## The Rector writes

Dear Friends,

'We plough the fields and scatter the good seed on the land; But it is fed and watered by God's almighty hand'

As a child, growing up in a large market town environment, I had little idea of how our food was produced. I always loved Harvest Festival, and sang with gusto about ploughing the fields etc, but the produce with which we decorated the church came from the local weekly market or the supermarket and my idea of scattering seed was derived from a picture in the Children's Bible of the sower going out to sow, taking seed from a shoulder bag and flinging it in all directions.

I realise, too, how little I was aware of the gradual changing of the seasons. The year was divided into school terms, plus the highlights of Easter (eggs!), Christmas (stockings!) and birthdays (presents! cake!) How different, now, living in this beautiful place, as I sit in my study looking out over the Clee Hills, intensely conscious of the sheer bounty of nature and the work of those who labour to produce our food, and the gradual changes from spring to summer, autumn to winter. But I have also come to see another meaning in the well-loved lines of the harvest hymn. As those who care about the wellbeing of our world and our fellow beings, we are all called to work the ground and scatter good seed wherever we are, and though we may not see for ourselves the harvest we have prepared, we trust that our work and commitment have not been in vain. We might reflect that each one of us is somebody's 'harvest', the harvest of all the love, teaching and examples we have received throughout our lives. When we mourn the death of a loved one, we reflect on the rich harvest they have left us.

St Paul describes 'the fruit of the Spirit': love, joy, peace, patience, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. We all know or have known people who have shown the characteristics Paul describes. At this season of harvest let us give thanks for all those whose love and wisdom have inspired, guided and encouraged us. And let us, in our turn, till the ground and sow the seed for harvests still to come, praying that our efforts may be 'fed and watered', blessed, 'by God's almighty hand'.

This year harvesting took place much earlier due to the extremely hot weather but that hasn't always been the case. I can remember many years ago, having had such terrible weather during the summer months, my late husband was still trying to gather in the last field of barley in early November. Needless to say it wasn't a good crop! In ancient times the moons phases were used to guide farming practices. Harvesting took place according to the waxing and waning of the moon as it would affect the fullness of the ears of corn. They also believed that the dark of the moon would prevent decomposition and pest infection in stored crops. Harvesting fruit-bearing crops at the full moon was thought to maximise their energy and properties and I'm sure that these beliefs are probably still significant today.

I wonder what October means to you? For me it's a month of family birth-days and anniversaries, wearing warm winter woollies and a time to settle down in the evening by a warm fire as the nights grow colder and darker. Watching the leaves turn into amazing colours leaving a splendid carpet of gold, red and brown on the grass reminds us that winter is almost upon us.

Next month our Remembrance service will be held on Sunday November 9th at 10.30am prompt followed by refreshments after the service .

### **ROYAL CONNECTIONS**

If you walk from the Old Chapel café down towards the Country Park, the road turns sharp left and on that corner is a gateway that has a splendid view. Below you is the Country Park, in the distance is Highley and on the horizon is the Titterstone Clee Hill. To the left of Highley is a large building covered in a white sheet. This is Kinlet Hall. Now a private residence, it was once a Moffat School, before that the seat of the Lacon Childe family and before that the seat of the Blount family. The Blounts were wealthy land owners and connected to royalty. There is a pub dedicated to them, The Blount Arms, between Far Forest and Cleobury Mortimer, and they owned land around Alveley. Between 1544 and 1551 Sir George Blount (1513-1581) was involved in a dispute with a John Howell of Alveley regarding land near Old Hall. It seems Farmer Howell had been grazing his livestock on fields belonging to Sir George and then claimed that he owned them. Sir George, who was also a member of parliament, succeeded to the title on the death of his father Sir John Blount (1471-1531) who was so well connected that his daughter Elizabeth (1500-1539), always known as 'Bessie', was appointed as a Lady -in-waiting to Queen Catherine of Aragon (1485-1536) the first wife of King Henry the 8th. Bessie then became Henry's mistress from around 1514 for about 8 years or so until the affair came to light. She gave birth to Henry's only recognised illegitimate son who became Henry Fitzroy Duke of Richmond and Somerset.

The church of Saint John the Baptist at Kinlet stands alone next to the main house which is grade one listed. The village was moved almost a mile away so that it didn't ruin the view. (The same thing happened at Morville). In the chancel are two magnificent effigies, one of Sir Humphrey Blount (died 1477) and the other of Sir John. Both are accompanied by their wives, swords, daggers, dogs and an assortment of weeping mourners. Sir George's gigantic monument is in a side chapel and is one of the finest in the country. He and his wife are both kneeling as a sign of piety but in front of Sir George is his armoured helmet just in case you assumed he was a push over. So, apart from owning a lot of land in our village, what has all this got to do with Alveley?

