Since its formation in 2014, the Fort Myers Police Foundation has raised more than \$150,000 that has gone toward purchasing medical kits for patrol cars, ballistic shields, electronic ear protection for shooting ranges, a Meggitt FATS® L7 compact training simulator, a K-9 and more.

The Fort Myers Police Foundation is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization whose goal is to help build a stronger bond between the community and its local police department. All funds raised by the Police Foundation go toward purchasing lifesaving equipment for the Fort Myers Police Department and the community it serves.

Friends of the Six Mile Cypress Slough Preserve is again hosting off the boardwalk wet walks on a trail that is closed to the public. The invigorating, beautiful path is immersed in the watery heart of the slough. Group size limited to 16. A \$10 donation to the Friends Education Fund is suggested. A reservation is required.

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Attire: long pants, secure shoes that won't pull off (e.g., no Crocs, flip-flops, flimsy shoes), and bring a change of clothing (changing rooms are available). Guests with improper shoes will not be allowed on the trail, per Parks and Recreation safety rules. You'll be encountering many submerged roots and occasional cypress knees, so you'll want to be protected. If you have trouble walking or have poor balance, skip the wet walk. The elevated wooden walkway is more easily negotiated. The wet walk trail is not for guests who need assistance, or have trouble with knees, ankles or balance.

Guests must be at least 10 years old because of the possible water depth.

We'll be walking in fresh, clean rainwater, usually up to our waists. You will exit wet but not muddy, and we have a rinse off hose. Your clothing will later dry out and can be reused. Usually there's no need for insect repellent because the slough water is constantly flowing and mosquitoes need stagnant water to breed. Rarely, there are a few mosquitoes that arrive from off site. This trail has been safely enjoyed for over 45 years by tens of thousands of walkers. You will not have any problems with wildlife.

Children's

We meet under the parking lot pavilion. Waterproof cameras are best, and expect everything to get wet. I can store any electronic car keys safely in a dry, secure room. We will wait for fleeting lightning storms to pass but tropical storms or continuous harsh weather will cause a cancellation. Light rain is not a problem, and as you may know, Florida weather changes quickly.

Please allow time to visit the amazing Interpretive Center on site. Hours are Tuesday through Sunday, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. It has a wonderful display of photo contest winning images, a gift shop with unique treasures, and the interpretive exhibits are top quality. You'll really enjoy the interactive displays.

A Donation Can Change A Life

We often hear people say to us, "Sorry, this is all I can afford" when making Advocacy Center a donation. But you

should never underestimate how significant your donation may be.

That box of diapers may help a teen mother without the funds to provide for her baby; that bag of stuffed animals goes toward providing comfort to child victims of physical and sexual abuse; and something as simple as a journal can be life-changing for some of our clients.

Not too long ago, an Sasha Navas email was sent by CAC's

development director to the staff advising them of a donation of varied decorative journals in her office and available for them to give to their clients. Here is the experience one of our therapists, Sasha Navas, had with two of her clients, as relayed to the development director:

"I just wanted to take a moment to thank you personally for the journals you offered the Family Alliance therapists some weeks

ago. When I responded to your email, I chose four journals thinking they would come in handy someday. Well, someday has come twice in less than one month. Both times, the journals were used not only as a therapeutic tool, but also to build rapport and give the teen girls a safe place to express their feelings whenever they could not talk to me.

"One said she was unable to talk to me 'whenever I need to' - so her journal is now one of her most cherished possessions; so much so, that she has the buy-in of her father and stepmother, who once rushed it to therapy full of apologies for initially forgetting it. Our agreement was never that she read it to me, but rather that she show me she is using it.

"My other teen actually handed me her journal, truly a sacred moment in therapy, especially for a teenager. We 'exchanged' journals. I handed her a new one (provided by you) to replace the old – the old thoughts, the old feelings, the old experiences – with new moments and memories. She also brings it proudly to her appointments.

"I hope these stories convey the depth of gratitude I have for such a journal that, at first, seemed like a simple gift but has made such profound headway in healing."

1 or 2 cans oysters

Salt and pepper to taste

½ cup onion, diced fine

1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce 6 cups milk

1 tablespoon butter

In a medium soup pot, add the milk, oysters, salt, pepper, onions, and Worcestershire sauce. Bring to a slow boil, then simmer until onions are tender. I simmer for about an hour very low. Add butter and allow to melt. Serve with oyster crackers. Serves 4 to 5.

