Service Projects

Clothe-A-Child

Restricted gift cards for children's clothing are distributed to families in need through schools and agencies throughout the Miami Valley.

DECA - <u>Dayton Early College Academy</u> / DECA Prep

CCS volunteers lead book groups, edit papers, serve as panelists for performance assessments, and help with school events at this K-12 charter school system.

Erma's House

CCS volunteers provide supervision for court-ordered v isitation of children with their non-custodial parent.

The Glen at St. Joseph

CCS volunteers assist in activities emphasizing education and life skills in this residential facility supporting low income single moms in a safe environment. Volunteers help with the Halloween party, assist in setting up and selling for their Christmas shop and help at other events as needed.

Hygiene Kits

CCS assembles basic hygiene kits containing items such as soap, shampoo, toothpaste, combs, lip balm, and bandaids. Contents vary seasonally based on need. Kits are provided to Daybreak, the only area agency serving homeless teens and youth.

Layettes

Monthly, CCS distributes necessities such as blankets and clothes to underprivileged, newborn babies through area social service agencies.

Maria Joseph Living Care Center

CCS volunteers make monthly visits for bingo and provide homemade dessert, fruit and prizes.

Oak Tree Corner

CCS volunteers provide pizza dinner once a month with drinks, fresh vegetables and cookies for a grief group that assists children/families through the healing process as they navigate a loss in the family.

Prayer Shawls

A group of skilled CCS knitters come together to knit prayer shawls to be given out for various reasons: a sick member, a member in need, or given to nursing homes and retirement villages.

St. Vincent de Paul Gateway Shelter

CCS volunteers help to serve dinner at the Gateway Shelter for Women and Children and donate needed items for the shelter. Sack lunches are delivered every month.
