
My Wife Is An Economist



Battle of the Bands - May 30- June 1, 2025 Sign Up For Tours

We are excited to be starting our weekend off on Friday afternoon with an informative and fascinating tour of the **Oxnard Wastewater and Treatment Center**. The tour will last about 1.5 hours. We meet at the plant at 1:00 PM. **You must wear closed shoes**. There is a video presentation followed by an easy1/4 walk (walkers and scooters are ok). Hard hats will be provided and they will take a group photo on a bridge (this is done for all groups). After the tour our hotel is about 25 minutes away and you will take the side streets to get there so it is somewhat scenic.

For those of you who would like to meet for lunch before the tour at 11:45 at a small shopping center that has a Wendy's, Subway and Roasted Chicken food area. It is a few minutes away from the plant at 175 N. Ventura Blvd. After lunch, backtrack a couple minutes to Perkins Road and go .4 miles to the entrance. It is a gated entrance, but they are expecting us and will have docents available.

Be aware that once you exit the freeway you will still have about an 8-mile drive towards the coast to get to the destination. It takes about 45 minutes to get there from Woodland Hills so plan accordingly and check your navigation system.

Saturday

10:00 AM Tour of the Port of Hueneme: 333 Ponoma Street, Port Hueneme. Space is limited to 20 guests. It includes a bus tour of the port and a classroom video presentation. It concerns what comes in and out of the port and from where and how the new tariffs are going to affect the port. Allow 2 hours for the tour. It is about 25 minutes away from our hotel. Meet in the lobby at 9:15 AM so we can car pool as parking is limited.

10:30 AM Tour of the Ventura Botanical Gardens with a docent. It is a 107 acre world class site. Walking is geared for our group. We will meet at the top of the hill and will get directions at the visitor's gate. We have 2 docents available for this tour so RSVP ASAP. It is 15 minutes away, so meet in the lobby at 10 AM to car pool.

1:00 PM Harbor Boat Tour: Doc C-10 1575 Spinnaker Dr

Many of us went last year and really enjoyed this 40-minute comedy tour of the harbor. If you decide to eat lunch afterwards, you can then also take a morning tour. It is 15 minutes away, so meet there or in the lobby of the hotel at 12:30 to carpool. People had trouble finding the correct dock, so remember it is right down the ramp from Brophy's restaurant at the Ventura Harbor Village. Also, there are a number of cute shops to walk around before or after the tour. Space is limited to 24 people. There is a fee of \$350 cash for 24 people in one boat. If we get 24 people, it will be \$15 per person, if less than 24 the cost could go higher. Minimum payment of \$15 due before May 28

We need to have your RSVPs for all of these tours in advance so they can arrange docents for us. Please RSVP via email to Paula Seliga <u>yobclad@sbcglobal.net</u>

There are many places you can visit on your way to the Hotel because our check in doesn't start until 3pm. The following are suggestions of things to do during the day in the area, but you can be as active or restful as you like. The three tours we are offering are sure to be rewarding.

Heritage Square in Oxnard, 715 S. A Street, Oxnard CA (Directions at desk). Please note that Heritage Square is open to the public for tours all day Saturday and Sunday and/or you can take a self–guided tour of the square on your own. Check their website, https://heritagesquareoxnard.com and see all the things to do and see.

Studio Channel Islands Art Center: 2222 Ventura Blvd. Camarillo (805) 383-1368. This gallery is dedicated to bringing local and regional fine art to the community. The exhibit features invitational solo shows and group shows as well as themed exhibitions. It is open to the public Saturdays 11:00AM-3:00PM and is free.

Camarillo Premium Outlets: The outlet stores in Camarillo are well known. They are open from 10am-9pm. 740 Ventura Blvd. Camarillo, CA 93010

Main Street Downtown Ventura: 607 East Main Street. Lots of antique stores, thrift stores and shopping. There are also places to have lunch.

Ojai Olive Oil Ranch: 10AM-4PM 1811 Ladera Rd. Ojai, CA 93023. (805) 646-5964 lnfo@ojaioliveoil.com There is now a charge for guided tours of the olive groves, olive oil mill and tasting room, however they now have a store in downtown Oxnard. Stop on the way down or on the way home.

Carpinteria Harbor Seal Preserve and Rookery: The preserve is home to almost 100 adult seals who give birth through May 31st. Bring binoculars. Nice hiking trail. The easiest thing to do is take the 101 to Ballard Ave. exit. Turn towards the ocean and go into The Bluffs parking lot and follow the footpath that leads down to the bluff, over the railroad tracks then along the bluff top. It is about a half a mile walk.

San Buenaventura Mission: 211 E. Main St. Ventura, CA 9300. Founded on Easter Sunday, March 31, 1782. They welcome visitors from 10:00 AM to 5:00 PM. Known for its beautiful gardens and restored artifacts.

Albinger Archeological Museum 11AM-4PM 113 E Main St. Ventura 9300. Offers displays of local archaeological relics, including items from Chumash Indians and Chinese immigrants. Located next to the San Buenaventura Mission.

Carnegise Art Museum 10 AM-5PM 424 South C Street, Oxnard CA 93030 It is dedicated to showcasing Californian artwork including paintings by famous artists from the regions. Photographer George Hurrell has a prized collection there.

Channel Islands Harbor: There is the Ventura County Maritime Museum there if you are interested in this subject. The entry is free and the docents at the front desk are wonderful. There

is a seafood restaurant and BBQ place there if you want to see it and have lunch. From here you can drive 5 minutes to the Ventura Harbor, which has lots of shops and restaurants to browse around. The boat tours leave from the Ventura Harbor.

The McGrath Farm at 505 North Wood Road, Camarillo, (take the Central Avenue off ramp from the 101). (McGrath is just south of the freeway). It is a sustainable farm that grows organic fruits, vegetables and flowers. There is a farmers' market, farm tours, visits with the farm animals and you can pick your own produce.(There is a \$8.00 minimum to pick.) Open 10AM – 4PM on Saturday and 11 AM to 4PM on Sunday

Downtown Oxnard and Ventura: There are a lot of interesting squares and plazas, parks and buildings to see. If you like antiques, boutiques, thrift stores or window shopping, don't miss Main Street in Ventura off of the California Exit North. Our walking tour will take us to the important sites here.

Ventura Harbor: A delightful area of shops and restaurants to walk around and an interesting Ranger film presentation at the end of the harbor with a 22-minute film of the wildlife and plant vegetation from the Channel Islands. Free parking. *We really enjoyed this when we went there at the last Spring Weekend*

Breweries and Wineries

There are so many wineries and breweries in the area that I didn't know which ones to suggest. You can ask the front desk for recommendations or google them.

Miscellaneous Tips

What do I wear?

This weekend is going to be totally casual. The weather will probably be mild, but check before packing and dress comfortably. You must wear closed shoes for the tour of the Water Plant.
