The Call of Abram

Lesson Scripture: Genesis 12:1-7; 15:1-7 Focus Scripture: Genesis 12:1-5; 7; 15:1-7

Key Verse: Then the Lord appeared to Abram and said, "To your offspring I will give this land." So he built there an altar to the Lord, who had appeared to him.

KEY TERMS

- Canaan A country located more than 7000 miles from Haran; the place where Abram's father died. Canaan is commonly referred to as the "Promised Land;" As reflected in our Key Verse, this is the land God promised to Abram and his descendants.
- Haran A city located in Northern Turkey, about ten miles from the Syrian-Turkish border; the city in which Abram lived when God instructed him to "Go from your country and your kindred and your father's house to the land that I will show you." (Genesis 12:1)
- Ur Abram's birthplace.

INTRODUCTION

The title of this quarter's lessons is "God's Exceptional Choice." It traces the history of salvation from God's choosing or selecting "Abram," whom he renamed "Abraham," to his sending Jesus Christ

to die for our sins and concludes with the establishment of the early church. This first lesson, like a closely focused lens, allows us to concentrate on Abram, whom God selected and called to become the father of a new nation to be blessed and used by God to bless the whole world.

TELLING THE BIBLE STORY God's Call and Abram's Response, Genesis 12:1-5, 7

Romans 11:34 (NRSV) asks two rhetorical questions: (1) "For who has known the mind of the Lord? (2) Or who has been his counselor?" Of course, no one can answer these questions. When we look at Abram and his status in Haran, we can see that God's selection of him for this quintessential role is consistent with 1 Samuel 16:7(b), wherein he declared to the prophet, Samuel, that ... "the Lord does not see as mortals see; they look on the outward appearance, but the Lord looks on the heart."

God calls Abram with conditional promises

that will also involve his family. God promises Abram and his descendants a superior life and lifestyle, filled with continuous blessings for themselves and curses for their enemies. This family would also bless the whole world! However, Abram would have to forfeit the identity and security resources to which humankind commonly clings. "Go from your country and your kindred and your

father's house to the land I will show you" was what God required of Abram (Genesis blessings 12:1). The were contingent upon implicit trust and obedience from Abram. The scriptures indicate Abram responded immediately. with absolute obedience.

God's Covenant with Abram, Genesis 15:1-7

Although his faith is still strong, human curiosity

is evident in Abram's communications about the legacy and descendants God promised him. So, Abram raises a pivotal question essential to nation-building plans, "How can God guarantee his promises to Abram and his descendants

when he has not blessed Abram with descendants?" Undoubtedly, Abram was also keenly aware of his age and wondered whether his "biological clock" might prohibit his ability to father a child. Abram was seventy-five years old when God called him in Haran.

Abram's questioning also implies an underlying concern about the fairness of his plight. Does God expect him

As a result of Abram's faithfulness, God used the conditional promises in Genesis 12:2 to form a covenant (the Abrahamic

be to satisfied with Eliezer, his servant. being his heir? God's mercifulness is vividly displayed during a visit with Abram in a vision. He shows an empathic understanding Abram's need for more information and clarity. So, God takes Abram outside and gives him a visible example, using the incalculable number of stars to represent the infinite numbers

of descendants he planned for Abram. As a result of Abram's faithfulness, God used the conditional promises in Genesis 12:2 to form a covenant (the Abrahamic Covenant). More details of the covenant and new names for Abram and his wife,

Sarai, are covered in Genesis 15:8-17. Abram was renamed Abraham, and Sarai became Sarah. Praise God; the Abrahamic covenant paved the way for the coming of Jesus Christ and the availability of salvation to the whole world!

