



As we look toward a new year with hope and anticipation of the many graces and blessings it will hold, we are well aware that

far too many people struggle in this current financial milieu. The cost of everything around us is skyrocketing – food, utilities, household supplies,

etc. We are experiencing those same rising costs here at the retreat house, and we have found it necessary to raise our suggested costs for our weekend and weeklong retreats. As of January 1, we will be asking \$225 for a weekend retreat or \$210 for those who are 65 and older. A virtual weekend will now be \$90. Know that no one will ever be turned away for financial reasons as we have scholarship money available and are always happy to work out a payment plan for those who would find it helpful. We look forward to having you on retreat, as together we explore all that God has in store for us in 2023!



wonder and pray about the individuals lashing ut, those who are victims of the harsh behavior nd others who witnessed the unpleasant cident. I wonder who felt unjustly treated. This as prompted me to look more deeply into my oul to determine when I am the one who lashes ut unfairly and how I will correct that behavior ronto! How do I respond to others who are rude r disrespectful? Can I thoughtfully pause and onsider why they hurt and what they fear? erhaps I could lean on God to help me bring bout a blessed moment of peace to this other oul. How can I better personify Micah's nessage: to love gently, be humble and live ustly?