In medieval times there was a cult of saints. People believed that saints were closer to God and could intercede on your behalf bringing help, blessings and protection in times of trouble. One of these saints was Saint Armel. He was a 6th century holy man born in Glamorgan, South Wales, celebrated for taming

a dragon and being the patron saint of hospitals. He was a warrior monk and founded two monasteries in Brittany. Some historians believe he may have been a Breton Prince and also may have actually been King Arthur.

The first Tudor King was Henry the 7th. He became King after defeating Richard the 3rd at the battle of Bosworth Field in 1485. Richard was found buried in a car park in Leicester in 2012. Henry went on to marry Elizabeth of York the daughter of Edward the 4th which ended the war of the roses (1455-1487). On a particularly stormy sea crossing Henry prayed to Saint Armel and credited him with his safe arrival. As a result of this Sir John Blount commissioned and paid for a stained glass window dedicated to Saint Armel. If you stand with your back to the pulpit in Saint Mary's and look up to the opposite side, the bottom left stained glass window is of Saint Armel. His image is partially eclipsing three suns which were the symbols of the dynasty of York. The three suns represent the Holy Trinity blessing the three Yorkist brothers Edward, George and Richard. Three suns had appeared in the sky at the Battle of Mortimers Cross in 1641 and they were convinced it was a sign from God and led them to victory. Henry was a Lancastrian and this window is clear political propaganda and shows conspicuous loyalty to the Tudor dynasty.

## **TALKING POINT**

After years of Government financial cutbacks, especially on the local government front, we have now reached the point of no return on Shropshire Council.

When we took over the administration in May we knew that there was a possibility of having to take really really tough action

On Wednesday 10<sup>th</sup> of September, the Liberal Democrat administration cabinet formally declared that the county was in a state of financial emergency.

If we had not taken this action, the reality is that the council will literally run out of money early in the new calender year.

That would mean a section 114 would be called and the government would send in faceless bureaucrats to slash services even more than they are at at the present.

No one wants that scenario.

We have the next few months to save between £6 million and up to £15 million that will prevent a section 114 being set.

Every employee from the Chief Executive down through all the ranks, has to question every single penny that is being spent and has to ask themself: "Is this expenditure really necessary and can I do it better and possibly cheaper?".

I really feel for all of the extremely hard working staff who have gone through years of cutbacks and worries about loosing their livelihoods and still they soldier on giving their best to the general public.

It's good to see the Chartwell site on Stourbridge Road being developed, with the new retail food outlets due to open in the next month or so. It all looks good for local employment in the town as they will require staff. ALDI and the Aluminium factory are also displaying banners advertising vacancies. It all helps top up the coffers as they start paying more into the system.

Money coming in is always good, however some anti-social elements are willing to throw it away out of pure selfishness. There was a fly-tipping incident at Six Ashes a few days ago where a load of timber and felt, full of nails, was discarded in a field gateway, preventing a hard working farmer from accessing his animals.

Your money had to be spent removing it.

I am sure every reader could be spending that money on better causes.

### SUSTAINABILITY

Locally, the September Bridgnorth Repair Café was a great success, with the next event planned for the New Year, to avoid any conflicts with Christmas activities. The new Pantry Severn Refill Shop Café has officially opened its doors, so swing by and support local, eco-friendly options that make a difference and help Prevent Pointless Plastic! Sustainable Bridgnorth is starting to gear up for next spring's Green Festival, and would love you to join the organising committee! Monthly meetings are kicking off soon, and volunteers for the festival day will also be required. Interested? In UK news, the House of Lords has proposed amendments to the government's planning and infrastructure bill that could require all new buildings in England to include bird-safe glass, swift bricks for nesting, and hedgehog corridors—making our urban developments more welcoming for wildlife! In Scotland destructive bottom trawling in marine sites has been banned, and there has been a conservation success with the recent birth of a golden eagle chick while three white-tailed eagle chicks have successfully fledged from wild nests. Plus, the UK government is banning the burning of deep peat—essential for carbon capture, supporting wild-life, and flood prevention.

Further afield, Finland and Poland are working to restore their wetlands and ailing peat bogs to combat climate change and promote environmental sustainability, while also forming defence barriers to hinder potential military threats along their borders with Russia. A new census by the National Alliance for Jaguar Conservation has revealed a 30% increase in Mexico's jaguar population since 2010. In Western Australia, the Exmouth Gulf's rich biodiversity has been recognised and is set to become a marine reserve, safeguarding habitats for dugongs and migrating humpback whales. Meanwhile, South Australia is tackling plastic waste by banning those pesky fish-shaped soy sauce containers!

