HOLY WEEK

The key to many customs and traditions in Lent is what down through the ages has come to

be known as Holy Week, the last week in Lent. It has become a tradition to trace the activities of Jesus that led to the cross of Calvary. Holy Week begins with **Palm Sunday** as a reminder of Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem. The people along the roadside waved palms and shouted "Hosanna" the Hebrew word for "save now." (See Matthew 21:1-11, Mark 11:1-10, Luke

19:28-40, and John 12:12-19.) Many churches today bless the palms and distribute them in the form of crosses to be worn by the worshipers.



Maundy Thursday lifts up the event of the Lord's Last Supper that was celebrated in the

Upper Room at the time of the Jewish Passover. It is the basis for the establishment of sacrament of Holy Communion. Historically, the Passover marked the Israelites' departure from

The fruit of the Spirit abides in us and it is up to us to cultivate it so that we may experience the blessing and the fullness of the Spirit. God is the husbandman...“He prunes, nurtures, waters and protects His own. The indwelling presence of the Holy Spirit will energize and control every faculty of our nature when our will joins the will of God. Then the “beauty of the Lord will be upon us” (Psalm 90:17) and “we shall bring forth fruit unto God” (Romans 7:4).”

THE FRUIT OF THE SPIRIT: LOVE

One definition for Love can be found in 1 Corinthians 13. Read this chapter every day for a deeper understanding. Other scriptures are found in John 3:16; Romans 5:5-8; Jeremiah 31:3; Ephesians 4:2, 3; Romans 12:9, 10, to name a few.

“If I had the gift of being able to speak in other languages without learning them, and could speak in every language there is in all of heaven and in earth, but didn’t love others, I would only be making noise. If I had the gift of prophecy and knew all about what is going to happen in the future, knew everything about everything, but didn’t love others, what good would it do? Even if I had the gift of faith so that I could speak to a mountain and make it move, I would still be worth nothing at all without love. If I gave everything I have to the poor people, and if I were burned alive for preaching the Gospel but didn’t love others, it would be of no value whatever. Love is very patient and kind, never jealous or envious, never boastful or proud, never haughty or selfish or rude. Love does not demand its own way. It is not irritable or touchy. It does not hold grudges and will hardly even notice when others do it wrong. It is never glad about injustice, but rejoices whenever truth wins out. If you love someone you will be loyal to him no matter what the cost. You will always believe in him, always expect the best of him and always stand your ground in defending him. All special gifts and powers from God will someday come to an end, but love goes on forever. There are three things that remain faith, hope, and love and the greatest of these is love.” (1 Corinthians 13:1-8, 13) The Living Bible.

Some signs that will help you recognize LOVE in action and will help you begin to cultivate the Fruit of LOVE in yourself: showing concern for others, obeying God’s commandments, saving kind words, helping someone with their homework, obeying parents, being patient, being loyal to a friend or to your faith not irritated easily, not envious, not boastful, reading to a small child, visiting the convalescent homes, visiting the sick and shut-ins, sending cards to the sick and shut-ins, hello by serving meals, forgiving someone, doing good deeds, encouraging others, helping an elderly person, being unselfish and sharing with others, being happy when the truth is revealed, letting others get the praise, not rude, not jealous, not proud, reading to an elderly person, visiting the prisons, calling the sick and shut-ins, going on errands cheerfully, helping someone understand God's word. The list can go on. Use your own good judgment and the words found in scriptures to help you identify other deeds of LOVE.

Holding Strong to Beliefs Resurrection Sunday – He Is Risen

Devotional Reading: Psalms 23
Scripture Reading: Mark 16:1-8

KEY VERSE: Do not be alarmed; you are looking for Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has been raised; he is not here. Look, there is the place they laid him. Mark 16:6.

CENTRAL THOUGHT: Another Test of Faith -- Resurrection Faith.

LESSON OBJECTIVE: To learn more about the reaction of the disciples and the women believers to the resurrection of Jesus.

