


Grace & Peace: From the Pastor's Desk

Pastor Karen will be on vacation September 9-16

"I was glad when they said unto me, 'Let us go into the house of the Lord." Psalm 122:1

I have recently read the book "Anatomy of a Revived Church" written by Thom S. Rainer and presented a portion of it to the Congregational Council, but I believe it to be important enough to share with each of you. Rainer wrote the book after studying churches that chose to die and publishing "Autopsy of Deceased Church" in 2014 with hopes of keeping other churches alive. That book was very successful. Rainer then determined he needed to write a book on healthy churches that thrive; thus "Anatomy of a Revived Church" was published in 2020.

There are 7 outstanding characteristics of churches that thrive, each a chapter in Rainer's second book. The overriding thought is that the churches he studied chose to change before they died. Is it important to you that Immanuel Lutheran survives beyond your lifetime? Are you invested enough to work to keep the church alive? If so, this article is for you.

The first chapter is Accepting Responsibility. Stop looking at other people or situations to blame for the decline in attendance. If you would, read Acts 6:1-7 and determine how the church in Jerusalem moved from blame to obedience and discover the immediate result of their obedience. Then ask yourself what it means to accept responsibility.

Chapter 2 is Overcoming the Traps of Tradition. Begin with prayer. Pray for Immanuel. Ask God for discernment of anything that Immanuel holds onto simply because it is for our own comfort, routine, or preference rather than having a God-centered purpose.

Expanding the Scorecard is the name of the third chapter. What on earth does a church have that requires a scorecard? Its health. The scorecards are attendance, financial giving, group-ministry, and conversions. Do we pay attention to what our church is doing as a group to minister to others? Do we know how many people have been converted to Christians because of our ministry?

Chapter 4: Committing to Powerful Prayer. "I have yet to see a sustained church that was not undergirded by a powerful movement of prayer" (Rainer, Anatomy of a Revived Church, pg. 59). Do you have any ideas for how a prayer ministry can take place at Immanuel?

The characteristic discussed in Chapter 5 is Dealing with Toxins. Things will not get better on their own, the problem does not get better when ignored, it gets worse. Negativity and disunity will destroy a church. If you would, read Matthew 18:15-17.

Seeking Silver Bullets No More is the title of Chapter 6. The silver bullet sentence begins with, "If only we had..." Rainer says that if you depend on silver bullets as a solution it is guaranteed not to happen (pg. 84). What revitalizes a church is members, the majority of the members, not just a few, take responsibility to follow God's lead and do the work of the church. If you will, read Matthew 28:19-20 and Acts 1:8.

The seventh principle found in Chapter 7 is Choosing Meaningful Membership. "Membership is not having your name on a roll,... Ultimately, membership is about belonging and contributing" (Rainer. Anatomy of a Revived Church, pgs. 96-97). Contributing means more than financial contributions. It means praying for the church, discerning where God needs you to minister with the church, and acting on that discernment.

The book closes with the conclusion: Change or Die. The subtitles are: Beyond Worship Wars, Beyond Prolonged Meetings, Beyond Facility Focus, Beyond Program Driven, Beyond Inwardly Focused Budgets, Beyond Inordinate Demands for Pastoral Care, Beyond Attitudes of Entitlement, Beyond Anger and Blame, Beyond Evangelistic Apathy and Beyond Resistance to Change.

I share this book with you because I care about the ministry of Immanuel Lutheran, and I want to see you live abundantly. I invite you, if you are concerned about our church, to get a copy of the book and read it. If there is interest in discussing the book we can get together and do so, but discussing isn't the end, praying isn't the end, these are just the beginnings of a new chapter.

