Notes on Spokes In Memory of Marvin Pruitt J

The off-road racing community lost a great friend this past Memorial Day with the passing of Marvin Pruitt. Known by his family and friends as a kind and gentle man, Marvin will truly be missed.

Marvin, his wife, Sue, and their sons, Jeff and David, were well known on the local motocross circuit in the 70's. Both Jeff and David were accomplished racers. Additionally, Marvin and his sons were regulars at Chadwick. It wasn't unusual for them to ride Chadwick on Saturdays before a motocross race on Sunday.

Marvin was an accomplished hare scramble racer as well. It was commonplace to see Marvin, along with his riding buddies Dave Deck, Racer Smith, Duck Edwards and others, bench-racing, laughing and enjoying themselves in the pits prior to the race. Marvin was no doubt providing many of the stories causing the laughter. On the race course, Marvin was extremely smooth as he was a naturally talented rider. However, while a serious competitor, he was just as much a gentleman on the course as he was in every day life. He proudly hung his Ozark Mountain Hare Scrambles Series' "2nd Overall Senior Class" plaque that he won in the mid 80's. After his racing days were over, you would see him riding at Chadwick almost every weekend. I was constantly amazed at the speed

Marvin had at the age where most guys had long given up riding. After Marvin stopped riding, he remained on the racing scene and regularly served as a scorer at our local hare scramble races.

Back in the late eighties, many of us racers hung out at the former Springfield Honda shop nearly every evening after work and on Saturdays, bench racing with Marvin. No doubt, this was as much fun as racing itself. Part of the lure was hanging with Marvin. You could always count on a great racing story from him.

After a longtime career at Dayco, Marvin worked at Jim Moon Yamaha, Springfield Honda and, most recently, Springfield Suzuki/ Kawasaki. "Marvin never bad-mouthed the competition," stated Jerry Sharp, one of Marvin's many friends and the promoter of our local hare scramble series. That characteristic, along with many others, made Marvin a great employee. "Not only did we lose an excellent employee," said Jerry "J.J." Johnson, owner of Springfield Suzuki/Kawasaki. "We lost a real friend and a good person. Marvin will be sorely missed by everyone who knew or came in contact with him."

Longtime friend Mel Gere, owner of Action Cycle, recalls the first time he met Marvin. "I remember him walking into the shop just like it

was yesterday," recalls Mel. "He was in his early thirties and he was looking for an air filter for his Kawasaki Green Streak. I fixed him up and we began talking about our kids' mini bikes. The rest is history." That "history" included many years of attending races together, taking family vacations together and developing a great friendship.

Losing Marvin has been tough. Tough on his wife, his sons, his family and his friends. We lost a darn good friend. At 58 years old, he was just too young to go. But we know that Marvin is in a better place, bringing a laugh to those who are with him. Over the last year, it was a tough ride for Marvin. Chadwick Stuff

I have just received a couple of things from the forest service. First was the quarterly schedule of environmental analysis being considered for the Ava/ Cassville/Willow Springs Ranger District. And second was a proposed amendment to the Mark Twain Forest Land and Resource Management Plan in the areas of recreation, heritage resources, visual management and fisheries.

The quarterly schedule is nothing new. They are still planning on moving some of the trails out of the creeks. Once the new trails are created, old trails will be closed. You can see where the new trails are going to go by the pink ribbons strung from the trees. At least you could see the ribbons before the leaves came out.

The amendment of the Mark Twain Forest Land and Resource Management Plan is split into four areas; recreation, heritage resources, visual management and fisheries. I'll try and interpret this rather large document. I am by no means an expert or even remotely qualified at summarizing a document of this nature. In fact, this document makes some of my computer stuff look like light reading.

Proposed changes to the recreation resources program will expand the emphasis to include a goal of providing quality developed sites to meet the needs and desires of the recreating public while protecting the other resources, and meeting other agency goals. They are going to add direction to make investments in recreation that are needed to meet the needs and desires of the public being served by the facility and to provide visitor information.

The heritage resources program encompasses any-



thing in the national forest that people have done in the past. I don't think this area is going to have any impact on the Chadwick OHV/ATV area, if they consider the fact that motorcycles have been riding on those trails for thirty years.


The Visual Management System, which is being updated to the new nationwide Scenery Management System, basically covers how things look. It takes into account the view from travelways and use areas. The old system allowed a temporary reduction in visual quality, but the use of clearcuts have been gradually reduced over the last ten or twelve years. Consequently, allowing a temporary reduction in visual quality is no longer needed.

And finally, the proposed addition of Fish Management/Aquatic Ecosystems Management subsection covers maintaining populations of fish. I don't know if this is going to affect Chadwick riding area or not.

A copy of the proposed amendment to the Mark Twain Forest Land and Resource Management Plan was included. When I reviewed it, I noticed it mentions ATV/OHV Use under the Recreation Management section. And it states:

ATV/OHV use is prohibited in this area except for the following:

- 1. Use on designed ATV/OHV travelways which provide access to and from developed sites and parking areas.
- 2. Administrative use, access by emer-

gency vehicles or use authorized by permit of contract.

3. On designated trails or in accordance with State or County law and regulations.

Of course the trails at Chadwick are designated trails. And nowhere in the stuff I received did I see anything to do with changing the designation of the trails.

In closing, any comments needed to be postmarked, faxed or received orally by the close of business on June 28, 1999. Of course, it is already past this date. Even after reading this, I don't know if this is going to hurt off-roading or not.





Arkansas State Hare Scramble Series

Pocohontas (Maynard) June 8

Race place Maynard Arkansas: due to a last minute change from Pocohonas to Maynard, the 5.8-mile course had to be one of the top super speedways of hare scrambles. Top hair raising speeds of over 60 mph for up to $\frac{1}{2}$ mile at a time. This put lap times some where between thirteen and sixteen minutes.

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
