

#### A WORD FROM YOUR PASTOR

Dear Friends,

Rena and I have taken thousands of pictures of flowers over the last 25 years. The yellow flowers pictured are all recent flowers from our yard. Some of the flowers are still with us. Others faded and disappeared in recent months. Flowers are amazingly intricate and beautiful. Some are very fragrant. All are unique.

Flowers are incredible. But they don't last. You can keep pressed flowers for a time, or potpourri flowers or dried flowers, but they will never return to their former glory. Their color and fragrance will fade and they will never live again.



Some things are temporal and some things are permanent. One of the temptations of this life is to put all our care and focus on the temporal. (The things that don't last.) That is not to say the temporal things don't matter. We need to eat and work and sleep and everything else. And there is nothing wrong with pursuing some hobbies and interests. But none of these things will last.

In Matthew 6:20, Jesus tells us to "store up for ourselves treasures in heaven." He is saying the things of this world won't last. We can't take the things of this earth to the next life. 
#### PRESBYTERIAN WOMEN

#### **CHRISTIAN EDUCATION**

#### Did America have a Religious Founding? (Part 3)

The autumn celebration, in late 1621, that has become known as the 1st Thanksgiving, somewhat mimics our November national holiday today. It occurred between the Plymouth Pilgrims and the Wampanoag tribe of Native Americans; although the Pilgrims probably didn't use the term thanksgiving at the time. The purpose of their thanksgiving was to dedicate themselves to God with a time of prayer and humility, giving thanks for God's good providence. Giving thanks to God was a regular focus of the Pilgrims and they were celebrating their first successful corn harvest that followed a very difficult winter and a severe food shortage. Their harvest was greatly aided by the Native American Squanto who taught the Pilgrims how to farm and hunt more effectively in the new world. The future Governor of the colony, William Bradford called Squanto, "A special instrument sent of God for their good." Giving thanks to God has taken place since the creation and is a repetitive term that runs through much of the Old Testament, "Give thanks to the Lord, for he is good; His love endures forever." (Psalm 106:1, 1 Chronicles 16:34)

William Bradford organized the celebratory feast and invited a group of Native American allies to what was, in reality, a harvest festival. It included the Wampanoag chief Massasoit, 90 of his tribal men and the surviving 53 Pilgrims. Nearly half of the Plymouth colonists had died during that first harsh winter, with only five Pilgrim women surviving due to the lack of food which they mostly gave to their children. While no records exist of the exact bill of fare at that first Thanksgiving celebration, the Pilgrim chronicler Edward Winslow noted that William Bradford sent out four men on a "fowling" mission in preparation for the 3-day event. Wild, not domestic turkey was in plentiful supply in the region and was a common food source for both English settlers and Native Americans. Just as likely, the fowling party returned with other birds the colonists regularly consumed: duck, geese and swan. Instead of bread-based stuffing, the birds were probably stuffed with herbs, onions or nuts to add extra flavor. They most likely had fruits like: plums, melons, grapes, and cranberries. (No cranberry sauce) Plus local vegetables such as: leeks, wild onions, beans, artichokes, and squash. Also, sea food like: lobster, fish, eel, mussels and oysters. The Wampanoag tribe contributed five deer and historians speculate that the deer was roasted on a spit over a smoldering fire and the colonists may have used some of the deer to make venison stew. But there was no stuffing, mash potatoes or gravy. Whether mashed or roasted, white or sweet potatoes had no place at the first Thanksgiving. After encountering potatoes in its native South America, the Spanish began introducing the potato in Europe around 1570. By the time the Pilgrims boarded the Mayflower, the potato had neither doubled back to North America nor become popular enough with the English to hitch a ride to North America. New England's native inhabitants are known to have eaten other plant roots such as Indian turnips and groundnuts, which they may or may not have brought to the party.

Though these hardy pilgrims loom large in the American imagination, they never built their settlement into a major colony. The larger Massachusetts Bay Company incorporated the smaller Plymouth colony into their colony in 1691. But the sense of purpose of the original Pilgrims left a permanent imprint on our national character. They maintain an unshakable confidence that God protected them, not to grant special privileges, but to impose special responsibilities. They saw themselves as instruments, not authors, of a mysterious master plan. Today with our blessings so obvious and so overwhelming, shouldn't we take time, as a nation, to thank God for all our blessings?
