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This congregation knows how much I love the Lenten journey. This Lent feels especially significant and important to me for so many reasons.

Our theme this year is *Repent and Return in Troubled Times*. The theme of repentance during Lent is an obvious choice, but what about the idea of return? And what do we mean by 'troubled times'? To answer that, I invite you to look at the design that is part of our theme: the infinity sign with the heart and cross attached to it.

We know that our faith and spiritual journeys are ongoing and ever-changing. On these journeys we will encounter challenges – as a result of our own actions and decisions as well as circumstances that are beyond our control. It is in these challenges that we can faithfully and grace-fully seek the healing and renewal that repentance brings. Repentance rooted in the word metanoia—is about turning toward a new direction, returning to God, and moving forward with purpose. It's not about feeling terrible; it's about finding hope, joy, and empowerment, even in challenging seasons.

We often speak of repentance – and now we are intentional in remembering that return is a beautiful healing aspect of repentance. Returning to God's loving embrace – just like the Prodigal Son returned to his father's embrace.

And troubled times? Troubled times are a timeless idea shaped by the unique context of our lives. Grief, a health crisis, economic hardship, relationships, politics: these are but a small sample of reasons to feel troubled. Again, the infinity symbol is a reminder that, despite all of our best efforts, troubled times, in some form or another, will inevitably exist. However, the heart and the cross embedded in this symbol are there to remind us that the Good News of God's love, mercy, and justice endure and are always part of our journeys. *(continued on next page)*


<u>Ash Wednesday Service with Imposition of Ashes: The Gift of Broken Vessels</u> March 5 at 6:30 P.M.

How To Meaningfully Observe Lent

Lent is a 40-day period of reflection, repentance, and renewal leading up to Easter. Many Christians observe Lent through the practices of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving.

Here are some suggestions for how you can prepare for and observe Lent:

PRAY

- Spend time each day in prayer. This can be a few minutes in the morning or evening, or longer periods of time for deeper reflection.
- Try different kinds of prayer: traditional liturgical prayers, spontaneous prayers that come from the heart, and lectio divina (a practice of slow, meditative reading and reflection on a passage of scripture).

LET GO

- It is common for people to let go of something ('fast') during Lent by giving up a particular food or activity for the 40-day period.
- If you let go of something, it should be something that is meaningful and challenging for you, but also realistic and sustainable. You can let go of activities or habits that distract you from your time with God, such as social media.

SHARE

- This is the practice of giving to those in need, whether through donations or acts of service.
- Consider giving to organizations that support the poor, the sick, or other vulnerable populations.
- It is not just about giving money or time, but also about giving of yourself. Be open to the ways in which God may be calling you to serve others and to be a presence of love and compassion in the world.

Please remember that these practices are not about public displays of piety or reaching 'earthly perfection.' These practices are meant to deepen our relationship with God and growing our love and compassion for other human beings.

Helping Our Neighbors: Part II

On January 28 our country learned that federal dollars that provide funding for many necessary programs, including the majority of funding for the resettlement of refugees who are legally admitted to the United States through World Relief of the Quad Cities, would be frozen. The chaos this decision is causing is immeasurable. World Relief is decimated: 80% of their funding is impacted, resulting in almost a 90% reduction in their staffing. The staff that will be terminated include the caseworkers assisting hundreds of refugee families in the Quad Cities.

As a result, Hope UCC held a community meeting with representatives of World Relief to find out how we can all help. 35 people from our sibling congregations and community organizations attended. Now it is time for us to act. We will hold a meeting following worship on Sunday, March 9 for anyone intersted in helping with World Relief's efforts. There are many ways to help, from donating needed items, volunteering to be a driver for various clients' appointments, to accompanying a family in their resettlement journey. Please plan to attend so we can coordinate the next steps with George and Samatha from World Relief. Please consider how you might join this mission to support our neighbors and live into our call to serve as God's hands, feet, heart, and voice in this world.




