Also, the OMTRA is trying something new for the Chadwick enduro. An ATV class! It should be interesting.

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


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CROSSTIMBERS


The Okie Dirt Riders put on their umpteenth million enduro at the Draper Lake ORV area Oct. 7. It was a good event. The ground was a little dry. It was dusty in the open areas. The morning sun made it difficult to see at times. But the temperature was great.

There were very few places on the course where you could rest. The first check was about six miles out and tested you until the first reset at 10.7. This process repeated three more times until the gas available, for a total of four tests before the gas stop. And short course riders went out for one more test. And all were glad. It was a great six mile single track. I'm glad the short course riders got to ride it.

Long course wasn't that much longer, only about 15 miles at 24 mph, including much of the first part of the course with a few trail changes.

Overall winners usually get all the press. But, usually, they have an uneventful race and go really fast. Really kind of boring. Dan Villars had a really interesting day. He got out of the Port-A-Potty with five minutes to go before he was scheduled to leave the line. The bike wouldn't start. He tried bump starting down a hill. I went to Chadwick the other day and took someone who had not ridden an off-road motorcycling in a very long time with me. I've been working on a computer system for Tracker Marine for some time with David Portugal. As I said, David has not ridden off-road in a long time, but that doesn't mean he doesn't know anything about motorcycling. You see, he rides his Gold Wing from Chicago to Springfield to work on this project.

We were trying to wrap up the project and David stayed in Springfield for the weekend. I told him that if I worked both Saturday and Sunday, I'd go nuts. So we took off Sunday for some rocks, roots and dirt.

Our first loop was 101 end to end with an excursion to Stump Spring. He did good, no crashes. But he said that his street bike skills didn't translate very well to the dirt.

It was on 101 that we met Max and Daniel Harkey coming the other way. It was the highlight of David's trip.

After a short break, we took off to ride the north half of Chadwick. We started off on 106. Let me refresh your memory of 106. As you get to the end of 106, the trail drops down a pretty steep hill. Well, David gets a little off balance. He managed to catch the bike before he and it fell over. But he was stuck. He was off the left side of the bike, the down hill side. He couldn't jump back on the bike or jump off the bike. As Ed Hertfelder said, he was trying to think pleasant thoughts. We got him going again, but wow.

crash (of course by saying it was his first crash, there has to be at least one more!) But, really, the crash was pretty mild by any standard. Too much front brake on a switch back in loose gravel.

135 T's into 113 at the fencerow. There is this little section of rock steps. (The site of David's second crash!) David said, "They looked a lot worse from the bottom." Unfortunately, a little anti-freeze was dripping out. This was with a skid plate! Luckily, he just pushed the coolant hose up a little. Leak stopped.

I showed mercy on David and we took 110 back to Camp Ridge Campground. After a short break, it was time to head back to the enduro pavilion. The hills on the trails between the campgrounds were the toughest of the day, and David was starting to look right at home.

According to David, we are pretty lucky to have a place like Chadwick to ride. There isn't anyplace to ride off road vehicles any where around Chicago. David said, "If there was a place to ride like this within a couple hours of Chicago, I would have a dirt bike. And one for my son, too!"
