Now faith is confidence in what we hope for and assurance about what we do not see.

ACTS Clinical Supervisor for Youth Addictions Receiving Richard Gibbon says that the above quote describes his feelings about the teens he sees at the Juvenile Addictions Receiving Facility (JARF) in Tampa because of the short amount of time he has to make an impact in the teen's life. The JARF, a 10-bed secure facility, offers short term acute care services for adolescents with substance use or co-occuring mental health disorders. As the lead clinician at the JARF, Richard says every day is different and busy. His



duties range from performing assessments, leading counseling groups to walking the floor and getting to know the youth better. Richard also works closely with the local court systems to help get Marchman Act clients assessed and into treatment. He said his favorite thing about his job is the fact that each youth is different and is challenging engaging them and everyone connected to their case in the 3 – 5 days they are at the unit. Staff from the Polk Juvenile Assessment Center attended the Tenth Judicial Circuit's Domestic Violence Task Force Domestic Violence Symposium in October in Lake Wales.