SANKOFA

Because of tendencies to ignore or forget history, we can easily overlook that

Abram and his family immigrants. were migrated from They Ur, Abram's birthplace, to Haran on a journey to Canaan with Terah, Abram's father. leading the way. Both Ur and Haran cities wherein were idol worshippers proliferated. The family stopped in Haran for some reason, and

Terah died there at the

age of 205 (Genesis 11:31). With God's call, Abram and his family were required further, later becoming to migrate immigrants in Canaan. From their history, we can see that territorialism and the rejection of "others" are not new phenomena. Biblical accountings of "clashes" between Abram's family

and leaders of other nations abound, beginning as early as Genesis 14 when Lot was captured and had to be rescued by Abram.

Isn't it interesting that as God calls and uses people from every nation today, some immigrants are more often rejected and denied the rights and privileges of citizenship than others? An *immigrant* is a label or status applicable to anyone who

enters a country other than their homeland to settle there. As we all know, immigration is a "hot button" issue in America today! There is a deep divide in this country regarding who should be allowed to immigrate to the United **States** and what measurements attributes human or should be considered

to determine eligibility for living in this country. Similar resistance to immigration exists in other countries as well.

Professor Henry Louis Gates unambiguously reveals the paradoxical nature of the United States' immigration controversies. Professor Gates, in an article entitled, "What Roots Means to

Me" (*Reader's Digest*, February 2022), states the following, "We are a nation of immigrants. Even Native Americans came here from somewhere else; they walked across the Bering Strait some 15,000 years ago." He also notes that although Africans' emigration to the United States was not voluntary, we are also immigrants, as is the case with <u>all</u> inhabitants of this country.

CASE STUDY

Unfortunately, the advantages of inclusive immigration policies are too often overlooked or downplayed to justify systemic discriminatory within practices immigration policies. Our beloved United States general and the statesman, Colin Honorable Powell, born on April

General Powell became a four-star general, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff

also the first African American to hold either position. He held numerous other prestigious posts within the Pentagon and elsewhere during his distinguished career. Although he had the opportunity and chose not to run for president of the United States, General Powell was world-renowned for his statesmanship and consistency in speaking out on justice and equity issues. Worthy of note

is his record of putting his oath of allegiance to the United States Constitution and his love for serving all above people any political personal aspirations he might have otherwise.

LIFE APPLICATION

For humankind, being chosen equates with "being selected." Being selected infers

that other, equal or superior, choices are available. From childhood memories, most adults can recall how much they valued being selected to become members of an esteemed peer group or team. As adults, we operate in many different spheres – religious, academic, vocational, social, civic, etc. However, aspirations to be

chosen or selected continue – and in many cases, they intensify! However, rejection, marginalization, social, and economic inequities, and so forth are common realities for minorities. Many are perceived as "others" and less worthy or deserving. Nevertheless, we can all rejoice that, like Abram, we have all been chosen by God. Also, just as God called Abram, he is calling us.

Isn't it exciting to know that Abram's selection by precursor was a the coming of Jesus Christ? Whereas Israel was the nation God initially called, he later extended through Jesus Christ the invitation to others. Jesus said, "I am the way, the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except

through me" (John 14:6). He also showed inclusivity when he said "whosoever will, let him come."

QUESTIONS:

- 1. What assignment has God given you? When and what will you do to find the answer if you are uncertain?
- 2. What gifts or special attributes do

- you possess to wholeheartedly serve God?
- 3. What inspirations can you draw from Abram's faith and obedience?
- 4. As much as this lesson is about calling, it is also about patience and trust. What can we do to increase both our patience and trust in God's choice and timing?

KEY TERMS

 Covenant – An alliance or agreement between two parties with equal or unequal authorities.

God's covenants with humankind are the latter type, as humankind can never achieve equality with sovereign God.

- Esau The firstborn son of Isaac and Rebekah, Jacob's twin brother and father of the Edomites.
- Jacob Hebrew name: Deceiver.

Esau's younger twin brother, who became the father of the Israelites. He fathered twelve sons, who formed twelve tribes; God changed Jacob's name to Israel (Gen. 32:28).

