THE MEDVIL MESSENGER





Our community's 45-yearold infrastructure is nearing the end of its useful life. Aging water lines are the

cause of very high-water bills, with breaks occurring without the obvious signs of water bubbling above ground due to our very sandy soil. This allows leaks to go undetected, sometimes for months or more. Sewer lines that are very thin walled are crushing due to deep frost in our roads; a couple happened this past winter. With 3 ½ miles of roads, replacing all the aging water lines and

replacing the sewer service lines under the streets is estimated to cost 11 million dollars and so the board is reviewing the most cost-effective ways to replace, our infrastructure over time. Applying for grants and seeking low interest loans will be part of the strategy going forward. Membership meetings will be held soon to talk about such opportunities to cover roughly ¼ of the infrastructure in the next year.

Staffing issues persist as we advertise again for fulltime help. The second position is an ongoing problem, with it becoming a revolving door. We continue to increase the pay rate for this position to attract better quality candidates, but the competition for quality staff continues to be a challenge in this low unemployment, competitive New Hampshire market.

Several regional gate valves that are not working will be repaired and two new street drains on Donald Drive will be the next projects in the coming month.

Temporary speed bumps are helping to slow folks down as we do our best to remind people that we have a 15 mile per hour speed limit. When that doesn't work, the next step is more permanent speed bumps, which no one wants and which make it more difficult to plow in the winter, sometimes causing damage to our plows. We ask everyone to take notice of their speed and to report others speeding to help us maintain a safe community for all our residents as they get themselves and their dogs some exercise. I see grandchildren riding bikes from time to time and their safety is also a concern for all of us.

The board will be doing its fall ride around to review the condition of lots in our community as well as to review the need for dangerous tree removal for the coming year. The date will be announced as we hope to see you out and about. We will have the usual hot cider and donuts to share as we tour the community.

Until next month, enjoy the coming fall season.

RULE REMINDER

MEDVIL COOPERATIVE WATERING RULES

D. SITES

- 10) Irrigation (sprinkler) systems must be properly designed and approved by the Board of Directors prior to installation. A copy of the approved design plan will be placed in the homeowner's file.
- 11) Watering Utilization. Be aware of when and how much you water your lawns. Watering should take place every other day (use your house number and water on the odd or even days accordingly) and is to be limited to twenty minutes (20") per zone. The best time to water is early morning (not during the heat of the day) and not at night because the lawn stays wet for a longer period of time which can promote the growth of moss and affect the health of your grass. Sprinklers must be turned off during rainy or windy weather conditions. Lawn watering is also subject to the restrictions of the Grasmere Water District:

Water Use

- a) Lawn watering is prohibited between the hours of 5:00-8:00AM and 5:00-8:00PM.
- b) Watering restrictions apply between May 1 and October 1.
- c) Odd numbered homes will water on odd numbered days; even numbered homes water on even numbered days. This ensures that only half of the homes in Medvil are using water during the designated watering times.
- d) Homes with automatic sprinkler systems will operate between 3:00 and 4:00AM every other day as outlined above and no more than twenty minutes (20") per each zone.
- e) Homes with manual sprinkler systems will water each zone for no more than twenty minutes (20") every other day as outlined above.
- f) New automatic sprinkler systems should install operating rain sensors set to detect one quarter inch $(\frac{1}{4})$ of rain.
- g) Homeowners are responsible for repairs/replacements of any sprinkler

heads/piping to a system that does not maintain a one-foot (1') setback from the road.

This month, I want to start by giving a HUGE thanks to the Fundraising Committee! When I approached the BOD asking for money for supplies, Irene Gagne, the chair of the committee, invited me to their meeting to present our needs and proposed budget. When I got to the meeting, I was welcomed by a group of very nice women! After giving them an overview of our needs, members of the group asked me several thoughtful questions. Later that day, Irene called to tell me that the vote was to fund the entire budget! I was surprised and thrilled by their generosity! The program now has muchneeded equipment for trapping and for monitoring the feral cat population.

A big thanks also to the Board of Directors for giving donations to Feline Friends and Animal Rescue Veterinary Services, the organizations that help us with TNR! These groups can use all of the financial help that they can get.

