What does the Bible say about forgiveness? What does it mean to forgive?

The Bible never gives a "dictionary" definition of <u>forgiveness</u>, but it shows us many examples of it. The greatest of all examples is the forgiveness of God. Although the following passage does not use the word *forgive*, it describes the concept of God's forgiveness perfectly:

<u>Psalm 103:8–12</u>: The Lord is compassionate and gracious, slow to anger, abounding in love. He will not always accuse, nor will he harbor his anger forever; he does not treat us as our sins deserve or repay us according to our iniquities. For as high as the heavens are above the earth, so great is his love for those who fear him; as far as the east is from the west, so far has he removed our transgressions from us.

It is important to note that forgiveness operates in the realm of sin. In the majority of the passages in the Bible that contain the word *forgive* or *forgiveness*, sin is mentioned. The (Forgiveness on page 12)





There are various names of God, many of which enumerate the various qualities of a Supreme Being. The English word "god" (and its equivalent in other languages) is used by multiple religions as a noun or name to refer to different deities, or specifically to the Supreme Being, as denoted in English by the capitalized and uncapitalized terms "God" and "god". Ancient cognate equivalents for the biblical Hebrew Elohim, one of the most common names of God in the Bible, include proto-Semitic El, biblical Aramaic Elah, and Arabic 'ilah. The personal or proper name for God in many of these languages may either be distinguished from such attributes, or homonymic. For example, in Judaism the tetragrammaton is sometimes related to the ancient Hebrew elyeh ("I will be"). In the Hebrew Bible (Exodus 3:14), Yahweh, the personal name of God, is revealed directly to Moses. Correlation between various theories and interpretation of the name of "the one God", used to signify a monotheistic or ultimate Supreme Being from which all other divine attributes derive, has been a subject of ecumenical discourse between Eastern and Western scholars for over two centuries. In Christian theology the word is considered a personal and a proper name of God. On the other hand, the names of God in a different tradition are sometimes referred to by symbols. The question whether divine names used by different religions are equivalent has been raised and analyzed.

CHRISTIAN SEASONS

Advent

Advent is the season of expectation, hope and celebration of the past, present, and future comings of Jesus Christ to the world. Much of the focus is on the prophecy of the coming of the Messiah to Israel and the expectancy of that fulfillment. The Advent cry is "Come," even though Emmanuel has come. Jesus has come, presently comes into the hearts of believers through grace, and is yet to return. This season is a time of anticipation as the Church makes ready for the coming of the Lord and the celebration of Jesus coming as a babe in Bethlehem. Therefore, Advent embodies a vital element of the Christian faith. The Advent season has marked the beginning of the Christian Year since the eight-century and consists of the four weeks before Christmas.

Color: Purple (violet or Lilac) is the color used to denote royalty, praying, fasting, and penitence. It represents a symbol of the majesty of Christ, and Jesus' humanity, suffering, and fasting.

Epiphany

Epiphany or The Season After Epiphany (4-9 Sundays) is a time for remembering the various times and ways Jesus was revealed to humans, particularly to the Gentiles (non-Jews) through the Magi (Wise Men) who represented other nationalities. It is a reminder of the universality of Jesus, the Savior of persons in every land. The first Sunday after Epiphany Day (January 6) is known as Baptism of the Lord referring to 3:13-17, Mark 1:9-11, Luke 3:21-22, and John 1:29-34. This is an excellent time for baptism and renewal of the baptismal covenant. Appropriate symbols are water, the baptismal shell or font, a descending dove, and a cross standing in water. The emphasis for the remainder of the season is on the beginning of Jesus' ministry, the miracles performed, and Jesus' works and teachings.

Color: Green is symbolic of the freshness of nature, hope, life, and growth.

LITURGICAL COLORS

Liturgy or liturgical comes from the Greek word "leitougia" that means public service. Thus, liturgical refers to the rites or forms prescribed for use in public worship. Colors add brightness, variety, and visual appeal for the worshiper and Christian believer. But beyond this is the wealth of meaning and theological interpretation wrapped up in in the colors used during the various seasons. Below are the prevalent colors and their liturgical interpretations.

