

Join The 75+ SCWD members and members from other Midwest Regional Divisions who are participating in the SCWD listserv. You can expect 4 - 6 photos of railfan photos or model railroad photos per week on average, as well as SCWD announcements, and a monthly Mystery Photo contest. The listserv has been running this since April 2012 (that will be 7 years this coming April), and it has been quite popular.

The listserv is a one-way email broadcast to you, not a social media type service. The emails are sent in bulk, but as a BCC: type email, so no one knows the identity or email addresses of the participants. Once a month, I send out a Mystery Photo, and then if you know the answer or do a little research , you send an email back to <u>scwdmemberlist@frontier.com</u>. About a week later, I post the answer and a list of the names of those who sent in answers that month. The answer often includes parts of the best correct answers received.

**Note: If you used to be on the list but stopped receiving this, probably if you changed your email, just send your name and new email address to the email address below **

Please realize that a lot of email client programs treat all BULK emails as SPAM or JUNK. To avoid missing out on things I send, just add <u>sewdmemberlist@frontier.com</u> as a contact in your contact list.

SCWD 2019-20 Video Contest Guidelines Steve Lanphear

This year's SCWD video contest will be open for submitting entries on November 1, 2019.

Here are the things you need to know:

- There are two categories: **Prototype** and **Model**.
- The contest is open to those who attend the SCWD meetings.
- The person submitting an entry <u>must</u> be the one who took the video, however you may have help from others in <u>editing</u> your entry.
- The video can be from any time period (it doesn't have to be taken just to enter this contest).
- It has to be a **maximum** of 5 minutes in length, but can be any size less than that and the file has to be less than 2GB in size.
- All videos must be on a railroad theme.
- The video can have title screen but not necessary, however there should be no names or identifiers on it (it is a "blind" contest).
- For the Model Category, the video can be of anyone's layout, not just your own.
- First, second and third place will be given for each category (no points given toward annual Photographer contest).
- Deadline for Entries March 1 (you will upload all entries to the website listed on the SCWD website, Video Contest webpage).
- You may enter more than once (max. of 5 entries per person).
- Voting starts Mar 10 on the SCWD Video Contest webpage.
- Voting will be closed on end of day April 15.
- Winners will be announced at the May Meeting.

The Biggest Locomotives

I got interested in this topic after seeing Big Boy 4014 and hearing it described repeatedly as the biggest locomotive ever made. This turns out to be false in almost every detail.

The problem is that there isn't any one definition that give an answer to the question of what is the biggest loco. Is it weight, external dimensions, horsepower, or tractive power? Do you count steam and diesel or both? What about experimental locos?

So how to decide? It's my article and I'll do what I want. I will show the biggest in all those categories and compare it with the Big Boy. I'm ignoring all experimental and one off prototypes. Steam, Diesel and electric are considered.

Biggest (external dimensions)

The longest locomotive in the world is the Chesapeake & Ohio Railway Allegheny H-8 2-6-6-6 with a length of 125 feet. Sixty were built by the Lima Works from 1941 to 1948. All were retired by 1956. Two static units remain. By comparison the Big Boy is 85'4" and The UP Big Blow (in three sections) is 83'6"



Heaviest The heaviest locomotive in the world is the Yellowstone 2-8-8-4 built by Baldwin between 1928-1945. The Yellowstone weighed 566 tons. By comparison the Big Boy weighed only(!) 548 tons and the Big Blow about 250 tons.



Horsepower

In terms of raw horsepower the winner (by so much that there is no second place) is the China Railways HXD1, a double unit electric generating 19,000 horsepower from 25 thousand volts A/C from overhead lines. Two hundred copies were delivered 2006-2010. They are intended for pulling coal trains at speeds to 75 mph. By comparison the Big Boy generated 6,290 hp. This demonstrates the huge advantage that electric designs have. The HXD1 only weighs 150 tons (no onboard diesels engines or fuel tanks) a quarter the weight of the Big Boy but with triple the power.

Tractive Force

Tractive force is the amount of "pull" a locomotive can generate. Electric motors have maximum tractive force from a stop and gradually lose tractive force as speed increases. Because of this it's technically necessary to consider two values for tractive force, initial and sustained. To simplify I use the average value of the specs. Steam engines don't have this characteristic and so have only a single value.

As you might expect the loco with the most horsepower has the most tractive force. The winner in this category is the HXD1 with 256,282 pounds-force. The Big Blow makes a respectable showing of 212,312 pounds-force. The Big Boy tops out at 135,375 pounds-force.

In conclusion, there is no sense in which the Big Boy is or ever was the biggest locomotive in the world. The impression that it is seems to be the result of a relentless campaign on the part of Union Pacific's publicity department. It is certainly true that it is now the largest **operating** steam locomotive in the world. Another factor in the misperception is that the Big Boy is, in fact, very big. While it is not at the top of any category of size, it is high on every list, and as a result of this cumulative score can be reasonably regarded as the largest without delving into annoyingly complicated detail. Who wants to hear that the pride of the Union Pacific is eclipsed by some weird machine of the Chi-Coms?






