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# Caravelle Manager Surrenders To Police

SAIGON.— Mr. Lam ngoc Huan, Manager of the Caravelle Hotel, surrendered to the police Sunday and is now under arrest. A summons to Mr. Huan to present himself to the police was broadcast over the National Radio during Tet.

Mr. Huan, a former lieutenant Colonel and a member of the Council of Notables set up after the November 1, 1963, was reported wanted by the police for questioning for his connections with the generals (Gens. Ton that Dinh, Tran van Don, Mai huu Xuan, Le van Kim) arrested after the Jan. 30 purge. Mr. Huan was tetired off as an army officer for alleged involvement in the 1960 abortive coup d'etat and since then has been the manager of the Caravelle Hotel.

### VAA Prints Exhibit Opens

SAIGON, Feb. 18.— An exhibition of prints selected by the Print Council of America opened Monday at the Vietnamese American Association-

# No Free Smokes at U.S. Military Hospitals Here

The Department of Defense plans to prohibit the distribution of free cigarettes in military hospitals and to establish an Armed Forces educational program to point out the hazards of smoking

Hospital authorities at the HSAS Station Hospital in Saigon, the 33rd USAF Dispensary at Tan Son Nhu and the 8th Field Hospital at Nh. Trang reported that military patient do not get free cigarettes.

Department of Defense is not con sidering the prohibition of individua purchase, possession or use of tobaco products.

# V.N. To Be Represented At Wcopt Bangkok Meet

SAIGON, (VP), -- Three Vietnames educators have been named to atten the Asian regional conference of th World Confederation of Organization of the Teaching Profession (WCOTF which opened in Bangkok, Thailand Sunday.

The three are Messrs. Nguyen Din Hoa, director of Cultural Affairs Education Ministry, Tran van Tan, dean of the Saigon University Faculty of Pedigogy and Nguyen van Buong, Primai Education director.

Discussions at the week-long confi rence will be centered on the main theme: < Intensification of internation understanding by learning to knc about the United Nations.

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6,000 Study English at VAA Saigon. — The Vietnamese American Association currently has 360 English cources in progress with an enrollment of about 6,000 students and a teaching body numbering 115. Of the total teachers, 14 are Vietnamese.

The VAA offers classes at 15 levels, beginning to advanced. In addition, accelerated language classes are held under certain circumstances and six shorthand courses also are offered.

A regular course runs for three months at the end of which a student must pass an examination before he can be admitted to the next class.

It is possible for a student to complete four courses a year.

# Security Tightened At All U.S. Installations

SAIGON. – Americans and Vietnamese tightened security measures at all U.S. installations in Saigon to guard against further Viet Cong terrorist attacks.

Barricades had been put up on sidewalks in front of the Embassy and USHS and it was presumed that similar measures had been taken elsewhere. More police and guards have been assigned to most U.S. installations and many have armed American soldiers guarding them as well.

# Government To Strike At Bribery, Corruption

SAIGON, Feb. 19. — Tough punitive measures to be taken against military and administration officials who misappropriate funds, take bribes or indulge in influence peddling of any sort were discussed at a cabinet meeting at

Armed Forces General Staff Headquarters this week.

This was reported by reliable sources here who said the measures are designed to clean out the corruption and resulting venality left over from the Ngo Dinh Diem regime.

The sources reported that the new measures will require the death sentence for anyone, be he minister or general, misappropriates funds exceeding VNS 100,000. The sentences would be cerried out immediately, they added.



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## Women Oppose Cigarette Advertisements

TOKYO.— A delegation of Tokyo Regional Federation of Women's Organisations has called on the Japanese Government's tobacco monopoly to divert the huge sums spent on cigarette advertising to health research work.

The delegation submitted a written statement to the president of the Japan Monopoly Corporation, demanding that the corporation excercise self-restraint in television, radio and journalistic advertising of its cigarettes, which is «luring youths into the smoking habit of adults».

The statement suggested that the corporation should use its annual cigarette publicity budget, estimated at  $\pounds$  125,000 (US\$348,000), for research on public health problems, particularly the prevention of lung cancer.

### Hypnosis Helps

CHICAGO (UPI) – Father John J, Higgins of Parks Collegerin Cahokia, III., uses hypnosis combined with a program of counseling to help students raise their concentration.

« Many persons are alraid (of hypnosis) because they've seen victims embarrassed on the stage », Father Higgins said. « Actually, hypnotism is not for entertainment. It is a serious science.

«Fears that people can be hypnotized against their wills or that they will reveal secrets and change deep moral convictions are groundless. >

India To Fire 36 Space Rockets NEW DELHI.— (A-ANS) India will fire 36 rockets into space from the research station at Thumba, near Trivandrum.

American scientists are essisting the Indian Government in assembling and launching the rockets.