1. When the Sabbath was over, Mary Magdalene, and Mary the mother of James, and Salome brought spices, so that they might go and anoint him. 2. And very early on the first day of the week, when the sun had risen, they went to the tomb. 3. They had been saying to one another, "Who will roll away the stone for us from the entrance to the tomb?" 4. When they looked up, they saw that the stone, which was very large, had already been rolled back. 5. As they entered the tomb, they saw a young man, dressed in a white robe, sitting on the right side; and they were alarmed. 6. But he said to them, "Do not be alarmed; you are looking for Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has been raised; he is not here. Look, there is the place they laid him. 7. But go, tell his disciples and Peter that he is going ahead of you to

Galilee; there you will see him, just as he told you. "So they went out and fled from the tomb, for terror and amazement had seized them; and they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid.

Lesson Introduction

Today's lesson concludes the unit of study on the Test of Faith. Certainly, no day on the Christian calendar better reflects a historical event that tested our faith as the events of Resurrection Sunday. Failure to pass this test leaves the would-be believer with "no place to stand," "no higher ground," "no hope beyond tomorrow," "no other side of the river," and "no home in paradise."

In this lesson, faith is made to confront an empty tomb. I submit that this is the most Challenging test for most Christians. To have doubts about the resurrection is to make null and void the most critical promises of God. We now must consider Resurrection Faith. Remember, there is a repentant thief somewhere in paradise, waiting on the Living Lord.

Lesson Comments

- I. "When They Looked Up:" Mark 16:1-4.

Resurrection Sunday morning was like a typical post Sabbath, except for the journey of three women to a tomb. Several days had come and gone since their arrival in Jerusalem. Their stay would soon end. However, before they departed, one last loving act had to be carried out. Time had not allowed them or others, to prepare the body of Jesus for burial. To do so would be their last act of love and faithfulness.

The dawn of day found them on their way to the tomb. Surely they were preoccupied in their thoughts. There was so much on which to reflect. Utmost, was the question of who would roll the stone away from the tomb. Circumstances had not made them less practical in that which they had to do.

There was no need to worry, verse 4 says: "When they looked up, they saw that the stone...had already been rolled back." Looking up has its advantages. But it takes faith to look to the "hills" from where help comes when your heart aches and your burdens are heavy.

II. A Natural Reaction In an Unnatural Situation: Vv.5-6a.

Taking advantage of the way that had been prepared for them, the women entered the tomb. Looking for a dead man, they found (or at least they were told) that Jesus of Nazareth had been raised and He wasn't there. The young man-the messenger-told the women that Jesus had left word to tell His

Key Scripture: *"I am Alpha and Omega, the beginning and the ending, saith the Lord, which is, and which was, and which is to come, the Almighty"* (Rev. 1:8).

Key Thought: You belong to God.

Lent
 Lent is the period of time to reflect on the events that led Jesus to Calvary. Its begins with Ash Wednesday and covers a period of forty days (excluding Sundays) culminating with Holy Week (including Passion/Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday). Lent is a time of fasting, sacrifice, and preparation.

Color: Purple (violet or lilac) is the color used to denote royalty, praying, fasting, and penitence. It represents a symbol of the majesty of Christ, and Jesus' humanity, suffering, and fasting.

A guideline given by some money managers is as follows: Give 1/10 (tithe of your income to God). Put 1/10 in savings. Put 1/10 in an emergency account until three months of pay is set aside. Live on the remaining 7/10 with freedom to work towards giving as much as possible to God's work.

Egypt when the final plague was cast upon the Egyptians to smite the first born dead (Exodus). The Hebrews received special instruction to kill a lamb the or goat for each household and to sprinkle the blood on the doorpost and the life of the first born would be spared. Every Jew/Hebrew was required to celebrate the Passover, and the Lord's Last Supper was Jesus' observance of the Passover. However, Jesus brought new meaning to this event as it commemorated Israel's deliverance from Egyptian bondage – all of humanity was delivered from sin.

The Lord's Supper was the last meal that Jesus shared with the disciples before going to Calvary. It occurred on what is called Maundy Thursday. "Maundy" is a variation of the Latin word "mandatum" meaning "commandment" (see John 13:34). The significance of God's love for humanity comes forth in this act because it was and is through Jesus' blood and body that persons are redeemed. Therefore, the new commandment requires persons to love one another just as God loves all persons. The Latin word "Mundo" means to wash, and some claim this is how Maundy Thursday came into being, since Jesus washed the disciples' feet on that day. Some denominations and congregations still carry out the practice of washing feet before Holy Communion, at least on Holy Thursday.