Purple (violet or lilac) is the color used to denote royalty, praying, fasting, and penitence. It represents a symbol of the majesty of Christ, and Jesus' humanity, suffering, and fasting. Advent and Lent are seasons when this color is used.

Green is symbolic of the freshness of nature, hope, life, and growth. It is used during The Season After Epiphany and Kingdomtide. Some denominations use green during The Season after Pentecost.

White is symbolic of light, joy, purity, glory, and the bright light of truth. It is used during Christmas/Christmastide, Epiphany (January 6), Baptism of the Lord Sunday, Transfiguration of the Lord Sunday, Maundy Thursday (if Holy Communion is celebrated), Easter/Eastertide, Ascension Day/Sunday, Trinity Sunday, and Christ the King Sunday. It is appropriately used for Consecrations, Baptisms, Marriages, and Holy Communion.

Red is symbolic of loyalty, power, witness, Christian zeal, blood, fire, the work and ministry of the Church, and the Holy Spirit. It is used on Pentecost, for some The Season After Pentecost, and Church anniversaries, dedications, and ordinations. The color red is appropriate for year-round use if there is no other color available.

Black represents grief, sorrow, mourning, or death. It is used on Good Friday and sometimes for funerals. (Some prefer to use white for funerals to celebrate the homegoing of a loved one.)

Gold is the color denoting worth, virtue, glory to God, and Christian might. It was one of the gifts given to the Baby Jesus by the Magi (Wise Men). The Kingship of the Christ Child and the price Jesus paid on Calvary is also represented in this color.

Other Colors

Blue is an alternate liturgical color that is symbolic of hope. It is often used as an alternate color to purple during Advent by some denominations.

Kente Cloth is being used by many African-American congregations as a parament. It is also used on clergy and choir robes or liturgical stoles. Most of the kente cloth contains several of the liturgical colors. Kente Cloth is a strong woven fabric from the West African country of Ghana. Its name comes from the word "kenten" referring to that which cannot be torn under any circumstances. It is woven in narrow four inch strips and stitched together to make the desired width of the fabric. Traditionally, this cloth carried symbolic designs that indicated a preverb or special message. In addition to the meaning wrapped up in the colors, it also represents the commitment of believers not to allow anything to separate them from the love of God and a reminder to hold on to one's heritage.

1. The Daniel Fast involves a spiritual commitment to God. "Daniel proposed in his heart that he would not defile himself with the portion of the Kings delicacies, nor with the wine which he drank." (Daniel 1: 8)

2. Faith is foundational to the Daniel Fast. "Then I set my face toward my God to make request by prayer and supplications, with fasting" (Daniel. 9:30 "However, this kind does not go out except by prayer and fasting" (Matthew 17: 21) 3. Fast and yield yourself to God as a servant. Daniel said, "as you see fit, deal with your servants" (Daniel 1:13)

4. Schedule your prayer / And end with thanksgiving. Daniel "kneeled upon his knees three times a day, and prayed, and gave thanks" (Daniel 6: 10)

5. Begin with confession, (repentance), dedication, and prayer-"Search me, O God, and know my heart; Try me, and know my anxieties; And see if there is any wicked way in me, And lead me in the way of everlasting" (Psalm 39: 23-24)

Remember: The Daniel Fast will lead to spiritual insight. "... to these young men God gave knowledge" (Daniel 1: 17)

Guidelines for Daniel Fast

Foods We May Eat

After answering hundreds of questions about the Daniel Fast on the blog, I developed these food guidelines. My hope is that it will serve as a more complete list. The original list used by many people was issued in a book about fasting. I know the author tried to do the best he could, but that isn't the same as getting hundreds of questions seeking clarification.

Please make sure to READ THE LABEL when purchasing packaged, canned or bottled foods. They should be sugar-free and chemical-free. Keep this in mind as you review this list of acceptable foods. Look for the list of ingredients on the label (not the nutritional value) to make sure all the ingredients comply with the Daniel Fast Guidelines.

