Safety Article, July 2023

Good month, hope all agree. In South Carolina, not too hot and though we had many storms, we were lucky compared to other parts of the country. As with last month, trauma from the storms can damage your mental health. This is also true of accidents.

As with all our activities, proper personal protection is required. Eye protection is critical with our activities.

I am late this month and wish to revisit some aspects of aspects on producing a treasure either by developing a cabochon or a silver filagree piece. This is my background.

I will start with silver filagree since I have the least experience with this work. I started my silver career in a basic silver class, and the instructor was busy getting ready for an upcoming show and left me at my own extremely limited skills in handling a torch. I did not burn the wall; nor did I tip over the pickle pot. I was careful about those activities, particularly since the lady in front of me was less careful than I with her torch, she did not set the room on fire, but did increase the temperature of a wall and some innocent close by tools. In summary I melted silver and what I produced, my kind wife said it was a good attempt, but she put all the products of my weeks work next to the recycle box. My next class was with Shannon Stafford, an extremely skilled artist and instructor. She quickly noticed I was substantially incapable of doing anything other that creating waste. She provided a CD and suggested I review this, and we would talk on Tuesday. The CD was a great demonstration and educational tool. By noon on Tuesday, I was above the scrap creating stage. She assisted in getting my skills drastically improved and I produced a couple of pieces my kind wife included in her jewelry box. The admonition here starts with a known instructor who has an educational bent to teach you.

Cabbing is a great way to spend time creating a lovely treasure. I love opals and though close to being cabbing, opals are different. Much more examination and planning of the rough is required to handle opals. So back to basic cabbing. My wife took me to our local club's workshop and seated me beside a very skilled young man that assisted me with what to do with the stone and machine. I had about a 4 hour session and learned a great deal and then the next week, learned even more. One of the things he noted was the proper way for the stone to address the wheel of the Genie. He explained that improper approach can quickly damage the softer wheels on the Genie. This lesson was not learned by several other folks that were substantially less willing to learn the proper approach and several wheels were damaged by stone gouges. This lady and one of her associates blamed the wheels for their inability to handle their improper approaches. Thankfully these ladies stopped coming to the workshop and the Genie's life improved. Again, it is important for your teacher to be observant and willing to correct your mistakes. Sarah Lee Boyce, Opal teacher extraordinaire, can listen to the machines and tell if you are doing the process properly. Being an excellent observer of the student's activities helps the students learn very quickly. Though we did have one guy that did not want to be there and as such his work and attitude made him a good example of a bad student. You must examine your stone, dry your stone, inspect the surface, and have all the previous wheel marks removed, if not back up. Too many folks want to have the finer grit wheels assist in shaping the stone and this tends to wear out the wheel and leads to frustrations of the students, and unfortunately some never get it.

As we started last month, the most important thing is your brain, providing you with proper planning, and your wearing proper PPE and having your equipment in safe working order.

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Rock Corner by David Liles (Knoxville G&MS)

Pyrophyllite

Hi Folks! Well, it is that time of the month for me to look at my rock and mineral collection for something to discuss. I like to use this forum to discuss rocks, minerals, and fossils I have encountered on KGMS field trips, and about which I have personal stories to relate. This month I am going to discuss the mineral Pyrophyllite.

If you like minerals with interesting crystal habits, then pyrophyllite is one you will want for your collection. It often presents as groups of spherical to fan shaped cells, with each cell consisting of needles radiating outward in 360° from a central point. It typically has a beautiful pearly luster and the color can be brownish green, brownish yellow, greenish, gray to green, or gray to white, and. The best collectable specimens present themselves as thin deposits of crystal clusters on a rock of another type. See: Pyrophyllite - Wikipedia

Pyrophyllite is soft, with a Mohs hardness of 1.5-2, so you will want to avoid rubbing or abrading the crystal needles, as they damage easily. Chemically, Pyrophyllite is an aluminum silicate hydroxide mineral that with a chemical formula of $(Al_2Si_4O_{10} (OH)_2)$. The "Silicates" are a very large class of minerals, that make up some 90% of the Earth's crust. They are further divided into 7 Groups with Pyrophyllite classified as a member of phyllosilicate group and as a hydroxide $(OH)_2$ mineral originating from and found with clay and mica deposits. Pyrophyllite is often a product of metamorphic processes where heat and pressure transform the structure of existing (in this case, usually sedimentary) rocks. It can be found associated with metamorphic rocks such as phyllite and schist, and with minerals such as kyanite, andalusite, topaz, mica, and quartz. It can also be found as a hydrothermal mineral deposit -formed when hot fluids circulating in the Earth's crust are forced into cavities and fractures in existing rocks where they cool to form crystals.