Yet another tradition credits the name to the word "maund" for basket and the practice of giving baskets of goodies to the poor. Whatever the source, Maundy Thursday is practiced in just about every Christian church with either a love feast or Holy Communion being participated in by all. One cannot but help call to mind the celebration of the feast of the Passover by Jews. Christians celebrate similarly, for this is in remembrance of the Lamb of God who willingly shed blood for the sins of the whole world.



GOOD FRIDAY

Most authors agree that the term "Good Friday" evolved from "God's Friday." It is one the three days that many persons make an effort to attend church, the other being Easter Sunday and Christmas Day.

Services in most churches last about three

hours since generally, the seven last words of Jesus are used. The Seven Last Words are:

- ◆ "Father, forgive them; for they do not know what they are doing." Luke 23:34
- ◆ "Today, you will be with me in Paradise." Luke 23:43
- ◆ "Woman, here is your son, ...Son, Here is your Mother." John 19:26-27
- ◆ "Eloi, Eloi, lema sabachthani? My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" Mark 15:34 and Matthew 27:46
- ◆ "I am thirsty." John 19:28
- ◆ "It is finished." John 19:30

- ◆ "Father, into your hands I commend My Spirit." Luke 23:46

More and more today, however, times and length of services are being arranged to meet the working schedules of most parishioners. Good Friday represents the day of that dreadful crucifixion and is not just a day of mourning. It is a day of remembrance of the events of the day, especially the time Jesus hung on the cross. It is appropriate to leave the alter bare and use no liturgical color. However, if desired, black may be used. In many countries, the old practice was (and in some instances still is) not to cook on Good Friday. Rather, one drinks some beverage and eat hot cross buns. Like most other customs and traditions, cross buns have pagan origins. According to Rudolph Brasch, it was part of a pagan festival of bread offered to idols at spring time. Horns were stamped on the buns. This, however became the mark of the cross. It not only was a symbol, but served a practical purpose. When these buns were used in love feasts, it was easier to divide one into four pieces.



Easter Sunday commemorates the glorious resurrection of Jesus from the dead. It is the other highest point of the Christian Year. Thus, joy and celebration engulfs the season as the Christian Church rejoices in the fact of the resurrection and its meaning to the Christian faith, hope, and life. Many wonder why Easter occurs on various Sundays from year to year? Easter does not occur on a set day like Christmas because it is determined by the moon and the seasons in nature. Thus, for most Protestants and Roman Catholics, Easter falls on the Sunday near the beginning of Spring, which is also after the first full moon. Because of the fluctuating cycle, Easter Sunday can occur anywhere between March 22 and April 25. Therefore, Easter is a determining factor in the cycle that sets the beginning and end of some of the seasons. The number of days in the season of advent (four Sundays weeks prior to Christmas), Christmas / Christmastide (from Christmas day to the day before Epiphany-January 6, twelve days), Lent (forty days, excluding the Sundays), and Eastertide (fifty days), are constant seasons in terms of length. The Season After Epiphany, The Season After Pentecost, and Kingdomtide experience the variation from year to year.


Easter has been described as the oldest festival of the church. It truly is the key to Christianity, since it emphasizes the redemption of humans. Note that in the early Christian Church, the word used for Easter was *Pascha*. This is from the Hebrew word for Passover. The closeness and similarity between the Jewish Passover and the celebration of Lent and Easter should be recalled and remembered. The Jews

observed the *Passing Over* of the houses of the Israelites who had the blood of the lamb smeared upon the posts of their houses, by the death angel during their sojourn in Egypt. This was the final plague before Pharaoh agreed to let God's people, the Israelites go. For Christians, the blood that saves persons from eternal damnation is the blood of Jesus, shed upon the cross at Calvary. Easter, like the word Lent, has nothing to do with the reason for celebrating these occasions. Rather, Easter comes from the name of an Anglo-Saxon spring goddess, *Eostre*, whose festival was observed at the spring equinox. Easter is indeed THE DAY of the days in the church calendar. This is the day that celebrates Christ's resurrection from the grave. Without the resurrection, there would be no Christian Church. This is why many Christians moved their day of worship to Sunday. So, not only is it a day of worship, but a little Easter, when persons remember that Christ rose from the dead. (See Matthew 28:1-7, Mark 16:1-8, Luke 24:1-12, and John 20:1-10.)