Both the French and the Russians have offered technical assistance in the building and launching of the rockets Besides this, Moscow has offered a high-altitude helicopter to trace the rockets after they are fired.

### Blind But Sweet

SINGAPORE (A-ANS).— A party of 12 blind musicians, including seven talented girls, has arrived here for a month-long concert tour of Malaysia.

The sightless instrumentalists are from the Hongkong Music Training Centre for the Blind, and have already given about 500 concerts in Hongkong and abroad.


# Air France Resumes Two Weekly Polar Route Flights





Gay Funeral Follows Do You Know ? In Wake Of Sad One

LAGOS, Nigeria (UPI). — In the eastern region of Nigeria the Ibos tribesmen have a unique system of dippelling sorrow when a man dies.

They hold two funerals — a sad one and a happy one.

The first ceremony is the burial of the corpse and it is marked by a period of mourning. Then comes the second funeral, called a <farewell> to the departed spirit. This is a gay affair at which the deceased is wished good fortune on his journey to the other world.

At the burial, normally only blood relatives and wives attend. But the «farewell» funeral is attended not only by blood relatives but relatives by marriage — except widows — and friends of the departed one.

The «farewell» wake is a feast for which food is prepared in huge quantities, washed down by equally huge quantities of palm wine, the national drink which is tapped from palm trees.

According to tradition, if the deceased is a brave man or one descended from a warrior, a ram is slaughtered in the middle of the village compound, the blood spilled on a «tree of sacrifice». The animal is then cooked in a special way and served to all members of the family of the same age as the deceased.

On the first day of the second ceremony, the eldest daughters — called the «adas» of the family — gather in the house of the Number One wife and keep vigil thoughout the night, singing and dancing. By early morning of the second day they dance in a procession around the village singing

# songs of appeasement to the spirit of the dead and requesting it to carry the departed safely to happiness and prosperity in the next world.

Meanwhile the man also are celebrating on their own, by firing guns. The higher the status of the deceased the noisier the ceremonies. Gunfire is supposed to alert the spirit of the dead and make it aware of the celebration on earth but it also is intended to scare away any wicked spirit which might be trying to take possession of the deceased's soul.

In some parts of Ibo-land, a basketwork effigy is made exactly the same size as the dead man and wrapped in a mat, which in turn is covered with a white cloth. In some parts this mummy is buried, but in other areas it is thrown into the «bush» or left in the bedroom of the deceased to gather dust with other images in a sort of shrine.

There are various traditional observances connected with these funerals. Women of the deaceased's household, particularly his widows — the Ibos still practice polygamy — are required to remain in the compound while mourning is in progress. They sit with heads bowed until the farewell ceremoniesare completed. Their heads are completely shaved and blackened with indigo.

The farewell funeral ceremonies are very expensive, but even in these modern times they are performed as a matter of prestige. Even Christian tribesmen observe the tradition, but have modernized the rites with a memorial service and buffet lunch  $\rightarrow$  frequently brightened by a brass band.



# OVIES

The Dai Nam, Eden, Majestic, Kinh lo, Khai Hoan and Rex, are first class ir conditioned theatres in the heart of aigon where firstrun films are shown. here are a great many second lass air-conditioned theaters, all over he city. Movie theaters, or cinas, as hey are commonly called here, usualy star at 1:00 in the afternoon. On holidays show-begin at 9.90 in the morning. Last screening starts at about 9.00 in the evening. Hollywood, British, French, Japanese and Vietnamese films are shown in popular theaters. Most of the films have French sound tracks with Vietnamese subtitles.

The (Hat Boi) is essentially tragic and is always steeped in the great dramas of the history of China. The actors richly dressed, have to limit themselves to a certain number of exacting rules and symbols. Their make-up itself is also conventional.

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

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### SAIGON

Saigon, the charming political and cultural capital of the Republic of Viet Nam, is one of the most attractive cites in the Orient characterized by a combination of French and Oriental cultures and tastes. If this « Pearl of the East», as it has been called by sea merchants from the Occident, is now growing and moving forward, it still retains the freshness of a French capi tal, which exudes from the sidewalk cafes.

Visitors to this enchanting city are always charmed by the friendliness and gaiety of the Vietnamese people, the loveliness of pretty girls, the delicious and almost overabundant food, the fairytale atmosphere of the surrounding countryside; and bewildered by the masses of bicyles and scooter which are the main cause of traffic jams? Saigon is also called the « city on the wheels » because of its approximatively 500,000 bicycles. They are ridden to work by businessmen, peddled to school by students and carry all sorts of delivery boys and messencers on their errands. A common — and always eve-catching sight — is a Velo-Solex cruising along with two attractive girls wearing colorful traditional dresses, the skirts of which flutter in the wind and threatened to catch in the whirling mechanism a any moment.

