More from Hap Schadlers' " Memories of a Car Guy"



As it was late and the road deserted I was able to back up to a side road and take this back to Kipling and then south to C470. In this way I found an alternative route past the bus into our sub division at Ken Caryl Valley. Upon getting off the freeway I discovered that much of the right lane was drifted over to the height of the Topaz's fenders, so I completed driving to our house on the wrong side of the road. Our driveway had about four feet of snow drifted over it so I gunned the Topaz and rammed a way up into our driveway before the Topaz was so high sided that it stopped. We were able to get the garage door up and worked our way in from the car. We got inside the house and exhausted went straight to bed. It would take a lot of digging over the next several days to free the Topaz and get out of our subdivision.

In the early 90's things were going well enough that I was able to look at redoing the '65 Mustang Fastback. The Texas weather had been tough on it and the Lacquer paint was peeling off the roof and other areas on the body. The Carburetor had also blown its Power valve and needed rebuilding and rejetting. The car had sat much of the time in Texas and I decided to fix it up and use it for autocrossing so that it would get some regular use besides going to occasional shows and cruises. My friend Bruce at Cooper did body and mechanical work out of his garage to make some additional income and agreed to paint my car if I supplied the paint and \$1000.00. This also meant my preparing the car for painting and helping Bruce on the weekends working on the car. I proceeded with stripping off all the body trim, the bumpers, the front grille and headlights, the wipers, front turn signal lights, rear backup lights, door panels, rear seat panels, door handles and locks, and the side vents. I then drove the car across town to Bruce's house in Aurora where I removed the tail lights and gas cap.

Bruce began work that fall, 1991, and began sanding it down to get off the old paint. I would go by Bruce's house every Saturday and Sunday with a case of Budweiser to help him work on the car. One day he called and asked if I had ever wrecked the passenger side rear quarter panel. I responded that neither I nor my mother had ever done any damage to that part of the car. Bruce showed me the next time I was over that a Ford quarter panel had been welded in sometime before my Dad had bought the car. The only thing Bruce and I could conjure up was that being the winter and a demonstrator car, someone had damaged the car during a test drive and then Rikert Ford had repaired it before putting it up for sale. My Dad had always said he got a good deal on the car and had only paid \$2300 for it which was under the list price. I suspect the damaged quarter panel was why he got such a good price for the car.

Bruce continued to work on the car and finally got to a time in February when he could start shooting the primer. I remember coming over to Bruce's place on a cold Saturday and finding the door to his garage cracked open about a foot with Bruce spraying away inside the garage. After a number of knocks on the door Bruce opened it up. He had a cigarette working between his lips, a wild look in his eyes, a gas heater hooked up by the side door, and a gray fog inside of the garage. I suggested he take a break and resume when the weather was a little warmer. In March we had better weather and the paint started going on. By April Bruce had three good coats of black on the car and asked how it looked. He was a bit dismayed when I said it looked ok, but needed to be color sanded. We drank a lot of beer over the next weekends in April and May as we color sanded with wet/dry 1500 and then wet/dry 2000 grit

sandpaper. Bruce then buffed it out before I took it home to reassemble. There wasn't much time left in June before the Rocky Mountain Mustang Roundup, but I managed to put everything back on the car and get it entered up in Breckenridge. It looked great to my eyes, but not good enough for an award at the show. Bruce's work held up very well and it was 16 years before I decided to repaint the car after adding steel flared fenders.

After the show I started to look into autocrossing again. One of the first events I went to was at Bandimere speedway. They used the upper parking lot and some of the downhill staging area to set up the track which gave it several hairpin type corners and some interesting elevation changes at a couple of the corners. At that time there were no "older" car classes and you were lumped in with new vehicles. I discovered how much of a disadvantage I was at with my old car and as my new friend Rick described it the "bricks" I had as tires. Things had changed a good bit in autocross in the time since I had last participated. The biggest change was in tire technology. New autocross tires were wide and sticky with wear rates of 0 to 20. The days of showing up with the tires you normally drove on and being competitive was gone. This brought about a rethinking on the cars suspension and what would be needed to make it more competitive with Rick's car.

