


Kayleen Reusser, author & historian



History of Our WWII Round Table

Did you know one of our early members crash-landed in Turkey during WWII?

The late Earl Zimmerman was one of the WWII RT's early members, and a past president. In the photo here he was speaking to a class at Butler University where Bill Ervin was teaching. "Zimmy" as he was affectionately called by his friends had an incredible ability to tell stories. The *Butler Collegian* wrote in 2008, that Earl Zimmerman began his military career in the US Army Air Corps in 1942. His radio background was useful while he was stationed in Ankara, Turkey.

During his third mission, Operation TIDAL WAVE, their plane ran out of gas and crash landed in neutral Turkey. Technically a POW in a neutral country, he had relatively free reign to do as he wanted so he set up a radio station in the US Embassy. According to his oral history interview with the Library of Congress Veteran History Project, he served in the 525th Bomb Sqn., 379th BG, of the 8th Air Force. While in Ankara, he lived pretty well—it was a break from the terror bombing over Crete and Italy. "I lived in a good hotel and we used to go have a nice meal and we'd run into the German ambassador, Franz von Papen. The owner of the restaurant made sure we sat on the other side of the restaurant, and we had a nice little band playing music." He remembered as prisoners they promised the following: "We'd get up in the morning and

we'd go to the restaurant to eat. We'd sign a parole not to escape. . . . When you come back and sign in [at the hotel], then you can escape. . . . " which he eventually did via a night train to Egypt.



Operation TIDAL WAVE is more frequently known as the low level bombing raid to Ploesti, Romania in August 1943 to knock out the oil refineries. [More on this topic in the August 2021 newsletter] Zimmy was also part of OSS operations. This included Operation CARPET BAGGER in January 1944 when he dropped agents into Norway and Sweden. He finally came home from England with a war bride—and presented her with a bracelet of gold escape coins!

WWII Roundtable member and veteran, Russell Desserich, served in Navy Reserve Squadron, VP93. Desserich was born on May 26, 1943 in Cincinnati, Ohio and passed away on August 18, 2020. Russ received his Bachelor's degree from the University of Cincinnati. He served active duty in the U.S. Navy from 1967 to 1973, and in the Naval Reserves from 1973 to 1994, retiring with the rank of Captain. He spent most of his very successful career at Intel Corp., selling microcontrollers and managing a sales team. A former co-worker said, "His advice and counsel were invaluable. He was much much more than a great salesman. He was a leader, and we all will miss him." Another friend said, "Russ was indeed a true gentleman in every sense. He was a role model for character and integrity – and fun... He made the world a better and more interesting place."

History Gems from WWII Round Table Files



War against the Empire of Japan in its final days . . . In an effort to save lives, leaflets were dropped for citizens to read and at the bottom lists the "doomed" cities. . .

ATTENTION JAPANESE PLOPLE

"Read this carefully as it may cave your life or the life of a relative or friend. In the next few days the military installations in four (or more) of the cities named on the reverse side will be destroyed by American books. These cities contain military installations and workshops or factories which produce military goods. We are determined to destroy all of the tools of the military clique which they are using to prolong this useless war. But, unfortunately, bombs have no eyes. 30, in accordance with American's well-income humanitarian policies, the American Air Force now gives you warning to evacuate the cities named and save your lives.

America is not fighting the Japanese people, but is fighting the military clique which has enclaved the Japanese people. The pages which America will bring will free the people from the oppression of the military clique and mean the emergence of a new and better Japan.

You can restore peace by demanding new and good leaders who will end the war-

We can not promise that only these cities will be among those attacked, but at least four will be, so heed this warning and evacuate these cities immediately."

The list of doomed cities, printed on the opposite side me leaflet follows:

AOMORI, NISHITOMIYA, OGAKI, KURUME, ICHIKOMIYA, UWAJIMA, NAGAOKA, KORIYAMA, HAKODATE, UJIYAMADA AND TSU

As the documents on the previous page indicate, "America [was] not fighting the Japanese people, but [was] fighting the military clique which has enslaved the Japanese people." The leaflet listed cities, but "we cannot promise that only these cities will be among those attacked, but at least four will be, so heed this warning and evacuate these cities immediately." Firebombing raids continued over Japan, culminating with the most lethal raids on August 6thand and August 9th when an atomic bomb was dropped first over Hiroshima and then Nagasaki. The immediate loss of life was estimated in excess of 200,000 people. Finally on August 15, Emperor Hirohito offered surrender—the other military were unwilling to concede defeat. The Japanese people heard their emperor's voice on the radio for the first time.

The instrument of surrender was signed formally on **September 2, 1945** on the deck of the USS *Missouri* (BB 63) in Tokyo Harbor. The deck log of the *Missouri* lists in detail all the dignitaries representing the U.S., Republic of China, United Kingdom, British Pacific Fleet, USSR, Commonwealth of Australia, Dominion of Canada, Republic of

Aboard the USS *Missouri*, this instrument of surrender was signed on September 2, 1945, by the Japanese envoys Foreign Minister Mamora Shigemitsu and Gen. Yoshijiro Umezu. Prepared by the U.S. War

France, Commonwealth of New Zealand, United Kingdom of Netherlands, and the Japanese Empire.

Two ships, the USS *Buchanan* and USS *Nicholas*, came aside the *Missouri* and Fleet Admiral Nimitz and General of the Army Mac Arthur came aboard, followed by Japanese representatives. At 9:02 AM the ceremony commenced and the Instrument of Surrender was presented to all parties.

The deck log lists all the participants from the US Navy and the US Army who were present at the signing, as well as officers of other nations.



Department and approved by President Harry S. Truman, it set out in eight short paragraphs the complete capitulation of Japan. The short second paragraph went straight to the heart of the matter: "We hereby proclaim the unconditional surrender to the Allied Powers of the Japanese Imperial General Headquarters and of all Japanese armed forces and all armed forces under Japanese control wherever situated."

Whereas V-J Day on August 14th had celebrated the end of the war in the Pacific , the war was truly over with the Surrender ion the USS *Missouri* in September.


Another new board member is **Art Liphard** and we'll include information about him next month.

Major John G. Emery in World War I & Early Leader of the American Legion



This monograph is based on Emery's personal letters, military papers, journals, his personally authored American Legion magazine articles, and two albums of photographs. It offers an intimate look at soldiers' day-to-day life on the battlefields of France and their poignant encounters with French citizens in war-torn communities. This hardcover 8 ½ x 11 book is 180 pages and includes an index. It features more than 250 of his photographs, dozens of original maps, personal letters, and reminiscences about his WWI experiences in the 18th Infantry, 1st Division, of the AEF. After the war, Emery who was from Grand Rapids, Michigan, was the 3rd commander of The American Legion. He led and similarly documented the Legion's 250-man delegation to France in 1921. \$35.00 includes media rate shipping and handling.