Oyster Stew With Vegetables

12 to 18 fresh oysters

3 potatoes, cubed

2 to 3 stalks of celery, diced

1 medium yellow onion, diced

2 cups half and half 2 cups milk

1 cup chicken broth

2 tablespoons freshly chopped parsley

Salt and pepper to taste

1/4 teaspoon thyme

Pinch of garlic powder

¹/₄ cup of cornstarch for thickener (optional)

Sauté diced vegetables and spices in chicken broth. Add milk and half and half. Heat until warm. Do not boil. Stir in drained oysters and simmer for 25 to 30 minutes. Add cornstarch slowly continually stirring to desired thickness. If it is thick enough, do not add more. Serves 4 to 5.

Catch The Action

Summer Challenge

The heat of summer can be challenging on the inshore waters. Here are a couple options to change things up a little.

If you just want to have fun and maybe a little fishing while relaxing then the beaches are a good choice, especially if you are fishing with the family. Good numbers of snook are roaming the surf throughout the summer and are a sight fisherman's dream. The waters from Blind Pass north to Boca Grande have remained relatively

clear and at times the fish are so focused on the bait pods it's been pretty easy to get close enough to make an easy presentation.

Most snook are running 22 to 26 inches, but there are much bigger ones. Free lined pilchards, small pinfish, one-eighth-ounce white bucktail jigs and a variety of small white flies are top baits. Look for the fish right off the edge of the beach in the surf or near any type of submerged structure. Remember snook are catch and release only. Trout, mangrove snapper, whiting, pompano and maybe a tarpon are a few of the other species you may hook into. Fish a little; swim a little, not a bad way to spend the day.

Summer days often give us flat calm seas over the morning hours, perfect for short runs offshore. Our coastline is dotted with man-made artificial reefs, many well within sight of land and GPS coordinates available to the public. If you are an inshore fisherman it's a nice change of pace to make a short run offshore, especially during the heat of summer when the inshore water temperatures are so high.

One cool aspect when fishing around the reefs is you never know what you might hook into. Everything



from a small snapper to 500-pound goliath grouper calls them home. To get the most out of the day you want an assortment of tackle that can handle the fish you target. Obviously with snapper you do not need super heavy tackle, the lighter the better for the best action. But, if you want to attempt to pull a big goliath grouper from his home you will need a rig extra heavy, we're talking 200- to 400-pound line. And many times that's not heavy enough.

In between snapper and goliaths there's the possibility to hook Spanish and king mackerel, cobia, permit, barracuda, snook, sharks of all sizes, plus many other species. Many anglers fish several different line class rods at a time targeting more than one species.

Armed with a variety of baits is the best way to catch multiple species. Small baits like shrimp, pilchards, and small pinfish are great for snapper and other bottom fish, larger live bait is often the ticket for a big barracuda, snook, or gag grouper, and big bait, dead or alive is the choice for goliaths. If you want to catch a permit you need live crabs, this is often the best bait for cobia as well. Anchoring up current of the structure with a quality block of chum is the best way to bring the action behind the boat.

Whatever type of fishing or outdoor excursion you choose, be smart, drink plenty of water, and watch those thunderstorms.

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Tips From South Trail Fire And Rescue

Fire Safe Away From Home

Are you or is someone in your family planning to travel in the near future? We know that we are responsible for the fire safety of our family in our own home; we also need to take steps to ensure our fire safety when we are away from

home. The following tips and resources will help keep you and your family safe wherever you are.

There are two overarching fire safety rules to follow when making decisions about your lodging, i.e., where you will be sleeping for one night or for many nights. Rule number one is that your lodging be protected by a working smoke alarm and preferably by a sprinkler system as well. Rule number two is that you have two ways out in case of a fire.

Before you leave home, check the U.S. Fire Administration website at **usfa.fema.gov/hotel/** for hotels and motels that comply with the Hotel and Motel Fire Safety Act of 1990, requiring smoke alarms and fire sprinklers in each guest room. If the hotel is not listed on the website, call the hotel and ask about the facility's fire protection system.

When you check in to your hotel and enter your room, first review the posted escape plan. Next, find the exits and count the number of doors between your room and the exit. Ensure that the exits are unlocked. During your stay, if the fire alarm sounds, exit immediately if it is safe to do so, and take your room key with you. Use the stairs, not the elevator.

Nowadays many travelers opt for staying at private lodgings booked through online rental sites. Private lodgings are not generally subject to the same fire and life safety code enforcement of commercial lodgings, so it is important to verify when you book that the lodging complies with the two tenets of fire safety – smoke alarms and two ways out.

When you arrive at a private lodging, before you unpack, check for working smoke alarms in every bedroom and on every level of the house. Push the test button to make sure that the smoke alarm works. Then check that you have two ways out of the house and two ways out of every bedroom – your second way out of the bedroom will probably be a window. Make sure that all exits open and are accessible and clear of furnishings, storage, etc.

