Minutes – Junior Club Meeting, September 13, 2022

Our club met on September 13th at Legacy High School in Kennewick. Juniors present were Cinda, Martin, Declan, Ezra, Davian, Jessy, Aria, Juni.

Chris Sorensen had some handouts about minerals and showed how to use the hardness test and some other physical properties are used to identify minerals. One handout has cut and paste mineral examples: https://pdrockandgem.org/stones/wp-content/uploads/2021/04/Crystalshapes.pdf

Juniors were able to scratch different minerals such as talc, calcite, halite, and gypsum and use the chart for Mohs hardness to attribute which of the kit materials would scratch a mineral. Additionally hand samples were provided of quartz, talc, copper, calcite, garnet and gypsum to show how the appearance is quite different both in luster and crystal shape. Mike zinski provided some 3d printed mineral shapes for the juniors.

Juni provided and mineral report about garnet:

Garnet is a good abrasive. Garnet is New York stats gemstone. Garnet is commonly found in metamorphic rocks. Garnet is found in many colors. Red is common, blue is rare. Garnet has been used since the bronze age, approximately 5000 years ago.

Prosser Labyrinth – By Kerry Norton

It is being built on the corner of 7th and Sheridan near downtown Prosser, kitty-corner from the Benton REA, and anyone can stop by to see its progress. Right now, it is about 30% done. I expect to finish it sometime next spring as progress is necessarily slow. On a typical day I will mix and pour two bags of mortar into forms and then insert selected stones into the mortar to make a mosaic pattern. Total building time will probably take at least 100 two-bag days. Most of the stones are river stones from local rivers and quarries, selected for their color and shape. The labyrinth has a number of themes and is divided into eight pie-shaped segments of different colors.

It has been (and will continue to be) a lot of work. Fortunately, I have had many people offer time and resources to help me work on it, including some of our club members. Allyson Leonhard and her husband Herb have helped with artwork and publicity (both are local artists); Tim Kuchler helped me move some very heavy glacial erratics for landscaping purposes and shared one of his favorite collecting sites so that I could get some lovely stone for the pathway; and former member Sean Hall has helped me in all phases of the project, including collecting trips.

I am having a lot of fun doing all this (did I mention it requires collecting and sorting over 4 1/2 tons of rock?) Only a rockhound would go to the trouble. Once it is over, I will go back to quicker activities like making spheres!

If you would like, I can offer periodic updates of my progress along with pictures. Our local river rock, so often overlooked for lapidary purposes, is very rewarding to work with in a project like this.

Growing Bismuth Crystals

You will need

10 pounds bismuth ore (minimum; ideally 20+ lbs) [~\$8-10 per pound]

Heavy duty pot

Turkey fryer or outdoor stove

Propane

Metal scoop

Metal tongs

Sheet pan

Optional: Heat-proof silicone gloves; firebrick; waste container for slag; blowtorch

Directions

- 1. Place bismuth ore in pot and light stove. Completely melt bismuth.
- 2. Scoop away slag floating on surface. Repeat two to three times.
- 3. Turn off stove and let cool for a few moments.
- 4. Once top begins to solidify, carefully pull out crystals using tongs. Gently shake or let liquid metal drip off before removing to sheet pan. Be careful of drips! The metal is about 520°F.
- 5. Let crystals cool completely on the pan.
- 6. Pull as many crystals as you can before the solution solidifies. Reheat as desired. Bismuth can be remelted indefinitely, so put any failures back into the pot.

Notes

Slower cooling allows larger crystals to form. The thicker the pot walls, the better. Surround the pot with firebrick to retain heat. Run the experiment outside on a hot day.

A handheld blowtorch will easily remove dried bismuth from tongs and scoop if they get overly encrusted.

November Program "Rocking With the Stars" Annual Project of the Year Awards

Let's finally get together and share the year's rocks, projects, triumphs and tales with fellow club members. The more members that participate, the merrier the evening.

Time Period: Your entries must have been purchased, found or made between November 1, 2021 and October 31, 2022.

Remember: Only one entry per category per member. A member may enter one item in each category.

Category 1 - Best Color: This award is for the best or most appealing color in a rock or specimen – either rough or finished. You need to have dug it or found it yourself.

Category 2- Most Unique Rock: Do you have a rock with a story to tell? Can you see a picture in it, or does the shape remind you of something? Bring your unique piece and let us know what you see.

Category 3 - Best Fossil: Your fossil can be either found by you or purchased, and can be rough or in a finished presentation.

Category 4 - Jewelry: This category includes jewelry made using wire wrap, chain maile, torch on metal, lost wax or sand casting, Viking weave, or bead weave. It can be a pendant, ring, belt buckle, brooch, earrings or bracelet.

Category 5 - Faceter of the Year: Bring your bling and treat us to the sight of the best gemstone of the year that you have personally cut. The gemstone can be in a setting.

Category 6 - Cabochon of the Year: Show us your talent by entering the best-looking cab (intarsia and doublet or triplet included) that you personally cut and polished. This cab **should not be set** into a mounting so the judges can see your technique on the edges and back. **If your cabochon has been set, then it needs to be entered into category 4**

Category 7 - Silverpicker of the Year: Bring something (cab, stone, carving, rock, jewelry, etc.) that you have purchased at a rock show, rock shop, yard sale or from a hobbyist that will impress us.

Category 8 – Best Find: The best personal find of the year while out rock hunting. It can be a mineral specimen, gemstone or rock – either rough or finished. You need to have dug it or found it yourself.

Category 9 - Project of the Year: Show us your flair and skill by entering something that you have made between 11/1/2021 and 10/31/2022, and incorporates rock in some manner. It can be a sphere, bookends, a gem tree, a carving, an educational exhibit, or ??
