A Message from Pastor Robert.....

Brothers and sisters in Christ,

I am huge fan of Star Trek, particularly the Next Generation series which ran during my teen years. Besides the characters, cool new worlds, and species that are introduced throughout the series, what drew me back week after week was seeing how these characters would deal with a situation that challenged their set moral code. Just in case you don't know anything about Star Trek, all the Characters are part of a group called "Starfleet" who are explorers in the future guided by what is called "The Prime Directive" which dictates how they should deal with new species they encounter. Alongside this they are all part of a multispecies society where everything is shared and they do their best to settle disputes between various people in order to avoid violent conflicts. In nearly every episode they are presented with situations that cause them to question this strict moral code by which they live and must learn to resolve the issue by either using that code, finding a way around it, or breaking it. No matter how the situation resolves there are both positive and negative consequences that our protagonists have to deal with, and while many of the situations may seem bizarre from our 21st century perspective, each situation is rooted in moral dilemmas that nearly all human beings encounter, or at least read about, throughout their lives.

- What happens if our moral code causes an innocent person to get hurt?
- What if we are called to do no violence, yet there is someone out there who must be stopped from hurting others?
- How do we discern between solutions where one solution resolves immediate issues, yet may cause long term issues, or a solution that may cause harm in the short term but help in the long term?
- How do we deal with those who do not share our moral code, yet we must somehow get along?
- How do we deal with situations that call our moral code into question? Do we adapt or dig our heals in?
- How should we deal with these and other questions? Well before I try to answer any of those questions I would like to bring up another TV show that just ended its run a few years ago, Breaking Bad. If you are unfamiliar with this show its basic concept revolves around the idea of how a seemingly normal person could potentially become an evil person without fully realizing it. The story focuses on a middle aged high school science teacher who is diagnosed with terminal cancer and is looking for a way to make sure his family is financially

secure after he passes. This leads him into the business of manufacturing and selling Methamphetamines. As he falls deeper and deeper into the drug world doing things he never thought himself capable of he keeps finding justification for his actions in the idea that all of this is for his family. This program provides a great (though extreme) example regarding how someone when working in isolation can easily find excuses as to why they should compromise their beliefs. Sure the protagonist does have family and friends he could look to for support, but he keeps them all in the dark as to what his true purposes are, thus only trusting his own judgment. In contrast to this the characters in Star Trek do everything as a community, and it is when one of them decides to act out of self-interest rather than the good of the community that the

For me these two programs help reinforce the Bible's teachings about being accountable toward each other, such as: Two are better than one, because they have a good reward for their toil. For if they fall, one will lift up the other; but woe to one who is alone and falls and does not have another to help. Again, if two lie together, they keep warm; but how can one keep warm alone? And though one might prevail against another, two will withstand one. A threefold cord is not quickly broken.-Ecclesiastes 4:9-12

I can't count the amount of times I have heard people tell me, "I already know Jesus, I don't need to go to Church." Unfortunately knowing Jesus is different than being a follower of Christ, and to be a follower of Christ one must be a part of a faith community. As a community we hold each other accountable to the faith based morality that we all share. When people attempt to follow Jesus on their own it is too easy to continually compromise their beliefs to the point where Jesus stands up for everything we want him to stand up for, rather than what Christ actually stands for. Accountability and community are essential in our lives as Christians and it is empowering to see us starting to come back together and I look forward to seeing where this community goes together into the future.

Or in other words: This is Burke Lutheran church, continuing its already 170 year mission, to spread Gods love, to new people, and new communities, to boldly proclaim God's love in ways nobody has done before! *cue theme music*

Burke Lutheran Church Endowment Foundation 2020

The foundation met three times during 2020.

- The foundation provided financial assistance to two individuals.
- Articles of Incorporation and By-laws were reviewed and updated.
- The foundation provided a loan to the church for up to \$100,000 for the new building.
- The foundation will continue to honor its \$10,000/year towards the building fund as part of the \$50,000 commitment (Year 3).

Treasurer's Report - 2020

I am happy to report that despite the global pandemic, we ran our 2020 general operating budget at a surplus of \$16,697. Expenses ran about \$35,000 under budget and contributions were up by about \$12,000. Thank you to everyone who responded to our funding concerns. Here are a few things to note:

- 1. General Fund contributions increased by \$11,583 (8.4%).
- 2. We received \$19,508 from the federal PPP fund.
- 3. Through judicious spending, expenses ran under budget by \$35,102.
- 4. We operated at a surplus of \$16,697.
- 5. Our payroll was approximately 59% of general revenue. (2019 was 67%, 2018 was 72%)
- 6. We had \$108,530 of undesignated funds in the bank as-of Dec 31. (Up \$15,111 from last year)
- 7. The building fund had \$41,780 on hand on Dec 31.
- 8. We have paid out \$1,793,438 so far, for the church remodel/relocation project.
- 9. All budgeted benevolences have been paid.
- 10. All pass-thru contributions have been remitted to their beneficiaries.
- 11. Our books and records are maintained in "Church 360" a web-hosted site, which is working well.

Our 2021 projects include:

- 1. Appeal to members for help in meeting financial goals.
- 2. Continuing attention to expense management.
- 3. Completion of the building project.
- 4. Selling the surplus land.

Gratitude is owed to Tim Sandridge who has devoted many hours to the job of Financial Secretary, entering all the contributions into the accounting records. Tim has recently turned over the job to Kim Hanson, who has been doing well at it.

Behind this report is a 2020 Income & Expense Statement, a Chart of Account Balances, and a summary sheet comparing 2013, 2014, 2015, 2016, 2017, 2018, 2019, 2020. A complete set of all accounting records has been provided to the Council Secretary for inclusion in the permanent archive.


