Second Grade News



November had a great start by going to mass on All Saints Day. We celebrated the Saints with a special project and visits from the upper grades sharing Saint history with us. During this month, we have been busy in all subject areas. In Religion, the class had the opportunity to visit with

Sister Esmeralda and the sisters from the Virgo Magnificat Convent in West Greenwich, RI. They talked about the upcoming Advent season and made a beautiful Advent wreath for our classroom. In class, we learned about the seven sacraments and living in faith as well as Gratitude.

In Language and Literacy, we had lessons about distinguishing between realism and fantasy literature. #### **Grade 5 News**

November has been a very busy and eventful month for 5th grade! Grade 5 has been learning so many new things. We are learning about explorers in Social Studies and recently finished completing our explorer reports as well as many other things. It has been so amazing and rewarding to see the talent from each and every student and how creative they can be!

We have completed the next few topics and units in all of our subjects - Religion, Vocabulary and Language Arts. We are always reminded to be a follower of Jesus, especially during our Circle of Grace lesson, where every student learned many new and important things to follow. We also recently had a test on chapter 2 in Science, which was all about cells.

During math, we have been working hard on addition and subtraction properties as well as their rules. We also have been learning estimating, and addition with three or more addends. This has been a fun topic especially since the students can relate this to real life while shopping! We recently had a homework assignment which included the students finding prices of food that we can eat on Thanksgiving and showing how we can add them using the properties and tools that we have learned in class! This will be helpful for the students to use while they are holiday shopping.

November has definitely flown by, and we cannot wait for December which means the holiday season, yay! Grade 5 is patiently waiting for an elf to join the classroom. I hope that everyone had a wonderful Thanksgiving and has a healthy and happy holiday, and New Year!

#### MIDDLE SCHOOL NEWS

Middle School Science- All three grades learned about and reviewed safety and equipment in the science lab so we could begin to use it. Our first lab consisted of the process of water traveling through living things. We used celery, baby's breath, lettuce and carnations. We cut the items on an angle and placed them in glass containers with water and food coloring. After 24 hours the students observed the changes and found that each item turned the color of the food coloring, they were placed in. The students all did very well with this lab and I am excited to get them in there for bigger and more intricate labs.



Middle School Math- All three grades still continue their life skills assignment weekly. This past month they were given the opportunity to work overtime or go to a concert with friends. They also had to deal with getting a flat tire on the way to work and the cost of it.

Our class store will begin after Thanksgiving break. This will not be a store to purchase real items. The students will be learning how to make change on top of their specific grade assignments.

#### Grade 6

Math: The sixth grade has been working hard on estimating products in the hundreds and thousands place. They will begin to incorporate this skill into making change for our class store that we will have after Thanksgiving break.

Religion: The students are just about to finish Chapter 4 where they are learning about the effects of Original Sin; and how ever since, humanity has struggled tremendously and continued to fall away from God. Some of the circumstances and stories that the class has gone over are: Cain and Abel, Noah and the ark, and the tower of Babel. In this upcoming chapter they will learn about their ancestors in faith.

Skills: The class is just about done preparing for their first Unit cumulative exam. They have been doing so well in their preparations, that I have no worries concerning their success. Once complete they will be back on their standard vocabulary training plan.

**Social Studies**: We are wrapping up our unit on Ancient Egypt and Nubia. Students will be taking their chapter 3 test next Friday, and will be given class time to study and review.

Literature: We have started reading the next book in the "Ascension Trilogy", the "Runaway King." Prince Jaron is now King, and he needs to come up with a plan to prevent Carthya from falling into a civil war.

#### Grade 7

Math: The seventh grade has been multiplying integers and will begin multiplying decimals after Thanksgiving break. This skill will help them when working with money in our class store.

Religion: The class is just finishing up learning about the first part of the Gospel message. That they were created by, with, though, and for love; and because of that God formed a covenant with humankind, and revealed ways to be faithful to that covenant. After being tested on this material they will step into learning about the next two pieces of the Gospel that can be summarized in two words: captured and rescued.

**Skills:** The class is finished with their first unit exam and is now on to some new material. Like 8<sup>th</sup> grade it will be a nice change of scenery getting back to the single chapters again.

Social Studies: We have been looking at colonial America and are comparing the differences between the New England, Middle, and Southern colonies. We are also comparing the difference between Royal, Proprietary, and Charter colonies. Ask your child what a charter is, and ask them about the Magna Carta!

Literature: In keeping with our Social Studies content, we are still reading the Witch of Blackbird Pond. Students are seeing examples of things we've discussed in history, such as King Charles I and the Connecticut Charter, reflected in this work of historical fiction.

#### Grade 8

Math: The eighth grade has been working with multiplying integers and will begin multiplying decimals after Thanksgiving break. This skill will help them when working with money in our class store.

Religion: The class has just finished Chapter 4 where they learned about the obligations and challenges the Great Commandment and the first three commandments of the decalogue place on us. The Ten Commandments teach us how to relate lovingly to God and one another. The first three commandments reveal to us who God is and how we are to respond to His love. By studying each of these commandments the students have not only learned how to love God more fittingly, but they also have learned more specific ways to follow the teaching of Jesus in the Great Commandment. In this next chapter they will be taking a deeper dive into understanding how to best live out the fourth, fifth, and sixth commandments.

**Skills:** The class has just finished their first Unit, or cumulative exam and are now on to the next unit of words. It will be a nice change of pace getting back to single chapters with only sets of 20 words, rather than going over large numbers of previously learned words.

Social Studies: We have been looking at the dissolution of the Union, and the events leading up to the Civil War. Students have been looking at election maps, political cartoons, and primary sources. Ask your child who the "little giant" was.

**Literature**: We are finishing up reading Little Women. We will close out this unit with some book report activities, and will also be watching some of the film versions of the book in class.
