

A Message from Pastor Chris

10 hours and 11 minutes. This is roughly how much daylight there will be in Shiner, TX on December 21, 2022. Sunset will be at 5:35PM. It will be the Winter Solstice. In the Northern Hemisphere, this is the shortest day or the longest night. The term "solstice" comes from the Latin words *sol* (Sun) and *sistere* (to stand still) because the angle between the Sun's rays and the plane of the Earth's equator appears to stand still. The Sun appears at its lowest in the sky.

Seasons come and go. Did you know that the church also has seasons? This Quarterly Newsletter is published during the Advent Season. It's the first season in the church, and its color is blue. During Advent, the church lights candles and patiently waits for the birth of Jesus. It's a time of anticipation. Advent ends with Christmas and then moves into the green season of Epiphany.

I am convinced that congregations just like ours have seasons as well. There are times when our church will feel blue, like it's in the Winter Solstice and there's more darkness than light. At other times, our church will feel bright red like everything is exciting, new, and maybe even chaotic like on the Day of Pentecost when the Holy Spirit came. Life is like that; life has its seasons.

And of course, your life has seasons, too – seasons that may not always coincide with the seasons of your neighbors or even your spouse or family. You will go through seasons at your own pace and in your own time.

The temptation is to rush through seasons. No more can the church speed up the purple penitential season of Lent so to get to the white joyous season of Easter, neither can you rush through a season of grieving or waiting. Part of good spiritual health is intentionality. You want to act with intent. Don't just react. God created both the light and the darkness in the Genesis 1. We need both just like we need the seasons.

I'll tell you short story: When asked why God created darkness, a teenage girl in our Shiner church said this. "If God had not created darkness, we would never see the beauty of the firefly."

December has been one of the better giving months of the church year. It's been said that this is a season of generosity. I'd like to invite you to consider making a special, year-end contribution if you are able. Join in that spirit of generosity in giving to the Lord.

Thank you for allowing me to walk with you through life's seasons as your pastor. Indeed, this is what we as Lutherans do. We pray. We share a cup of coffee together. We cry together. We rejoice together. We live in faith that God is right there with us by the power of the Holy Spirit as we move through the seasons of life. As our eyes need a moment to readjust when moving from darkness to light, may your eyes so readjust to God's blessings already around you.

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Ministry Areas in Action

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For the past three months, Shiner Lutheran has offered many opportunities to worship in a variety of expressions. The Blended Blessings Band covered many services, but we also worshiped with a Polka beat, Country Gospel style, two services led by Leah Matocha on piano, and an en-

ergetic Youth led service celebrating Reformation Sunday. Even animals were included with a special Blessing of the Pets service remembering St Francis of Assisi. All Saints Sunday Nov.6 remembered those who have passed away since the last All Saints Day. November closed with a Thanksgiving/Christ the King celebration and the First Sunday in Advent. The Altar Guild held an Acolyte Training and kept busy with all the liturgical color changes in banners and paraments. Weekly Brief Communion, Home Communion, and SNRC devotions all continued as worship opportunities.





August brought a Blessing of the Backpacks and an Ice Cream Social that welcomed back all our youth to the beginning of the school year. In September, Wednesday evenings were again filled with Growing in Faith Together, our multi-age Christian education ministry. Each Wednesday a meal was prepared with help from volunteers, supported by food and monetary donations.

Learning

Attendance varied from 70-80 learners, including an adult class. An offering was taken each week for this year's GIFT Mission Project which involves using offering collected to purchase specific items for the

Shiner Community Food Pantry, Those interested in summer camp met and held a Little Caesar's Pizza Kit Fundraiser. The sale was a success, selling 302 pizza kits and netting \$1,848.00 for our campers fund. Each Sunday morning a group gathered with Pastor Chris to dig deeper into the day's lessons. Wednesday mornings Pastor Chris led a study on Second Samuel. In August a quarterly Women's Bible Study began. All ages are learners!