And on the green energy front, a record \$386 billion (£286bn) was invested globally in the first half of this year—up 10% from last year! The UK is also leading the charge with a record number of renewable energy planning permissions granted between April and June. Global solar installations have already jumped by a whopping 64% this year, with China producing 60% of the world's wind turbines and 80% of solar panels. Plus, scientists are exploring the potential of solar arrays in space for decarbonising Europe's energy grid! Researchers from King's College London have assessed a design by NASA for solar generation and discovered it could slash energy battery storage by over two-thirds plus reduce reliance on land-based renewable energy by a whopping 80% as well as saving money - up to 35.7 billion euros per annum! One small glow in the great unknown, one giant leap for a greener home!!

## ALL IN THE MONTH OF OCTOBER

750 years ago, on 27<sup>th</sup> Oct 1275 the city of Amsterdam in the Netherlands is traditionally considered to have been founded.

200 years ago, on 25<sup>th</sup> Oct 1825 Johann Strauss II, was born. This Austrian composer is best known for his waltzes, including *The Blue Danube*.

125 years ago, on 20<sup>th</sup> Oct 1900 the American aviation pioneers the Wright Brothers made their first untethered glider flight at Kill Devil Hills, in North Carolina.

100 years ago, on 13<sup>th</sup> Oct 1925 Margaret Thatcher, Baroness Thatcher, was born. She was the first woman Prime Minister of Britain (1979-90). (Died 2013.)

90 years ago, on 12<sup>th</sup> Oct 1935 Luciano Pavorotti, Italian operatic tenor, was born. Considered one of the finest tenors of the 20<sup>th</sup> century, and one of the most commercially successful of all time. (Died 2007.)

70 years ago, on 20<sup>th</sup> Oct 1955 *The Return of the King*, the third and final part of J.R.R. Tolkien's *The Lord of the Rings*, was published.

65 years ago, on 12<sup>th</sup> Oct 1960 at a meeting of the UN General Assembly in New York, the Soviet leader Nikita Khrushchev is reported to have removed his shoe and pounded his table, in protest at a speech by another delegate.

Also 65 years ago, on 30<sup>th</sup> Oct 1965 Diego Maradona was born. The Argentine football player, manager and coach is regarded as one of the greatest football players in history. (Died 2020.)

60 years ago, on 8<sup>th</sup> Oct 1965 the Post Office Tower (now the BT Tower) in London was officially opened. It was the tallest building in the UK until 1980.

40 years ago, on 1<sup>st</sup> Oct 1985 riots broke out in Toxteth in Liverpool and Peckham in London. Five days later (6<sup>th</sup> Oct) Met Police Constable Keith Blacklock was killed in the Broadwater Farm housing estate riot in Tottenham. He was the first British constable to be killed in a riot since 1833.

Also 40 years, on 26<sup>th</sup> Oct 1985 the Australian government returned the ownership of Uluru / Ayers Rock to the local Pitjantjatjara people, on condition that they lease it to the National Parks and Wildlife Agency for 99 years.

25 years ago, on 26<sup>th</sup> Oct 2000 the BSE Inquiry Report was published in the UK. It concluded that the BSE (Mad Cow Disease) epidemic was caused by the use of infected meat and bone meal in cattle feed.

15 years ago, on 13<sup>th</sup> Oct 2010 33 Chilean miners who had been trapped underground for 69 days following the collapse of the San Jose copper-gold mine were rescued. Around one billion TV viewers around the world watched them being pulled to the surface one-by-one, in a specially designed capsule.

### THE BACK PAGE

I'm not much of a shopper, but I did venture out with the Head Gardener recently into her supermarket of choice. The first thing I noted was the array of 'smart shop' scanners. I think for me they would be anything but smart - I would almost certainly have a disaster and end up scanning some items twice or scanning an item then changing my mind. It doesn't take a lot to confuse me these days, but I'm with The Head Gardener: shop, then take your trolley to a manned till where you can speak to a human being who will scan your goods accurately and charge you the correct amount. It also helps keep someone in a job, of course.

Having negotiated the rack of smart scanners, the next thing I noticed was a stack of mince pies, with a 'use by' date of mid-September. I do enjoy a mince pie at Christmas and I suppose there's no reason why they shouldn't be sold all year round, but I admit to being surprised.

Walking around the store I was reminded that you can buy virtually any fruit or vegetables at any time of the year, irrespective of whether it is in season. How times have changed. When I was a boy - more decades ago than I care to remember - we ate seasonally, largely what my father grew in the garden or on his allotment. In those far-off days we had no fridge or freezer, just a larder. For younger readers, a larder was designed to keep cold in the hottest weather. They had slate or marble shelves two or three inches thick. These shelves were wedged into thick stone walls. Fish, meat or vegetables were laid directly onto the shelves and covered with muslin to retain some freshness.

These days fruit and vegetables accrue more air-miles than the well-travelled businessman - is that really such a good thing, or am I just a grumpy, nostalgic old man?