INTRODUCTION

God's Call to Abram continues to be the

overarching theme for today's lesson, and it will continue for the rest of this quarter. Today's lesson focuses on how God chose to transfer Abraham's inheritance,

including the blessings the **Abrahamic** Covenant, to the next generation. His choice benefactors was limited to Isaac's twin sons: Esau and Jacob. Jacob. the younger son, was God's choice. Jewish laws tradition and would require that Esau, the older twin, should be selected.

Despite

the family's dysfunctions and the transgressions of Isaac, Rebecca, and their sons, God did not change his plans. Jacob's choice before he was born was an irreversible link to God's covenant with Abraham. Humankind can never fully comprehend either God's reasonings or his actions!

TELLING THE BIBLE STORY

Isaac and Rebecca Are Blessed Parents, Genesis 25:19b-21

Isaac was forty years old when he and Rebecca married. Like his parents, Abraham and Sarah, Isaac and Rebecca struggled with fertility problems. As Abraham appealed to God for help,

so did Isaac (v. 21). The Lord responded affirmatively to Isaac's prayers, and Rebecca conceived. One might surmise that thev were "doubly blessed" because twin sons, Esau and Jacob, were conceived. They are the first twins reported in the Bible. Isaac was sixty years old when they were born!

Differences Instigate Conflict, Genesis 25:22-28

Except for being born as twins and raised by the same parents, Esau and Jacob seem to have had very little in common. The conflict between the two was obvious before birth. In our **Key Verse** (Genesis 25:23), God explains the reason for their

conflict. The two nations to which God referred were Israel and Edom.

Esau, the older twin's name, was based on his appearance. "The first came out red, all his body like a hairy mantle" (Genesis 26:25a). On the other hand, Jacob's name was based on his eccentric behavior at birth. "Afterwards, his brother came out, with his hand gripping Esau's heel; so he

was named Jacob" (v. 26). Prenatal conflicts between the twins were forewarnings of future conflicts.

Unfortunately, as parents, Jacob and Rebekah failed some important "teachable opportunities." They failed in teaching their sons to love each other and value their differences, and trust that God would provide

that God would provide for both of them. Instead, the parents showed favoritism. "Isaac loved Esau, because he was fond of game; but Rebekah loved Jacob" (v. 28).

Esau Sells His Birthright, Genesis 25:28-34

Jacob's "grabbing" of his brother's heel at

They failed in teaching their sons to love each other and value their differences, and trust that God would provide for both of them.

birth indicated his future behavior. This is reflected in the "cunning manner" in which he "grabbed Esau's birthright" as if God needed some help. God chose Jacob before birth! But he was also angered by the fact that Esau was so cavalier about his birthright. He sold it to Jacob for a bowl of soup! Jewish culture gave special rights to the first-born son. Upon the father's death, the first-born son would

become the family's patriarch, and he would be entitled to a "double portion" of whatever was inherited from the father. According the scriptures, Esau's actions demonstrated he "despised his 34). birthright" (v. Rebecca even conspired with Jacob to ensure that Isaac, as he was dying, would

bless Jacob instead of Esau. The ensuing conflict forced Jacob to leave home for many years.

Although Jacob and Esau reconciled after a long period of estrangement, the dynamics of their family's dysfunctions led to intergenerational conflicts. Esau's descendants. the Edomites. fought bitterly against Jacob's descendants, the Israelites. This continued until God judged Edom (Obadiah 1:1-21), and Esau was excluded from the Messianic lineage (Malachi 1:2-3; Romans 9:11-14).

SANKOFA

Sidney Poitier, who died at the age of 94 in January 2022, became an icon whose life and legacy have far exceeded human expectations globally.

Bahamian farmers who would travel to Miami, Florida, to sell tomatoes and other produce. Sidney was their seventh child. He became an American citizen at birth because he was born unexpectedly in Miami while his parents were there to conduct business. He was born three months prematurely and not expected

to live. However, his parents remained in Miami for three months until he was healthy enough to go home with them.

