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The Reverend's Ruminations - November 2025

As you glance at the calendar, many of you are likely breathing a sigh (of either relief or trepidation) that there are still <u>nine</u> more weeks left in the year. Oddly, it feels like the trees are a little later than normal in showing their peak colors, but I love autumn and will gladly marvel at the beautiful yellows, oranges, and reds a little longer — as long as I can still get my lawn and gutters cleaned up before the white stuff appears!?!

As usual by November, I must lean forward to begin planning for the inevitable change of the church's liturgical worship calendar. Our three-year journey of sermons exploring the Old Testament ancestors of our faith will conclude this month, including selections from the lesser-known prophets Habakkuk and Haggai as well as their more famous counterparts, Isaiah and Jeremiah. Already by the last Sunday of November, whether we're ready or not, the anticipatory season of Advent will begin — leading us with ever-increasing speed toward a mid-week Christmas Eve worship service this year.

There will, of course, be a mix of days yet to experience this month, from crystal blue skies and vivid colors to the dreary, chilly, "gales of November" with which we're also familiar. One also never knows what could fall from the sky as the days march onward!?! And though many advertisers would like us to think otherwise, the over-hyped celebration of Halloween does <u>not</u> immediately give way to Christmas. November instead begins solemnly with All Saints' Day, which will be observed during worship on November 2nd. There are also civic events like elections (including big bond referendum decisions in several of our area school districts) as well as the important national holidays of Veteran's Day and Thanksgiving. I will once again be speaking on Veteran's Day, this year in Trimont. Ellen and I will also be making our first trip to her mother & stepfather's home in South Carolina after several family Thanksgiving trips to their former location in Oshkosh, WI. The scenery will likely be a bit different that far south, but more importantly we'll all get to see our young grandsons at about six months of age!

In this month of thanks-giving, I challenge you to take a moment and think back on the examples of faith that you saw modelled in your household by parents, grandparents, or other family members. Though some in the congregation may have come to faith later, or by other means, it is likely that most of us grew up in a household that instilled the importance of prayer, church attendance, and faithfulness you have today. Please pause — on Thanksgiving or sometime this month, whether in person or in prayer — to thank those most influential in your Christian development!

By now you should have received a mailing from the Stewardship Committee, and we hope that you have been carefully considering the financial pledge you and your family will make toward the ongoing mission of our church. This is never an easy decision, and we are all well aware of the financial challenges present in our current national economy. Please help your church family as best you are able — knowing that faithful giving returns blessings of not just finances, but continued faith growth for the future.

I also ask that you prayerfully consider how you might serve a more active role at First Congregational United Church of Christ. We are actively seeking board and council members for a new term, and I encourage each of you to take your turn in these valuable ministries of the local church. None of the board positions takes more than a few hours a month, and are a great way to get acquainted with other members of our congregation. Of course, there are also great opportunities for short-term help in the form of kitchen workers, singers, Christmas decorators, ushers, greeters, or scripture readers as well. Volunteers, no matter the duration of the task, help make the many ministries of First Congregational UCC possible.

As the temperatures fall and snow inevitably makes its way into our vocabulary, I hope you and yours remain warm, healthy, and safe!



Watch three short videos simply titled **Parables** with the kids in your life, then spend some time letting them explain them back to you. You might be surprised how well they'll understand! Here's what you can expect:

Join an exciting animated series where kids experience the powerful parables of Jesus! Watch as the wise builder's house stands firm in the storm, the lost sheep is joyfully found, and the Good Samaritan shows kindness to a stranger. Through engaging stories, colorful animation, and valuable life lessons, children will discover faith, love, and the power of doing what is right!

The Council met in Heritage Hall at 5:45 PM. Moderator Kay Campe called the meeting to order, and Pastor Cory led in prayer.

Motion to approve the minutes from the meeting on 9-17-2025, was M/S/C. (Catherine Johnson/Amanda Forstrom)

Treasurer's Report Catherine Johnson reported that the 4th account was opened at Edward Jones. The plan is to add \$100/month for 20 months. We are at 62% of budget received at the end of September. A motion to receive the treasurer's report was M/S/C. (Amanda Forstrom/Cynthia Celander)

Pastor's Report: Pastor Cory summarized his many activities for the month.

BOARD REPORTS:

Christian Education: No representative. They did not meet in October. Sunday school and confirmation classes have begun.

Hospitality: Rebecca Lunz reported they are planning the Stewardship Potluck and will request \$1200 for their proposed budget for next year.

Facilities: No representative. They feel a 10% increase in all budget items is necessary.

Diaconate: No representative. They did not meet in October.

Mission: Amanda Forstrom said that the September Blessing Box raised \$560 for Neighbors in Need. Rob Stauter is speaking for CREST on November 2nd. We will contribute to a couple of families for the Toys for Tots Christmas Tree. The ditch cleanup was very successful.

Worship: Cindy Huset stated they are planning the Christmas decorating after church on November 23rd. They are asking to increase the amount in the proposed budget for 2026's pulpit supply. Nametags are working well.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Stewardship: The Stewardship Ingathering & Potluck will be on Sunday, November 9th.

Budget: All budget proposals are due to Church Treasurer on November 14th. The budget meeting will be on December 2nd with meal at 5:30 PM and meeting at 6:00 PM.

Nominating: Cynthia is working on it.


Personnel: Meeting in October.

Hy-Vee & Fareway Report as of Report as of 19 October 2025

During the last 4 weeks, \$11,014.39 (5.51%) worth of Hy-Vee slips were received. After 45 weeks, Hy-Vee is at \$182,521.29 (91.26%) toward the 18th goal which is \$200,000 and maybe reached around the end of November 2025.

During the same time, \$4,294.69 (2.86%) worth of Fareway slips were received. After 132 weeks, Fareway is at \$141,971.23 (94.65%) toward our 5th \$150,000 goal. It could take 11 weeks to reach the 5th \$150,000 goal and maybe reached around the middle of December 2025.

Any Fairmont Fareway and Hy-Vee food store register slip or deliver pages can be used. Slips from Hy-Vee Fast & Fresh (Gas), Coffee Shop, Food Service, and Pharmacy help us toward the goal. During this time, one slip from Fast & Fresh was only \$0.18 = enough points to get 20 gallons of free gas. Yes, even that helps to reach the goal. Thanks to all who are turning in their slips.



Shopper's Luncheon Ham Loaves

with Agnes Metcalf's Shopper's Luncheon Mustard Sauce

MAKES: 20-25 LOAVES

Ingredients

Loaves:

4 lb. ham

2 lb. pork

4 eggs

2 C. bread crumbs

1 C. tomato puree

1 C. tomato juice

Mustard Sauce:

2 eggs

1 C. brown sugar

½ C. cider vinegar

½ C. water

2 Tbsp. dry mustard

1 tsp. salt

2 rounded tsp. flour

Directions

For the loaves:

- 1. Grind ham and pork together.
- 2. Add beaten eggs and the rest of the ingredients for the loaves.
- 3. Form into desired size individual loaves.
- 4. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees Fahrenheit) for about 35 45 minutes.

For the mustard sauce:

- 1. Beat eggs, add the rest of the ingredients for the mustard sauce.
- 2. Cook in a double boiler until thickened.
- 3. It's a good idea to strain the sauce through a strainer after cooking.

The Shopper's Luncheon Ham Loaves with Agnes Metcalf's Mustard Sauce were served many years at First Congregational's Harvest Festival each fall. This year they were served at the Progressive Dinner. These two recipes from the Women's Association can be found in the <u>Feeding Our Flock</u> cookbook
