<u>Sedentary Labor: Learn all about the VA's</u> <u>favorite way to deny VA TDIU Benefits.</u>

The VA has a whole bag of tricks for denying entitlement to VA TDIU benefits.

This, in my opinion, is really a tacky thing for the VA to do.

The veterans seeking a TDIU rating are often earning wages below the <u>poverty threshold – if they are earning</u> <u>anything at al</u>l. Veterans and their families often cannot survive without individual unemployability benefits. The last thing folks surviving on marginal employment, if they are employed at all, is the red tape of a federal government bureaucracy

A common way that the VA denies the 100% rate for veterans eligible for VATDIU benefits is by pretending the law is something it is not. The VA pretends you aren't <u>eligible for TDIU</u> because you don't have the right schedular rating percentages, ignoring that it does not matter what percentage rating you have. If you are unable to work – more specifically, you are unable to <u>get and</u> <u>maintain substantially gainful employment</u> because of a service connected disability, you are entitled to TDIU.

Another trick the VA uses in denying TDIU is denying your claim because you did not submit a VA Form 21-8940 with your claim for individual unemployability / TDIU.

And, from what I am hearing from attorneys working in the new AMA system (<u>AMA is the appeals reform</u> <u>statute that went into effect early in 2019</u>) is that the VA has a whole new bag of tricks for denying TDIU depending on <u>which of the three "lanes" you choose to</u> <u>challenge the denial of your service connected disability</u> <u>claim</u>. More on that later.

One of the VA's favorite reasons for denying TDIU is that the veteran is able to perform sedentary labor. Here's how it works.

In a situation where you are unable to get and keep <u>substantially gainful employment</u> because of your service connected disabilities, a medical examiner will often write in a <u>C&P opinion</u> that you are able to perform "sedentary labor." The term is never defined, but the implication is clear: the <u>C&P examiner</u> thinks the veteran can do some sort of "desk job."

The <u>VA examiner</u> never says what kind of work can be done. He never explains how the veteran has the skills, abilities and training to perform the specific type of work. He never explains whether there are such jobs available where the veteran lives.

The VA believes, I suppose, that as long as the veteran's butt muscles are not the <u>cause of his service-</u> <u>connected disability</u>, he or she can sit at a desk and make a sustainable wage.

Here's the thing. None of that is the law.

In fact, the term sedentary labor is meaningless in your VA TDIU benefits claims and appeals. And when I say meaningless, I mean that the VA should never use the words in a decision denying TDIU.

The term appears in the VA's Adjudication Procedures Manual (aka, the <u>M21 Manual</u>), at Part IV, sbpt. ii, ch. 2, sec. F.2.d (beginning sometime in 2015 through the original writing of this post in July 2019). The <u>M21 manual says</u> that medical examiners may "comment regarding what kind of work tasks or work environments (if any), to include employment that is sedentary in nature and employment requiring physical labor," veterans can perform despite serviceconnected disabilities.

That's not the whole problem though – the VA never defined what the term sedentary labor meant. Though completely in the <u>government's power to issue</u> <u>regulations</u> that articulate a clean legal standard, the VA has never defined the term 'sedentary labor.'

Instead – and this is rich – he asked the <u>Veterans</u> <u>Court</u> to define it for him using the "ordinary meaning" of the phrase. This is a classic example of a government agency "passing the buck."

Well, the Veterans Court didn't take the <u>VA Office of</u> <u>General Counsel</u> bait: it put the ball back in the VA's court in a <u>case known as Withers v. Wilkie</u>.

The Court said:

"[T]he meaning of sedentary work must be determined from the particulars of the medical opinion in which it is used. That is, the Board must explain this meaning—to the extent that it is not apparent from the Board's overall discussion of the opinion—as well as how the concept of sedentary work factors into the veteran's overall disability picture and vocational history, and the veteran's ability to secure or follow a substantially gainful occupation."

In other words, the VA has to explain what it is about the individual veteran's disability and work history that leads the VA to believe that there is a particular type of "sedentary work" that he or she is capable of performing.

The Court went a step further and wrote that "absent such factual context however, the phrase [sedentary labor] can be regarded as conclusory and meaningless on its own."

This is significant – if you are seeking VA TDIU benefits you should take note of the words "absent factual context."

It has long been my philosophy of VA claims that the veteran should take charge of providing the "factual context" for his or her own claim. Veterans should develop and give to the VA their own <u>5 Star Evidence</u> establishing the <u>elements of their particular claim</u>.

To give the VA that factual context in a claim for VA TDIU benefits, there is one type of evidence that may be very helpful: a Vocational Rehabilitation expert opinion.

My law firm works with several experts – one of our favorites is a gentleman named Patrick Clifford.

Patrick is a Vocational Expert by trade. It is his job to look at your work history, training, skills and experience, compare that with what physical and mental abilities remain after the limitations imposed by your serviceconnected disabilities, and opine whether or not you are able to get and keep substantially gainful activity.

<u>Hope for Veterans: The Transitional</u> <u>Housing Program for Homeless Veterans.</u>

My name is Jen Jensen and I am the Admissions Planner at the Hope for Veterans Program (HVP) located on the Lyons VA campus in Basking Ridge (Somerset County) NJ.

Across the county, we continue to see an increase in the number of homeless veterans and often times these veterans are unaware of the assistance that is offered by the VA for transitional housing programs and assistance with locating permanent housing. HVP is a transitional housing program to help veterans who may be struggling with homelessness.

We currently have immediate openings!

Services our program offers include, but are not limited to:

Housing for three to nine months that typically ends in graduation to permanent housing.

Recovery services for individuals experiencing substance use and mental illnesses including depression, post-traumatic stress, anxiety, and other conditions.

Case management services that focus on veteran engagement and linkage to services and supports that promote wellness and recovery.

Access to employment opportunities, educational resources, career support services, and an on-site computer lab.

Individual and group counseling with clinicians and peer led support group.

Access to pro bono legal support for a variety of law related issues.

Maximizing access to benefits and entitlements and counseling in budgeting skills to enhance financial self-sufficiency.

Permanent housing planning and housing search support.

Important note to families of deceased veterans, and/or requestors: *Submitted by* Bob Caggiano It is the right of every deceased Veteran to have a Military honors team attend the graveside service, to present the Flag at no charge to the family. Honors Teams are sent out, at the expense of the US Government.

In January 2000, Congress passed legislation guaranteeing Veterans the right to at least two uniformed servicemen, a flag ceremony, and the playing of TAPS at their funeral. Unfortunately, there are not enough buglers to play TAPS, so the historic melody has been played on a CD player at many Veterans' last ceremony, or more currently on a bugle that plays Taps using an electronic insert. The volunteer organization "Bugles Across America" (a.k.a. BAA) was created to honor the service of veterans by providing Taps live by a bugler using a real instrument (such as a bugle, trumpet, cornet, or flugelhorn) at funerals or any other ceremony requiring a bugler. There are currently over 7500 volunteer buglers nationwide in all 50 states, and some overseas who stand ready to serve. BAA volunteers perform Taps as a free service.

As a Vietnam era veteran member of VVA Chapter 1002 and a BAA volunteer bugler, I am available to play for anyone who needs a bugler for Taps (or other appropriate bugle calls) for any honorable discharged veteran or related military ceremony. In the event I cannot play because of a scheduling conflict, I can generally still provide a substitute bugler so please contact me - Bob Caggiano, USAF Veteran, (973) 222-7591 (cell) or FinalTaps@gmail.com.