We have had two TNR (Trap, Neuter, Return) clinics since the last newsletter. In July, we trapped a black male that we named Freedom, and in August, a small black female that we named Tuskegee. While doing her spay surgery, the vet noted that she was lactating, meaning that she had kittens. There wasn't much milk, so she thinks that the kittens are likely weaned. Because of this, we



released Tuskegee early, as soon as she was stable, so she could return to her kittens. In the meantime, Wulf and I searched for kittens near where we had trapped Tuskegee. We looked under sheds and homes and in nooks and crannies with no luck. We are thankful to the neighbors who let us search on their lots and for keeping an eye out, and we would appreciate it if you all would, also.



We have a new member of our team! An 11-yearold granddaughter of one of our residents has a passion for cats and expressed an interest in helping me socialize the kittens that were trapped on Rachael Circle in May. For the last couple of months, she has been working with the kittens and gaining their trust. She was absolutely over the moon the first time she was able to touch one! She even made a wand toy for them from a stick that she found. She painted it bright colors and attached to it a yarn chain that she crocheted. The kittens love it!

She has also helped by stocking the feeding station, cleaning out the water dish, and baiting traps. She had the honor of releasing Freedom and helped us bring Tuskegee to and from the vet clinic. She's even helped us clean equipment after trapping weekends!

The two black kittens from the May trapping have been adopted by a couple introduced to me by a

Medvil resident, and the gray ones will be going to their new home soon – in Medvil, so my young assistant and I will still be able to visit them!

TASTY TIDBITS

While we're almost heading into fall, the warm temperatures are still here. Thus, we can still enjoy the pleasures of the grill and tossed salads, as well as cool desserts. Here are a few for you to choose from for your September eating pleasure.

Lemon and Thyme Grilled Chicken Breast

(Makes 4 servings)

Ingredients:

4 (6-ounce) boneless, skinless chicken breasts

1-1/2 tsp. kosher salt

1 tsp black pepper

2 tbsp chopped thyme leaves



- 4 garlic cloves, crushed and peeled
- 2 lemons, as needed
- 2 Tbs, extra-virgin olive oil, more as needed Torn basil or mint leaves, as needed

Directions:

- Place chicken breasts between two sheets or parchment paper or plastic wrap. Using a mallet or rolling pin, pound each to an even thickness of 1/2 inch. Don't make then any thinner or they'll dry out.
- Place chicken in a large bowl and toss with salt, pepper, thyme, garlic, and the zest and juice of 1 lemon. Mix in olive oil. Cover and refrigerate for 1

to 2 hours. Remove chicken from the fridge while you heat the grill.

- Light the grill, building a hot fire, or heat your gas grill to high. Once the grill is fully heated, brush breasts lightly with olive oil and place chicken on the grill. Cook until undersides are browned and chicken is about halfway cooked, 3 to 5 minutes. Flip breasts and grill until cooked through, 3 to 5 minutes more.
- Transfer chicken to a platter. Drizzle with oil and garnish with additional lemon juice, olive oil, and basil or mint leaves. Serve hot.

Gingered Spaghetti Salad

(makes 8 servings)

Ingredients:

- 1 package (16 ounces) whole wheat spaghetti
- 1 cup frozen shelled edamame
- 1 tsp. minced fresh ginger root
- 1 cup reduced-fat sesame ginger salad dressing
- 3 cups cubed chicken breast
- 1 English cucumber, chopped
- 1 medium sweet red pepper, chopped
- 1 small sweet yellow pepper, chopped
- 1 small red onion, chopped
- 3 green onions, sliced

Directions:

- Cook spaghetti according to package directions, adding edamame during the last 5 minutes of cooking. Rinse mixture in cold water and drain well.
- Meanwhile, stir ginger into salad dressing.
- In a large bowl, combine spaghetti, chicken, cucumber, peppers, and red onion. Add dressing; toss to coat. Sprinkle with green onions.

Grilled Corn with Sesame-Soy Butter (Makes 4 servings)

Ingredients:

For the Sesame Soy Butter

3 Tbs. unsalted butter

2 Tbs. toasted sesame oil

1 Tbs. soy sauce

1 Tbs. mirin or honey

Freshly ground black pepper

For the Corn


Vegetable oil, for the grill grates

4 ears corn in husks

2 Tbs. black sesame seeds or toasted white sesame seeds

1 Tbs. minced fresh chives or

scallion greens



- Set up your grill for direct grilling and heat to high (450 to 600°F). Brush or scrape the grate clean and oil it with a tightly folded paper towel dipped in oil and drawn across the grate with tongs. Fold a 12x18" sheet of aluminum foil in thirds like a business letter to make a grill shield.
- Meanwhile, cut the tapered end off of one ear of corn. Pull the back over the stem end as if peeling a banana to expose the kernels. Rotate the corn as you peel it and gather the husks together below the stem. Tightly tie the husks with butcher's string or a



strip of corn husk to form a handle. Discard the silks. Repeat with the remaining corn. (Breathe a sigh of relief—the hard part is over!)