Pyrophyllite is chemically inert (does not easily combine with other chemicals), has high dielectric strength (is a good electric insulator), and has a high

melting point. It has applications in the ceramics, electrical, and brick / tile industries See: <u>Talc and Pyrophyllite Statistics and Information | U.S.</u>

I have two personal experiences to relate when it comes to pyrophyllite, and they both involve rock club field trips to the Graves Mountain site in Lincolnton, GA. Take my word for it – this is one of the most interesting dig sites / field trips you can go on in this area (within a 6-hour drive of Knoxville). It is an annual pilgrimage for many! I visited in 2018 and did most of my bulk rock collecting then. When I visited in 2022 there were more than 100 cars waiting for the gate to open! This trip was for collecting superior specimens and for photography of the rocks. As an Artist, I seek colors and patterns as abstract Art.

To visit the site, I drive down on a Friday, get a motel for the night, and then spend all the next day on site from gate open to gate closed. Field trips are generally scheduled in the spring and fall, but the site can be opened by owners to groups at other times. The geology of the Graves Mountain site is very complex, with many mostly metamorphic rocks and minerals, dating from the Permian Period (290-250) million years ago) - a period of geologic folding, faulting, and heating as the supercontinent called Pangea was formed. This event metamorphosed existing sedimentary rocks to produce rock consisting of pyrite, sericite, kyanite and quartz – and many other minerals. In the 1920's the site was mined for rutile, a titanium mineral. Kyanite "ore" was mined commercially, beginning in 1963. Minerals at the Graves site include: Pyrophyllite, barite, jarosite, phosphosiderite, variscite, quartz, rutile, ilmenite, kyanite, pyrite, lazulite, hematite, goethite, limonite, sulfur, iridescent hematite, and smaller occurrences of many others. This open pit mine was shut down in 1986 and has since been treated as hazardous waste site because of acid runoff but is well known as a rock and mineral specimen collecting site.


To find <u>pyrophyllite</u>, visit the main pit, and enter from the back non-wall entrance. Move forward and examine the left and back walls. You will find lots of pyrophyllite in the broken rocks at the base of the pit wall, as well as mineral veins and as massive deposits in the wall itself. Where host rocks fractured along <u>pyrophyllite</u> veins, one can find host rocks with a thin layer of pyrophyllite crystals on the surface. This is what you want for your collection!

As I mentioned earlier, pyrophyllite crystals are soft and easily damaged, so take care in chipping specimens out of larger rocks and transporting them to your car. You will

be the 1st specimen owner, so you want to keep your pyrophyllite looking nice and new – not beat up and used! Be a responsible custodian! I kinda laugh at the term "used rock", as rocks have been around forever! It is an eBay marketing term, used by folks selling specimens (often in less than pristine condition).

Have fun and keep looking at the ground! That is where the rocks, minerals, (and fossils) are!

I will practice conservation and undertake to utilize fully and well the materials I have collected and will recycle my surplus for the pleasure and benefit of others.

Wildacres - Week 1

August 14th, 2023 – August 20th, 2023

Brief Description (Website contains full description and instructor bios) Class/Instructor In this class we'll explore the art of stained glass using the Stained Glass -Tiffany method, also known as the copper foil method, that with Stephanie Danz allows more creative freedom. We'll be incorporating agate slices and other gems into the final pieces. During the course of the week, you will have the opportunity to create two projects – a hanging panel and a freestanding tabletop piece. This is a fun and focused class for the beginner as well as the more experienced craftsperson. Prerequisites: none Material Lab Fees: \$275 est. \$25+ Fees: Scrimshaw, a folk-art dating back centuries, is a special form of Scrimshaw engraving applied to whales' teeth and bone by the ancient with Sandy Brady sailors. This course offers an excellent way to begin traditional scrimshaw. Working with a hand scribe, you will learn attractive shading techniques and how to work on both natural and manmade materials. Also, basic composition and tool sharpening, as well as transfer methods for those who are "drawing challenged". This hands-on course is specifically designed so no previous art or drawing experience is necessary. Please note this class is not "machine assist".
