MAKE-UP: Apply make-up as you would normally for an evening out. Pay special attention to your eyes; they are the focal point in a portrait.

GLASSES: If you wear glasses all the time, you'll want to wear them in your portraits. Don't worry, the company will take care of any glare.

If you would like to be photographed with your pet, please feel free to bring him or her. Also, you can bring any props such as musical instruments, flowers, sports equipment, etc. if you would like.

After you have had your photos taken, you will have a short time to choose the picture to go into the church directory and your FREE OF CHARGE 8x10. COOKIE WALK - DEC 18 "Cookie Re-Connections"