He is reported to have moved to Miami when he was fifteen years old. He intended to live with a brother, but he refused to tolerate the racism he found in Florida. So, at age sixteen, he left Florida and moved to New York City. He already aspired to become an actor. This highly

CASE STUDY

Audrey Maame
Esi Swatson's
achievements epitomize
the advantages of
positive family dynamics

and relationships. At the young age of twenty-one, Ms. Swatson overcame fears of flying, resistance associated with being the youngest female in a male-dominated profession, and many other challenges to become Ghana's youngest female commercial pilot. As an active commercial pilot, Ms. Swatson

has earned the rank of *first officer*. She is also the founder, chief operating officer (CEO), and owner of Excel Aviation.

In reflecting on her success, Ms. Swatson shared: "My nuclear family was very supportive. Growing up, they had seen what I could do and what I was not able to do as well. My extended family is not so close, so hearing that I wanted to fly, they questioned my parents if they

would allow me to do what I wanted to do. My dad doesn't listen to negative vibes like that. He'd ask me time and time again If this is what I want to do, and repeatedly, I said yes." She has also credited God and education for being essential to her success in other cases.

LIFE APPLICATION

As disciples, we have biological and spiritual or church family members. Each member of a church brings different attributes to the family. Personality differences, age, education, previous training (employment and spiritual), political affiliations, and functional and dysfunctional families are just a few. Differences can cause divisiveness!

However, a growing love for God is like a strong magnetic field that attracts inclusiveness as it diminishes allegiances to human standards for determining acceptability. Jesus commanded that his disciples view him as a model for loving others. "Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another" (John 13:34).

JACOB CALLED ISRAEL

Lesson Scripture: Genesis 32:22-32 Focus Scripture: Genesis 32:22-32

Key Verse: Then the man said, "You shall no longer be called Jacob, but Israel, for you have striven with God and with humans, and have prevailed." Genesis 32:28 (NRSV)

GENESIS 32:22-32 (NRSV)

- 22 The same night he got up and took his two wives, his two maids, and his eleven children, and crossed the ford of the Jabbok.
- 23 He took them and sent them across the stream, and likewise everything that he had.
- 24 Jacob was left alone; and a man wrestled with him until daybreak.
- 25 When the man saw that he did not prevail against Jacob, he struck him on the hip socket; and Jacob's hip was put out of joint as he wrestled with him.
- 26 Then he said, "Let me go, for the day is breaking." But Jacob said, "I will not let you go, unless you bless me."
- 27 So he said to him, "What is your name?" And he said, "Jacob."
- 28 Then the man said, "You shall no longer be called Jacob, but Israel, for you have striven with God and with humans, and have prevailed."
- 29 Then Jacob asked him, "Please tell me your name." But he said, "Why is it that you ask my name?" And there he blessed him.
- 30 So Jacob called the place Peniel, saying, "For I have seen God face to face, and yet my life is preserved."
- 31 The sun rose upon him as he passed Penuel, limping because of his hip.
- 32 Therefore to this day the Israelites do not eat the thigh muscle that is on the hip socket, because he struck Jacob on the hip socket at the thigh muscle.

GENESIS 32:22-32 (KJV)

- 22 And he rose up that night, and took his two wives, and his two womenservants, and his eleven sons, and passed over the ford Jabbok.
- 23 And he took them, and sent them over the brook, and sent over that he had.
- 24 And Jacob was left alone; and there wrestled a man with him until the breaking of the day.
- 25 And when he saw that he prevailed not against him, he touched the hollow of his thigh; and the hollow of Jacob's thigh was out of joint, as he wrestled with him.
- 26 And he said, Let me go, for the day breaketh. And he said, I will not let thee go, except thou bless me.
- 27 And he said unto him, What is thy name? And he said, Jacob.
- 28 And he said, Thy name shall be called no more Jacob, but Israel: for as a prince hast thou power with God and with men, and hast prevailed.
- 29 And Jacob asked him, and said, Tell me, I pray thee, thy name. And he said, Wherefore is it that thou dost ask after my name? And he blessed him there.
- 30 And Jacob called the name of the place Peniel: for I have seen God face to face, and my life is preserved.
- 31 And as he passed over Penuel the sun rose upon him, and he halted upon his thigh.
- 32 Therefore the children of Israel eat not of the sinew which shrank, which is upon the hollow of the thigh, unto this day: because he touched the hollow of Jacob's thigh in the sinew that shrank.

