection.

Anslem argues that God created humanity and creation without sin. Humanity disobeyed God and brought sin into creation, and, therefore, owes a debt to God. In the same way criminals owe a debt to society, humanity owes a debt to God. This created a dilemma. Humanity committed sin, so only humanity can pay the debt (penalty) for sin. God, however, is perfect. Imperfect humanity is unable to give God anything worthy of a perfect being. No matter how hard we try, any debt we pay back to God, will be tainted by sin. So, humanity is incapable of paying its debt to God. Thus, the dilemma - only humanity can pay its debt to God but humanity is incapable of paying its debt to God.

The only solution is the 'God-Man', Jesus Christ. As a human, Jesus can pay the debt humanity owes God. As God, Jesus is capable of paying the debt to God. In other words, as the 'God-Man' Jesus is capable of paying the penalty for all our sins and chooses to do so.

As with all the theories of atonement, there are weaknesses to this theory of atonement.

First, it emphasizes Jesus' death at the detriment of his resurrection. It explains the significance of Jesus' death but does little to explain the role played by Jesus' resurrection in our eternal salvation.

Second, it teaches that God can forgive only after a debt (penalty) is paid. This limits God's sovereignty. The Lord can forgive whenever the Lord wants to forgive. While dying on the cross, Jesus said to the Father, "Father, forgive them, they know not what they do." Evidently, God offers forgiveness before people even know they need to repent. (Of course, the proponents of this theory would argue that God can offer us forgiveness before we know we need to repent because God already paid the penalty for our sins in the person of Jesus.)

The strength of this theory lies in the love God shows us by becoming human and enduring the punishment we deserve so we can receive God's forgiveness and have eternal life. To describe the love in this theory of atonement, many people use the metaphor of a judge. After finding the defendant guilty, the judge pronounces

his punishment. But, instead of ordering the bailiff to take the defendant to jail, the judge orders the bailiff to free the defendant. The judge then rises, takes off his robe, and orders the bailiff to take him to jail so he can carry out the defendant's sentence.

The following Bible passages allude to the 'Satisfaction/penal substitution theory'. Take the time to slowly meditate on these passages: 1 John 2:2, 1 Peter 2:24 & 3:18, 2 Corinthians 5:21, Galatians 3:13, 1 John 2:2.

Green Technology Benefits Florida's Economy By Edith Zewadski-Bricker, Green Team Member

According to the latest NATURE magazine published by The Nature Conservancy (TNC), Florida's economy is benefitting from investment in green technology. Our state has the second highest number of electric vehicles and a ranking as the fourth state in the country in clean energy employment. In 2021 we showed 160,000 clean energy jobs.

TNC published a study of the impact of net zero economy in Florida. It found that net zero power investment is expected to result in a 1.5% increase in our GDP by 2030. Florida's year-round sunshine will become increasingly valuable as solar costs continue to decline. (See *Economic Benefits of Decarbonization in Florida* at:





Net Zero: The balance between the amount of greenhouse gas that's produced and the amount that's removed from the atmosphere.

The thing I like is that green employment will offer higher pay to workers of all skill and education levels. We can put our young people to work! Seventy-one different sectors of our economy will be augmented, especially electricity, transportation, construction, and agriculture.

I'm partial to The Nature Conservancy because it was my first job out of college . I worked in the National Office in Washington DC, in Arlington, Virginia, (in 1973 ②.) If ever there was an organization that knows how to partner science with industry, it's TNC. While I worked there, we partnered with ExxonMobil in Alaska, we saved Dismal Swamp in the south with a partnership with the Union Camp (a logging company), and we saved Lignumvitae Key in Islamorada.

Life Line Screening goes beyond regular checkups to look inside your arteries for signs of plaque build-up



Carotid Artery Disease:

An ultrasound is performed to screen the carotid arteries (a pair of blood vessels in the neck that deliver blood to your brain) for buildup of fatty plague. This buildup. called atherosclerosis, is one of the leading causes of stroke.