Most of you know that I will be having a total knee replacement on Oct. 2. Bill and I have chosen for me to stay with my friend Sue in Franklin for the first few weeks of recovery because of our dogs and the danger they pose to my recovery. However, I will be available to talk on my cell phone, so if there's anything you need, please don't hesitate to call me on my cell 724-557-2386. Reviewing Immanuel's Constitution — For Communication and Transparency

As some of you know, the congregation had a Listening Committee from the North Western PA Synod interview church members on August 28 and 29 of this year. Unfortunately this event was not widely publicized and many of you were not aware of the opportunity to speak with the committee. However, we have received the results, and their recommendations are for the congregation council to review our church's constitution. Since Immanuel's constitution hasn't been updated in a few years, and as the 2025 Churchwide Assembly has produced a new model constitution for congregations of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (current as of August 2025), your congregational council has determined to update the constitution (as necessary) as we review it together with the bishop or her representative present at our council meetings.

The church council has been directed to review Chapter 9 for our upcoming meeting on October 12, 2025. Any changes to the current constitution must be voted on by the congregation. I will do my best to keep you informed of the discussion and changes to the constitution. (Please know that any church member can attend a council meeting.)






Due to recent changes in funding, West Millcreek Food Pantry has seen shortages of canned fruits and vegetables and canned tuna.

The Color Red and Why it is so Important

In the Lutheran religion, the color red symbolizes the fire of the Holy Spirit, seen at Pentecost, and the blood of Christ and the martyrs. It is used for events and seasons associated with the Holy Spirit's presence and power, such as Pentecost, as well as for commemorating martyrs, celebrating the <u>Reformation</u>, and during events like <u>ordinations</u> and installations. Red represents passion, fervor, and strength, reflecting the life-giving power of the Spirit and the willingness of the faithful to shed their blood for Christ.

The Holy Spirit:

Red is the color of fire, symbolizing the descending flames of the Holy Spirit during Pentecost, when the church was born.

Martyrs:

♦ It honors the martyrs, those who have shed their blood for the Christian faith and, and serves as encouragement for current believers to be resolute in their own faith.

Reformation:

Red is the liturgical color for Reformation Sunday, symbolizing te power of the Holy Spirit that inspired the movement and its lasting message of grace.

Passion & Fervor:

♦ The color red embodies zeal and fervent commitment to the Christian faith, representing a powerful display of God's love and the strength God's people are given.

Festive Occasions:

Red is also a festive color used for other congregational celebrations, such as dedications, anniversaries, and ordinations, highlighting the celebratory nature of these events.

Chicken Stew and dumplings

Chicken Stew:

- 1 (3 pound) rotisserie chicken
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 1 onion, diced
- 2 ribs celery, sliced thin
- 2 tablespoons all-purpose flour
- 2 (14.5 ounce) cans chicken broth
- ³/₄ pound new potatoes, cut into 1/2-inch dice
- 2 cups frozen mixed vegetables
- 1 teaspoon salt
- ½ teaspoon ground black pepper
- ½ teaspoon dried basil
- 1/4 teaspoon dried thyme



Dumplings:

- 1 ½ cups all-purpose flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- ½ teaspoon salt
- 3 tablespoons cold butter, cubed
- ³/₄ cup milk, or more as needed
- 2 tablespoons dried dill

To prepare the stew: Debone rotisserie chicken; cut meat into chunks or shred. Set aside.

Melt butter in a large Dutch oven over medium heat; cook and stir onion and celery in hot butter until soft, about 10 minutes. Sprinkle in flour and whisk continuously to make a thick roux, about 2 minutes. Slowly pour in broth, whisking to remove any lumps. Add potatoes, frozen vegetables, salt, black pepper, basil, and thyme. Cover and cook over medium heat until vegetables are tender, 15 to 20 minutes. Stir in chicken meat and continue to simmer.

Meanwhile, make the dumplings: Combine flour, baking powder, and salt in a large bowl; cut in butter with 2 knives or a pastry blender until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Stir in milk and dill until dough comes together.

Drop rounded tablespoonfuls of dough into simmering stew. Cook, uncovered, for 10 minutes. Cover and cook until dumplings are tender, 8 to 10 minutes more.