KEY TERMS

- Israel Jacob's new name given by God at Peniel; derives from the Hebrew language, meaning "fighter of God."
- Peniel The location of Jacob's intense all-night encounter with God as he fearfully anticipated reuniting with his brother, Esau. Jacob named the site *Peniel* to memorialize his

experience: "For I have seen God face to face, and yet my life is preserved" (Gen. 32:30).

INTRODUCTION

A lot happened between last week's lesson and this week's lesson. As you will recall, Jacob was a trickster. Jacob deceptively acquired Esau's birthright, and

with his mother's help, he also stole their father's (Isaac) blessings, which were traditionally bequeathed to the oldest son. Esau was so angry with Jacob that he threatened to kill him (Gen. 27:41). Again, with the aid of his mother, Rebekah, Jacob escaped. She sent him to live in Haran with her brother, Laban.

Laban proved to be a master at

deceitfulness. For twenty years, Jacob was the recipient of many unethical, deceitful deeds perpetrated by his uncle, Laban. God intervened after Jacob had spent twenty years living in Haran as a fugitive from his ancestral home and family. God decided to end Laban's power over Jacob by sending Jacob back to his homeland. As he instructed Jacob to return to his ancestral home and family,

God assured him that he would be with him (Gen. 31:3).

TELLING THE BIBLE STORY

Today's lesson focuses on a pivotal turning point in Jacob's return home and life after that. Jacob is scared! He has many justifiable reasons to be fearful. He had just had a final confrontation with Laban, who

chased after Jacob when he left Haran. The incident with Laban ended with a peaceful resolution that was memorialized in a covenant. However, Jacob has an even greater challenge ahead of him. Returning home means Jacob has to face his brother again. He's been warned that Esau is coming to meet him, and he is bringing four hundred men with

him. In preparing to meet Esau, Jacob demonstrates maturity and growth as he fervently prays to God, reminding him of his promises (Genesis 32:9-12).

Jacob Wrestles with God, Genesis 32:22-26

Jacob is terrified! He has sent gifts ahead of him, hoping to appease Esau. He has also sent his wives, servants, and children ahead. He sent his wives and

children ahead, raising interesting some questions about Jacob's values and priorities, even at this juncture in his life. It is nighttime when Jacob might have expected to be alone. However, he had a visitor, a man who "wrestled with him till daybreak" (Genesis 32:24). Jacob was persistent and demonstrated

strong courage. He continued to wrestle all night to receive a blessing. Jacob survived, but the man struck him on his hip socket, "Jacob's hip was put out of joint as he wrestled with him" (Genesis 32:25). Thus, God's sovereignty and Jacob's dependence on him became physical manifestations.

Jacob's Blessing, Genesis 32:27-32

Jacob is blessed with a new name! Jacob, "the grabber," no longer exists. It was his blessing for "having striven with God and with humans" and having prevailed (Gen. 32:28). His twelve sons and their descendants became known as the twelve tribes of Israel. In the later scriptures, Israel later demonstrated bravery and reconciled with Esau.

Interestingly, God had also blessed Esau.

Esau did not need any of the gifts Jacob offered in his attempts to diffuse any lingering anger Esau might have against him. Most importantly, Jacob is a new man, prepared to fulfill God's plans for his life with a new name.

Because of Esther's courage and obedience, the lives of Mordecai and all of the Jews were saved.

SANKOFA

"For such a time as this" is commonly associated with

communications between Mordecai and Queen Esther, his orphaned niece (Esther 3-8). The phrase was a part of Mordecai's successful appeal to entice the queen, who was also a Jew, to use her influence with King Xerxes to save the Jewish nation from annihilation. Because of Esther's courage and obedience, the lives of Mordecai and all of the Jews were

saved.