If you are traveling out of the country or if you have a college student in your family studying abroad for the semester, ensure that you preplan for fire safety. A valuable resource for students abroad, is the Jasmine Jahanshahi Fire Safety Foundation at **firesafetyfoundation.org.** In April 2011, a fast moving fire in her Paris apartment building took the life of Jasmine and three other exchange students. The foundation established in Jasmine's name provides fire safety education, smoke alarms, fire extinguishers, and escape ladders to students studying abroad. The foundation website also lists the emergency phone numbers for many countries, for example, the emergency number in the United Kingdom is 999.

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

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What's Blooming At Edison & Ford Winter Estates?

Many people plant solely for the visual appeal of vibrant flowers. Those flowers can also have amazing aromas for gardeners to enjoy and provide food for pollinators, such as bees and butterflies. Plant essences are even used



to help relieve stress. For me, many fragrances remind me of a time spent in my grandmother's garden. Perhaps there is a plant that brings back happy memories for you.

When Mina Edison developed the moonlight garden at the Edison & Ford Winter Estates, not only did she plant white flowers to reflect the moonlight, but she made sure many of the plants were fragrant. The *Gardenia jasminoides* or a variety recently introduced to me, Tahitian Gardenia, are two examples. These beautiful shrubs with daytime fragrant blooms make perfect cut flowers to place inside vases around your home. Mina also planted nighttime fragrant plants such as Angel trumpet (*Brugmansia*) and Lady of the Night (*Brunfelsia*). These, along with many other notable plants are still growing on the site and bloom

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on and off all year long, putting on a great show throughout the summer months.

Other fragrant plants on my "got to have list" include antique roses with a scent reminiscent of my grandmother's tea rose perfume. There are many named varieties of roses growing in the Edison and Ford rose gardens. The ones introduced from the 1800s to the early 1900s were Tea, China or Bourbon roses. A few of my favorite fragrant ones include Spicy, a Spice rose from Bermuda; Duchess du Brabant, a classic Tea rose introduced in 1871; and Souvenir de St. Anne's, a Bourbon rose introduced in 1916. These roses are perfect in an amended garden plot and useful as cut specimens placed in a vase. I have also used them in bridal bouquets, much to the bride's delight.

With the recent summer rains, the passion flower (*Passiflora incarnata*) is passionately blooming magnificent lavender flowers. It's a host plant to three different butterfly species that lay their eggs on the leaves. When the eggs hatch, very hungry caterpillars emerge and eat the leaves until they are large enough to wind into a chrysalis and metamorphose into a beautiful butterfly, such as a Julia, zebra longwing or Gulf fritillary.

The Chinese perfume tree (*Aglaia odorata*) is another plant that displays amazingly fragrant blooms during the summer months. There is a great specimen in the moonlight garden that is more like a large shrub than a typical tree, planted near a shaded bench. When it blooms, it's covered with hundreds of tiny white balls the size of a pinhead with an aroma that compares to an expensive, delicate perfume.

Not to be outdone, the almond bush (*Alyosia virgata*), which is more of a tree than a bush grows to about 10 feet tall and is draped with white, tail-like blooms. Many visitors to the Edison Ford Gardens often ask where the delightful fragrance is coming from and I point to the almond bush.

Another great summer flower is the Crinum lily. Planted throughout the Edison Ford site, it was one of Mina Edison's favorite flowers. The flower stalks rise above the green strap foliage of these easy-to-grow, heat-loving plants. The bulb looks like an onion, but it is not edible. The best varieties are the Stars and Stripes, Orange River and St. Christopher's Lily. These all have white, pink-striped, tulip-like blooms. The plant spreads easily, so gardeners can divide and share the bulbs with others. The Edison Ford Garden Shoppe sells many Crinum lily varieties that are not easily found in other nurseries.

All plants have a time to bloom and a time to grow, depending on the climatic conditions of the year. There are always plants and trees blooming at the Edison Ford gardens. Mina Edison created a roadmap of sorts of the flowers she planted in her garden. Today, we still plant some of her favorites, continuing the passion for future generations. The Edison Ford Garden Shoppe has a wide variety of flowering plants and trees available for purchase, many of which are unusual and hard-to-find specimens.

Plant something new this summer so that you can watch each day to see what's blooming in your garden!

Lee County Yard Waste Regulations

- Do not place out for pickup more than 24 hours early
- Yard waste must be containerized (50 pounds or less), or securely tied into bundles not heavier than 50 pounds and no longer than 6 feet in length.
- Up to 50 pounds of unbundled palm fronds may be placed at the curb. Any excess palm fronds must be tied into bundles, each weighing 50 pounds or less.



- When using plastic bags, make sure that the contents can be easily identified by the refuse truck driver (leave a twig or small branch sticking out).
- Call 239-337-0800 for a cost estimate for large-scale yard waste disposal projects when containerizing or bundling is difficult.



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
