Growing thru Grief

Fall Series

"The Questions of Grief" is the theme of the Growing thru Grief Fall Series, led by Margaret Albert from Duke Hospice and Bereavement Services. Since grieving is often



a process of self-discovery, this six-week series explores the questions that arise when we experience a significant loss – questions that may not be easy to answer. By exploring grief from different perspectives and asking difficult questions, we may gain new insights into our unique experience, learn more about the changes we see in ourselves and discover how to navigate adapting to life after loss.

Margaret Albert, LCMHC, NCC

After leaving a 30-year career in communications, Margaret now specializes in supporting people who are grieving a loss. She has served as a bereavement counselor with Duke Hospice Bereavement Services for more than seven years, during which time she also provided mental health counseling to individuals of all ages through in-home therapy and mental health private practice. Her counseling career includes organizing and facilitating support groups, developing and presenting workshops and creating educational opportunities to train hospice staff. Margaret holds a master's degree in mental health counseling from North Carolina Central University, and she is a nationally board-certified counselor.

Topic: The Questions of Grief Sept. 5: What does grief look like?

Our grief seeps into every part of who we are as human beings, and we will explore all of those areas in order to get a better sense of what grief looks like in ourselves.

Sept. 12: How long does grief last?

It can be confusing and scary to see changes in ourselves, and we often wonder if we will always be this way following our loss. In this segment, we will explore the different dimensions of grief, internally and externally, to offer insights into our own experience.

Sept 19: Why is grieving so hard?

We will look at messages we receive when we are mourning, expectations, social norms and secondary losses. During this segment, we explore how past losses, trauma and unresolved issues influence our experience of grief.

Sept 26: Who am I now?

When we lose someone who is significant to us to death, it can cause our sense of self to be shaken. We may question our identity and how we see ourselves and our place in the world. During this segment, we explore why we may feel so lost and how we might discover who we are now.

Oct 3: How do I find a way through grief?

We explore intentional ways to be active participants in grieving and develop a support system to sustain us through mourning. During this segment, we consider the importance of support from others, the practice of self-care and rituals.

Oct 10: What does the future look like?


During this segment, we look at the relationship of being loss-focused versus restoration-focused in our grief, and we reflect on what we have learned in our grief and identify possibilities for living as we move forward.

Growing thru Grief meets each Tuesday, at St. Paul's Lutheran Church, 1200 W Cornwallis from 4-6 pm. We are a coalition of Triangle area religious and civic organizations to offer ongoing support and education to those who mourn. This program combines speakers with small group discussion. Croasdaile Worship


The Croasdaile worship this month will be Thursday, September 28, the Fourth Thursday of the month, at 2:00 pm. All are welcome to come.

The simple farmer recruited to serve as his squire often employs an earthy wit and droll realism to deal with Don Quixote's imagination and idealism – resulting in a knightly tale for the annals of time. Books for the remainder of the year are: *Judas* by Amos Oz on October 19 and *Horse* by Geraldine Brooks on November 16.