The observance of Lent would have no meaning if it were not for that victorious first Easter. The crucifixion without the resurrection would not be a victory and would destroy the essence of the Christian faith and God's redemptive act. To be resurrection signifies that something or someone who was dead has return to a living state. Christ's resurrection was a demonstration of that fact and a revelation of God's power over sin and death. Thus, the agony and tragedy of the cross was transformed into a joyous celebration and God's fulfillment of the covenantal promise was affirmed. ALLELUIA! Jesus arose as a "mighty triumph over His foes" and lives forever. The liturgical color for Easter/Eastertide is white, symbolizing purity. Along with white, gold is often used to give emphasis to this most holy day of the church year.

A.M.E. Zion Church in 1830 and was soon appointed head of the Connecticut charges. Upon their arrival in Middletown, Rev. Beman and his family became strong leaders of the town's growing African-American community.

Jehiel Beman and his wife, Fanny, had seven children, Leverett, Amos, Sarah, Lydia, Harriet, Martha, and Aaron. Fanny died not long after the family moved to Middletown. Rev. Beman then married Nancy Scott. To make ends meet, Jehiel Beman operated a shop on William Street with his son, Leverett Berman. Shortly after Jehiel Beman came to Middletown, he built a house across the street from his church. The black neighborhood around the church grew. In 1847, Leverett Beman purchased several lots in the area of Cross Street, park (now Vine) Street, and Knowles Avenue, and resold them to other black people.

In addition to his tireless work on behalf of the abolition and temperance movements, JAM Beman organized meetings of all "colored citi-zens of Middletown" to encourage them to work together for common causes, particularly the right to vote. Both Jehiel and Amos Beman organized conventions of black people through-out the state.

A lifelong advocate of schooling for African Americans, Jehiel Beman wrote eloquently about the importance of education. In 1831, he solicited funds to found a black college in New Haven, but this plan was strongly opposed by white New Haven citizens, and the col-lege did not come to pass.

In 1838, Jehiel Beman was called to lead Boston's A.M.E. Zion church, and he left Middletown. lie became president of the Temperance Society in Boston. Throu11hout his life, he traveled extensively in New England and beyond, working against slavery, and helping to establish black churches and schools. Jehiel Beman returned quite often to Middletown, where his soil, Leverett, remained with his family. In 1854, he moved back to Middletown, where he died in 1858.

disciples “and Peter” that He was going on the Galilee, and they could see Him there.

This was an unnatural situation. Think about it. A young man (God’s angelic messenger), was sitting on the “right side” of the tomb, delivering messages from God who had appointed him to grave duty to await the arrival of the faithful-but not the fearful. Natural reaction were also evident as the three women--Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, and Salome--walked and pondered about the stone and who would roll it away. This was a natural reaction and so was their being alarmed at what they found. The fact that they were there was a natural reaction for the faithful, even in an unnatural situation.

This final illustration is another example of being natural in an unnatural situation. Again consider God’s messenger dressed in white. Much of the context at this point is unnatural. It reflects behavior which is often contrary to the norm. Nevertheless, a natural spirit of compassion, concern, consolation, and accommodation are felt in the action and reaction. He could have just given them the message of the meeting in Galilee. But rather, His words included some of the following: “Do not be alarmed; you are looking for Jesus of Nazareth... He has been raised; he is not here. Look, there is the place they laid him.” This is caring and comforting.

III. Come and See! Now Go and Tell!: Vv.6b-8.

Faith continues to contend with fear. The actions of these three women from Galilee, in an effort to maintain their struggle of faith in spite of God’s messenger, encouraging and enlisting them to be a part of God’s restoration plan, intended to engage the disciples and Peter in ministering to Jews and Gentiles. The early ministry would center near Galilee, so they were urged to return there.