A bigger front sway bar and a rear sway bar were added as well as some 620# front springs. I also added Shelby traction bars and Koni shock absorbers. After a couple of autocrosses I lowered the car by an inch in the front by cutting the springs and in the rear with lowering blocks. New 15" x 7" aluminum rims with BFG autocross tires were next as well as a front disk brake conversion. I also learned that a little negative camber would help with cornering and keep the front tires from wearing out their edges. This all helped

and with a couple of local SCCA driving schools I was soon competitive at least in the class. Not good enough to win, but at least to be within a couple of seconds of the winner. Where the car really shone was at the Mustang Roundup autocross where it was at the top of its class each year. It also did well at Council of Motorsports autocross events. These were autocrosses put on at local tracks and also on city streets back before insurance became prohibitive for these types of events. They were lots of fun with two day events at Second Creek Raceway and Pueblo raceway. We also ran two day events on street courses at Crested Butte, Cheyenne, Parachute and the ski lot at Steamboat. The advantage I had for these events was they had classes for Vintage cars where the SCCA did not. I still remember two corners at the Crested Butte and the Cheyenne street autocrosses that point out some of the reason these events are no longer run. The Crested Butte course had a downhill hairpin right before a restaurant. The Sunday morning we ran this course people were sitting out on the patio by the street drinking their coffee while we roared down the street toward them into the hairpin. Only a couple of hay bales and the curb separated the cars from the folks having their brunch. Cheyenne was almost as bad as I remember a turn on the downtown city streets that apexed at a book store/coffee shop where people were crowded on the corner watching us run. Again only a couple of hay bales and the curb provided any separation.

Sara also joined me for many of these autocross events and drove the '85 GT convertible. She was very quick and did well in the ladies classes. Mustang Roundup events had bragging rights for the year and the couple of times where she posted a better time than mine I heard about it for the year. The '85 was starting to look and drive a little rough and during one of its trips to my friend Donny Seyfer's shop for some maintenance someone climbed over his wire fence, cut through the convertible top, and tried to take out the Ford radio. More to come....

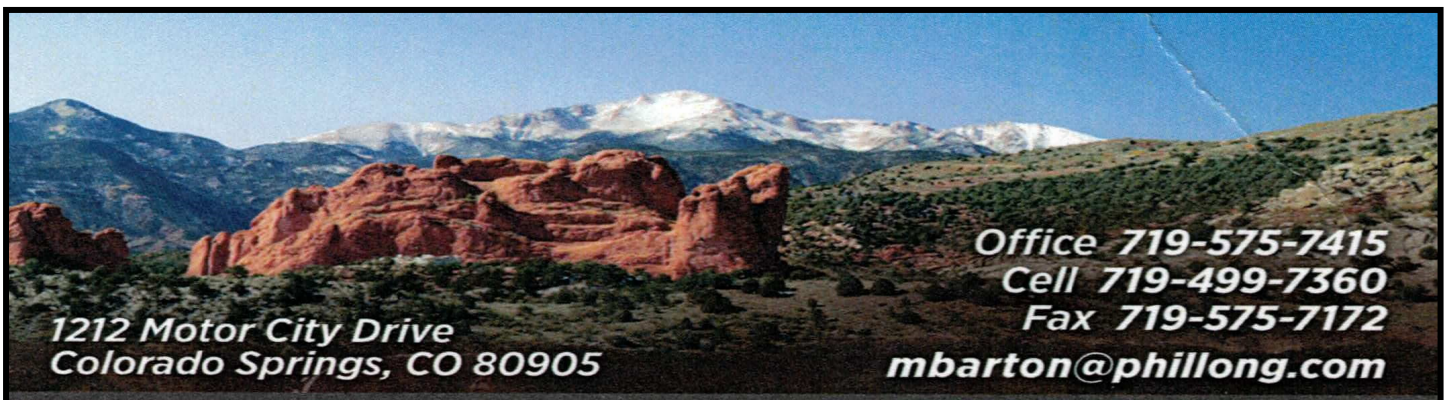