- Brush each ear of corn on all sides with some of the sesame-soy butter.
- Arrange the corn on the grate, sliding the folded aluminum foil grill shield under the husks to keep them from burning. Grill the corn, turning the ears so they roast evenly and basting the corn with some sesame-soy butter until darkly browned all over, about 3 minutes per side. (If using a gas grill, close the cover while grilling.)
- Transfer the corn to a platter. Brush one final time with any remaining sesame-soy butter. Sprinkle the corn on all sides with sesame seeds and chives. Serve hot.

High Protein Cucumber Salad (makes 4 servings)

Ingredients:

3 large cucumbers, thinly sliced (about 7-1/2 cups) 1/2 cup red onion, thinly sliced 1 cup 1% low-fat cottage cheese 3 Tbs. white vinegar 2 Tbs. fresh

chives, thinly slices

2 Tbs. chopped fresh dill, plus fronds for garnish 1/8 tsp. salt

1/4 tsp. ground pepper

Directions:

- Toss sliced cucumbers and 1/2 cup onion together in a large bowl.
- Combine 1 cup cottage cheese, 3 Tbs. vinegar, 2 Tbs. chives, 2 Tbs. chopped dill, 1/8 tsp. salt, and 1/4 tsp. pepper in a blender; process until smooth and thick, about 1 minutes.
- Transfer to the bowl with the cucumbers and onions; stir until well-coated. Garnish with dill fronds.

Hot Dogs with Pico de Gallo

(makes 4 servings)

Ingredients:

For the Pico de Gallo

2 ripe but firm tomatoes (1 pound), cored, seeded, and diced (2 cups)

1/2 small white onion (4 ounces), finely diced (1 cup)

2 jalapeños (3 ounces), stemmed, seeded (if desired), and finely chopped (1/3 cup) 1/2 cup cilantro leaves and tender stems, finely chopped

1 tsp. fresh lime juice, plus more to taste Kosher salt

For the Hot Dogs
4 hot dogs
4 hot dog buns
2 Tbs. mayonnaise (optional)

Directions:

- Prepare an outdoor charcoal grill or a gas grill or medium heat. Or heat a grill pan on the stoyetop over medium heat.
- Make the Pico de Gallo by combining the tomatoes, onion, jalapeños, cilantro, and lime juice in a medium bowl.

 Season with salt and mix well.

 Taste and add more lime juice and salt, if desired.
- Butterfly the hot dogs: Slice them in half lengthwise without cutting all the way through the skin, then open them so they sit flat. Place them on the grill, cut-side down, and cook until grill marks appear, 3 to 5 minutes. Flip the hot dogs and cook, skin-side down, until the skin deepens in color, 2 to 4 minutes.
- Meanwhile, open the hot dog buns and spread mayonnaise on the cut sides. Grill, cut-side down, until toasted, 1 to 2 minutes, then flip and grill until lightly toasted, about 1 minute.
- Place the grilled hot dogs in the toasted buns, cutside up, then pile the Pico de Gallo into the butterflied opening. Serve immediately with any remaining Pico de Gallo on the side.

No-Bake Blueberry Cheesecake Bars

(makes 8-12 servings)

Ingredients:

16 graham cracker squares (8 whole crackers), crushed

1/4 cup ground pecans or walnuts, optional

3 Tbs. melted butter

1 8-ounce package cream cheese, at room temperature

1 cup ricotta cheese

2 Tbs. honey, or to taste

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Rind of a lemon, freshly grated

Pinch salt

About 1-1/2 cups blueberries, picked over, washed and dried

Directions:

- Combine crushed graham crackers, nuts if using, and melted butter. Press evenly into bottom or an 8-or 9-inch square pan (glass is good) to form a crust about 1/4" thick. Put in refrigerator until ready to use.
- Using a standing or hand mixer, or a whisk, combine cream cheese, ricotta, honey, lemon rind, and salt, and blend until smooth.
- Spread cheese mixture carefully and evenly over crust, using a spatula or butter knife to smooth the top. Cover with fresh blueberries and chill for at

least an hour, or until set. Cut into squares or bars and serve cold.