Le Loi boulevard and Tu Do Streets, Saigon's main thoroughfares, mirror easy-going manners of the Vietnemese. Siestra is as much a ritual here as elsewhere in Asia; shops close down until half past two in the afternoon when the streets again throb with commerce. By eight in the evening all the shops are closed and the night life begins with night strollers prowling the floodlit streets.

Saigon's history dates back only to 200 years when it was once just a cluster of thatched huts of lishermen Now this city of nearly two million people and covering about 51 square kilometers, is the center of Viet Nam cultural life, as well as the hub of its industry and commerce.

## CHINATOWN OF CHOLON

Saigon's twin city, Cholon, is an authentic Chinese town with its characteristic bustling. If Saigon shines with an old world graciousness, the overgrown Chinatown of Cholon has the hurlyburly of a young city.

Formely the two cities were administered separately, but in 1956, they were merged by presidential decree.

Cholon must be visited at night to see the crowd overflowing the streets and the multitude of dazzling neon signs. Here the gournet finds excellent Chinese and French cuisine, whiles he dines to the music of gracious and heavily made-up singers, lovely waittresses serve him to enhance the prestige of the Chinese culin: ry art.

# THE BOTANICAL GARDENS

Facing the Dinh Doc Lap (Independence Palace) at the East end of the Thong Nhat boulevard, the Botanical Gardens present a particular interest. They possess one of the most important collections of orchids and of equatorial plants, besides a wide variety of game.

# **OUR LADY'S BASILICA**

Located in the centre of the Hoa Binh place, in front of the General Post Office building, Our Lady's Basilica, of roman style, with its two 40 meter high steeples, dominates the city. It was built with red bricks, on a foundation of granite, and achieved in 1883.

# MARSHAL LE VAN DUYET'S TOMB

The tomb of Marshal Le Van Duyet, a military hero who served Emperor Gia Long, the unifier of Viet Nam in the 19th century, is situated in the old Khmer capital now called Gia Dinh (a separate city with itsown administration' but practically speaking a suburch of Saigon). Destroyed by King Minh Mang in 1831, the tomb was rebuilt by his successor King Thieu Tri. Now each year on the occasion of the Vietnamese Tet and on his anniversary day, the p' ace is thronged with pilgrims coming from all parts of the country.

Further on, is the Tomb of the Bishop of Adran which holds an inscription recalling the friendship between the French prelate and the Emperor Gia Long, is also worth to be visited.

# **OTHER TOURIST RESORTS**

From Saigon tourists may go by car to Bien Hoa, a pottery center, to visit the School of Applied Art, to Binh Duong, where excellent lacquer pieces are produced, or to Tay Ninh to see the magnificent Cao Dai Chapel. Tourists may also go by car to Vung Tau, or to Long Hai and Nuoc Ngot, for their white beaches.

# **BIEN HOA**

A pretty little town 32 km East of Saigon lies on the bank of the river of Dong Nai. In Buu Son temple at Biem Hoa you can see the 15 th century granite statue of Cham origin which was hidden for several centuries inside a tree trunk. Tourists can also pay a visit to the school of Pottery and Bronze Art, where the traditional skill of the Vietnamese artist is added to the impetus of modern technique.

# TRI AN WATERFALLS.

On the same Dong Nai river, 68km s from Saigon, are the Tri An waterfalls In the dry season the falls are 8 meter high and 30 meter wide. In the rain y season they spread across the whole ridg e and the volume of water is 100,000 cubic meters a minute.

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# GENERAL INFORMATION

## Visa and passport

To land in Vietnam national of all countries must be in possession of valid passports or travel document (in the case of a stateless person, a travel document issued by the country wherein he or she is normally a resident) and must have valid visas for Viet Nam issued by competent Vietnamese representatives abroad. Transit passengers need no visa if they stay in the country less than 72 hours. No exit visa is required if the travelers stay in the country less than 7 days. American travelers do not need a visa (entry or exit) if they stay in the country less than 7 days.

In cases where an exit visa is required, visitors may apply for it from the Immigration Service, 115 Vo Di Nguy Street Saigon.

Visas are usually valid for single journey only, but visitors who wish to proceed on short trips to other countries and return to Viet Nam within the period of validity of the Vietnamese visa, are advised to apply for multiple entry visas. The period of validity of short-term visas is generally 30 days, but if the visitor wishes to extend his

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stay in Viet Nam, he may apply for an extension at the Immigration Service at 115, Vo Di Nguy Street.

# Currency

The monetary unit here is the piastre called «dong» written the \$ and worth approximately 73 piastres per US dollar or 206 piastres per Pound. Money can be changed at banks, exchange offices, travel agencies and hotels without restrictions.

When visitors depart from Viet Nam, their unspent plastres can be reconverted into their original currency upon presentation of the certificate delivered to them when they sold their foreign exchange upon arrival.