"For such a time as this" certainly seems applicable to the life and work of Dr. Kizzmekia Corbett. Dr. Corbett. a thirty-five-year-old African American female, was born in rural North Carolina. Before embarking on higher education ventures at more prestigious institutions, she attended local schools. Fortunately, she had teachers who recognized and helped nurture her gifts during her youth.

springboard, Like her academic achievements, leadership skills, and concerns for the health and wellness of others elevated have Dr Corbett to life-saving roles that benefit the whole world.

Unfortunately, name Dr Corbett's contributions and the fight against the Covid-19 Pandemic are

rarely mentioned in the media. However, at an event hosted by the National Urban League in December 2020, Dr. Anthony Fauci said, "The first thing you might want to say to the African American brothers and sisters is that an African American woman developed the vaccine you're going to be taking." In addition to many other distinguished roles, Dr. Corbett is currently the lead scientist on the Moderna Covid-19 Vaccine Team. She has also undertaken a critically important role as a Covid-19 educator. She particularly reaches out to communities of color because of the disparate impacts of Covid and other longstanding healthcare disparities. She makes herself available to church and school groups and media

> outlets, and videos that are accessible online. Surely, the timeliness and availability of Dr. Corbett's services are blessings to humankind globally.

CASE STUDY

As we have seen with Abraham, Israel, other and people chosen by God, his promises and rewards may be delayed, but God delivers faithfully.

For the first time in history, the National Inventors Hall of fame will become more inclusive with two African American women's induction. One honoree is the late Dr. Patricia Bath, an ophthalmologist and laser scientist who died in 2019. The other is Dr. Marian Croak, a computer engineer.

Dr. Bath was a trailblazer in many endeavors. Her achievements included being the first African American ophthalmology resident at New York University in the 1970s. She was also the first woman elected to be an honorary staff member at UCLA Medical Center in the 1990s. Her greatest honor is recognition for having invented a laser cataract tool, which can vaporize cataract clouds with

minimal invasiveness in the lens of a patient's eyes.

Dr. Marian Croak, also a trailblazer in many endeavors, has been employed at Google since 2014. Dr. Croak is noted for having said her interests in STEM subjects and careers began during her childhood. Fortunately, role models, including

her father and some teachers, encouraged her to pursue her interests. She received an undergraduate degree from Princeton University and her doctorate from the University of Southern California.

Before Google, Dr. Croak was employed with AT&T Bell Labs. At both Google and AT&T Bell Labs, Dr. Croak is

noted for having been an extraordinary leader and inventor with a worldwide impact. Dr. Croak is also noted for having more than 200 patents in voice and data communications. Her most significant achievements have been the development of technology that converts voice or vocal communications to digital signals that enable computergenerated calls or calls from other digital devices. Dr. Croak is currently employed

as vice president of Engineering at Google. From the beginning of her career in 1982 2022. until when she will be inducted into the Inventor's Hall of Fame, forty will have vears passed. However, the recognition which she sorely deserves will come.

LIFE APPLICATION

God has a plan and a purpose for each of our lives. As we look at the lives of Jacob and others in our lesson today, it is obvious that none of us will know either the detailed journey God will take us on or the length of time it will take us to fulfill his purpose. Notably, we can see clearly how, in many cases, God has to

prepare us before we are ready to start the journey. As a fugitive from home, it took Jacob fourteen years to become Israel. Like Israel, he was prepared to serve God's role for him with the new nation.

Likewise. Joseph needed his experiences in Egypt, and Moses needed his time as a sheepherder to prepare for God's purposes. But, what about us? Names had meaning in biblical days. While the legal names on our birth certificates or other official records are not likely to change, it matters how we see ourselves with our names. This is called self-identity, and it impacts how we live our priorities and goals in life.

QUESTIONS:

1. Are you ready to let God define who

- you are and how you live?
- 2. What personal changes do you associate with having surrendered your life to God?
- 3. How would you compare Jacob's behavior when he ran away to Haran with his behavior upon his reunion with Esau?