Service includes the areas of hospitality, caring ministry, and fellowship. During the past quarter the hospitality team actively worked on the ice cream social, baptism and new member receptions, GIFT meals, and a covered dish dinner.

Our caring ministry team guided ongoing ministries including Home Touch mailings for the homebound, helping at the Shiner Community Food Pantry and providing breakfast there once a month, and sending greeting cards both to those who are ill or homebound. Monthly Noisy Offerings this past quarter gathered \$187.75 for Lutheran World Relief, \$222.49 for Texas Lutheran University Campus Ministry, and \$227.86 for Legacy Ranch. In November 167 guilts and 90 school kits were sent to Lutheran World Relief. The fellowship component of the service group included the special JOY (Just Older Youth) Fellowships, Men's and Women's Fellowships, and Women of the ELCA.



GIFT, 5th Quarter and JOY involve outreach as well as fellowship. A kind donor provided funds to purchase a new set of three Mevo cameras, enabling multiple views during livestreaming the service. Teena Davis joined Karen Vaughan as a Mevo camera technician.

Ministry Areas in Action



Our support group includes staff and volunteers that work with finances and facilities to manage resources so that our congregation and our ministries can function smoothly. The Finance Team met the past guarter to recommend a proposed budget for 2023. Budget items were realigned according to need, but the overall budget increased due to added expenses in our clergy medical plan, property insurance, and utilities. The Property Team kept busy refreshing the confirmation classroom and office bathroom with new coats of paint, handling a major leak from an AC unit that forced Property parsonage repairs, obtaining and spreading new engineered wood fiber mulch for playground safety, and seeing that parking lot lighting was repaired. Regular maintenance

issues were addressed, and plans began to convert sanctuary lighting to LEDs and fix some light sockets that are not functioning. A return to full programming following the pandemic has increased facility use and kept the support group busy!




Oren James Remmers, son of Austin & Jessica Remmers, was baptized on August 14, 2022.

Randy Zaruba has been elected to serve a three year term beginning in January 2023, along with Brian Baker and Mike Vaughan, who were both re-elected.

Our Mission Groups meet periodically to oversee our congregation's activities. In August, the Mission Groups participated in the Leadership Retreat. The next time Mission Groups will meet is January 8, 2023.





Each Mission Group involves a small group of about six people. At least one council member is included in each group. Both staff members and volunteer leaders participate by appointment according to their responsibilities and interests. Mission Groups support and review the ministries in their areas, looking to maintain energy and a missional outlook for all activities. Brainstorming and looking to the future are another component of discussions. Mission Groups may plan or suggest, but final decisions are made by Church Council. At the same time, the "boots on the ground" work is handled by specific teams such as Hospitality, Property, etc. All our levels of leadership work together to live out the mission statement of our congregation.



The staff position of bookkeeper has been filled by Shannon Blaschke. He has been working diligently to convert our financial tracking to an electronic program. Sandy Machacek continues her responsibilities as Office Assistant but has asked to work on a volunteer basis. She maintains many of the same duties but now has more flexibility in her schedule.



Scheduled office hours are Monday—Wednesday from 9am – Noon The staff is also on site most Tuesdays & Wednesdays until 4 pm. Please leave a message at 361-594-2345 or email shinerudml@att.net for help.

At times the exterior office entrance may be locked, but the entrance from the parking lot into the Gathering Place usually remains open for building access. Finances



The Finance Team has continued to work towards best practices for the financial management of our congregational resources. This past quarter, designing a 2023 proposed budget was the major finance team task. Throughout the year, the team looks at budget spending. For example, at the end of October we had spent 80.11 % of the budgeted general fund. This was below that scheduled milestone of 83.33 %. However, within the budget some areas had overspent; others were below budget. The finance team considered our ministries and adjusted budgets between these categories for 2023. For the past years our overall budget has remained steady. For 2023, however, an increase of \$4,997.24 had to be made in the budget to account for increases in pastor's medical insurance, church property insurance, and utility costs. This puts the General Fund 2023 Budget at \$226,548.00 and the Building Loan Payment at \$132,033.36 for a total budget of \$358,581.36. This budget was approved at the Semi-Annual Congregational meeting on No-

vember 13, 2022. The goal is to continue to be good stewards of our finances. Every offering or donation enables us to use our resources to continue the ministries of our congregation.



