

"Unqualified Promise" Premiere tomorrow



Just a friendly reminder that the Historical Society's documentary about the Town of Orange premieres tomorrow (Sun. Nov. 20) at the Pavilion at Lakeland Farm (13582 Sedwick Lane, Orange), starting at 2:00 pm. It's free and it's open to the public.

This premiere is the final event of the sesquicentennial year for the town. If you miss the premiere, a limited number of DVDs are available for sale at the Historical Society's Research Center.

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Orange County Native, Edna Lewis Honored

The Grande Dame of Southern Cooking was honored locally last month on the 50th anniversary of her first cookbook, *The Edna Lewis Cookbook*. Lewis, who was born and raised at Freetown near Lahore, is widely recognized as the person most responsible for putting Southern and regional American cooking on the international culinary map.

Her legacy was honored by a collection of food writers at a dinner at Willow Grove catered by Craig Hartman of the Barbecue Exchange, Joy Crump of FOODE in Fredericksburg, and Willow Grove Chef, Andrew Eppley. All three courses were paired with Barbourville and Horton wines and an Iron Pipe Aleworks beer.

The next day, the writers toured Orange County, starting with a program at Montpelier. That visit featured a paper about culinary practices at James Madison's home, researched by former Historical Society board member, Hilarie Hicks. The writers also visited the Lewis family cemetery where they placed a wreath at her grave. An historical marker will be erected early next year near her Freetown birthplace. The writers concluded the tour with a visit to Patches in Gordonsville where representatives of Congresswoman Abigail Spanberger pre-

Speiden Publishes Again!

Local historian, society board member, philanthropist and farmer, Bill Speiden has done it again; another self-published book, that follows on the heels of *Letters to Tyler*.

Entitled *Bathroom Reading, For the Sophisticated and the not so*,

the book is a collection of "80+ years of life's memories," along with some interesting historical snippets.

Of particular interest are observations on farm life during the 1920s, including a history of cattle from 14,000 years ago to the present. Speiden also includes sections about the Jim Crow era, Native American history and sprinkles in some poignant and humorous personal stories. The book is on sale at the Historical Society.