A valuable lesson is taught at this point, as we briefly review the faithfulness of the two Marys and Salome. They were faithful in their duties and in their demonstration of their faithfulness: a) traveling with Jesus from Nazareth, b) other stops in Galilee, on up to Jerusalem, c) their presence at the trail and at Calvary, d) at the tomb on Friday and then on Sunday, e) and the preparation of the spices for His body. They were dependable, dutiful; and unlike the disciples, they were not deniers or deserters. However, even with the women, their faith had to contend with their fear.

Consequently, when they were told to “Come and see,” they did. But, when they were told to “Go and Tell,” fear overrode their faith. Verse 8 says that “They, went out and fled from the tomb.” Terror and amazement seized them. They then, were silent, not saying anything to anyone. We are told that they were afraid.

Lesson sidelights

Has it occurred to you that Jesus, even as the Risen Lord, was delayed in His earthly departure for His heavenly home for one reason, one reason only? Jesus had declared that He was thirsty. Could that strong desire—that thirst—have been for home? After all, He had been away for about thirty-three years, and it was time to go. But, His departure was delayed. He would not leave (could have), but would not leave until the day of Pentecost, the day that the comforter came. Jesus had announced on Mount Calvary that His assignment was finished. He was through. It was all over. His Spirit had been commended to the care of His Father.

The repentant thief had been waiting a long time in paradise. He wanted to see his friend Jesus who had promised to meet him there. However, the Lord’s departure was delayed because believers did not believe. The wonderfully faithful woman did not believe. Thomas, the doubter, did not believe. The other

disciples did not believe. Therefore, the Lord chose to wait a while longer, going in and out in their midst until they were ready to believe and ready to relieve Jesus of His earthly ministry.

Lesson Application

I found it interesting that the Risen Lord specifically included Peter in His message to the disciples (16:7). Had Peter been excluded from the group because of his acts and words of denial? Was his desertion somehow more offensive and grievous than that of the others? Maybe it was a sense that the Lord had. After all, He knew the emotional temperament of Peter, his impulsive nature, and his tendency of taking matters to heart. His was not a perfect faith, but it was a serious faith. While he wasn’t exempt from the fear-faith syndrome, his intention and desire was to please God and to be found obedient at all times and in all places. Knowing, then, the nature of Peter, Jesus knew that dreaded sorrow, deep pain, great shame, and profound guilt would keep Peter away in hiding, seeking a place of relief in isolation. Therefore, the inclusive language to tell the disciples and Peter was needed.

This small addendum, postscript, supplement intentionally was added that none under grace would need to feel denied or left out. Those whose faith is lacking are not forgotten. It was important for Peter to know that the Lord still included him in the circle of the disciples. You see, our inclusion is not based upon what we do or who we are. We are included because of who Jesus is and what He has done.

Reach out your hand and put it into my side. Stop doubting and believe. John 20:27

One detail in the Easter story has always intrigued me. Why did Jesus keep the scars from His crucifixion? Presumably He could have had any resurrected body He wanted, and yet He chose one identifiable mainly by scars that could be seen and touched. Why?

I believe the story of Easter would be incomplete without those scars on the hands, feet, and the side of Jesus. (John 20:27) Human beings dream of pearly straight teeth and wrinkle-free skin and ideal body shapes. We dream of an unnatural state: the perfect body. But for Jesus, being confined in a skeleton and human skin was the unnatural state. The scars are a permanent reminder of His days of confinement and suffering on our planet.

From the perspective of heaven, those scars represent the most horrible event that has ever happened in the history of the universe. Even that event, though, turned into a memory. Because of Easter, we can hope that the tears we shed, the struggles we endure, the emotional pain, the heartache over lost friends and loved ones-all these will become memories, like Jesus' scars. Scars never completely go away, but neither do they hurt any longer. Someday we will have re-created bodies and a re-created heaven and earth (Rev.21:4). We will have a new start, an Easter start. --Philip Yancey