After much planning and discussion, the congregation approved a building renovation in 2015. A loan was secured with First National Bank of Shiner, and the process began. Of course, there were some bumps in the road-issues with subcontractors, Hurricane Harvey, and the unseen cost of bringing a building built in the 1950's up to today's building codes. Dedication of this project took place in December of 2018. The projected cost of this project was overwhelming, but unavoidable. We secured help from the

ELCA Mission Investments to run a capital campaign. The campaign solicited financial commitments from members that would be paid out over three years. This was above and beyond regular giving, and directly supported the Building Fund for our mortgage payments. After three years, many commitments were fulfilled or exceeded. Other commitments were not completed due to members leaving or finances changing. In 2019 we should have been running a second capital campaign. Instead, our pastoral vacancy and the pandemic blocked our planning. Fortunately, some members continued giving to the Building Fund, and along with designated memorials and special gifts, we have been able to make our payments. During 2023 we will revisit the capital campaign process in order to more steadily fund our mortgage payment.

The 2022 BBQ Fundraiser results show the generosity and hard work of members and friends. The Bake Sale/ Country Store depended upon donations of many baked goods and hand crafted items and raised over \$2545. The meal depended on the faithful teams of planners, BBQ cookers, servers, and brownie bakers. Many unseen smaller donations came from volunteers picking up a tab or others saying "keep the change." The larger direct donations offset most of the cost of supplies. Approximately 1,000 plates were sold and enjoyed.



A church depends on donations to exist. Money is needed for everything from supporting ministries and paying salaries to paying utilities and maintaining facilities. Our congregation is grateful to all those who offer support, thankful that we have been able to

"make ends meet" and blessed to be a blessing to others. These are some of the ways our congregation gives to others:

- We offer the Shiner community free participation in GIFT (Growing in Faith Together), JOY (Just Older Youth), 5th Quarter youth fellowship after football games, dominoes, canasta, and various other fellowship groups.
- We open our facility for others to use. Non-profits can use our facility at no charge. Examples are Shiner 4H, Scouts, Shiner ISD, and Lavaca County Texas A & M AgriLife Extension trainings. Others use our facility with a small fee: VBS participants, non-member weddings, funerals, showers, etc.
- We provide volunteer hours, physical items needed, or financial support to a variety of causes such as the Shiner Community Food Pantry, Shiner Lutheran Scholarships, or Cross Trails Camping Ministry. We donate through our Noisy Offerings and Mission Projects to such causes as Norma's House, Bluebonnet Youth Ranch, Legacy Ranch, LAMB, Saint Nicholas Ministry, Texas Lutheran Campus Ministry.
- We reach beyond our own community, sponsoring missionaries in Mexico, giving to Lutheran Disaster Response, ELCA World Hunger or Good Gifts, and providing donations, quilts and school kits for Lutheran World Relief.

All this giving to others, living out our mission statement, is only possible because of the gifts our congregation receives in the offering plate, offering envelopes, online electronic giving, or special gifts. As we close out 2022 and begin a new year, our prayer is that this giving continues and grows, enabling us to better serve others as Christ's hands and feet in this world. If you give nothing, you are deciding not to be a partner in this mission. Whether you give time, talent, one dollar or many dollars, you are part of our ministry. We are thankful for the surprising generosity that has enabled our path, and pray for continued support in the new year.



Did you know? Planned legacy giving enables churches and non-profit organizations to continue to exist, despite the uncertainties of offerings. In the past we have been blessed with bequests, oil leases and other special donations that have enabled both ministries and facility improvement. Special legacy giving is also the financial base that made our endowment fund possible.