Foods to include in your eating plan during the Daniel Fast

All fruits. These can be fresh, frozen, dried, juiced or canned. Fruits include but are apples, apricots, bananas, blackberries, blueberries, boysenberries, cantaloupe, cherries, cranberries, figs, grapefruit, grapes, guava, honeydew melon, kiwi, lemons, limes, mangoes, nectarines, oranges, papayas, peaches, pears, pineapples, plums, prunes, raisins, raspberries, strawberries, tangelos, tangerines, watermelon

All vegetables. These can be fresh, frozen, dried, juiced or canned. Vegetables include but are artichokes,

asparagus, beets, broccoli, Brussels sprouts, cabbage, carrots, cauliflower, celery, chili peppers, collard greens, corn, cucumbers, eggplant, garlic, ginger root, kale, leeks, lettuce, mushrooms, mustard greens, okra, onions, parsley, potatoes, radishes, rutabagas, scallions, spinach, sprouts, squashes, sweet potatoes, tomatoes, turnips, watercress, yams, zucchini, veggie burgers are an option if you are not allergic to soy.

All whole grains, including whole wheat, brown rice, millet, quinoa, oats, barley, grits, whole wheat pasta, whole wheat tortillas, rice cakes and popcorn.

All nuts and seeds, including sunflower seeds, cashews, peanuts, sesame. Also nut butters including peanut butter.

All legumes. These can be canned or dried. Legumes include dried beans, pinto beans, split peas, lentils, black eyed peas, kidney beans, black beans, cannellini beans, white beans.

All quality oils including olive, canola, grape seed, peanut, and sesame.

Beverages: spring water, distilled water or other pure waters.

Other: tofu, soy products, vinegar, seasonings, salt, herbs and spices.

Note: Unsweetened plant-based milks and juices can be used in recipes or on cereal, but the only beverage on the Daniel Fast is water.

Foods to avoid on the Daniel Fast

All meat, animal, fish and seafood products including beef, lamb, pork, poultry, fish and shellfish.

All dairy products including milk, cheese, cream, butter, and eggs.

All sweeteners including sugar, raw sugar, date sugar, honey, syrups, molasses, cane juice, date honey, and stevia.

All leavened bread including Ezekiel Bread (it contains yeast and honey) and baked goods.

All leavening agents including yeast, baking soda and baking powder.

All refined and processed foods products including artificial flavorings, food additives, chemicals, white rice, white flour, and foods that contain artificial preservatives.

All deep-fried foods including potato chips, French fries, corn chips.

All solid fats including shortening, margarine, lard and foods high in fat.

Beverages including coffee, tea, herbal teas, carbonated beverages, energy drinks, and alcohol.

Remember, **READ THE LABELS** so you are aware of the ingredients in the package.!

Abram Builds an Altar at Mamre/Marking Transitions

Devotional Reading: Philippians 4:10-19

Background Scripture: Genesis 12-13

EXALT!

Declaration: Genesis 13:8-18

⁸ Then Abram said to Lot, "Let there be no strife between you and me, and between your herdsmen and my herdsmen, for we are kinsmen. ⁹ Is not the whole land before you? Separate your self from me. If you take the left hand, then I will go to the right, or if you take the right hand, then I will go to the left." ¹⁰ And Lot lifted up his eyes and saw that the Jordan Valley was well watered everywhere like the garden of the lord, like the land of Egypt, in the direction of Zoar. (This was before the Lord destroyed Sodom and Gomorrah.) ¹¹ So Lot chose for himself all the Jordan Valley, and Lot journeyed east. Thus they separated from each other. ¹² Abram settled in the land of Canaan, while Lot settled among the cities of the valley and moved his tent as far as Sodom. ¹³ Now the men of Sodom were wicked, great sinners against the Lord.

¹⁴ The Lord said to Abram, after Lot had separated from him, "Lift up your eyes and look from the place where you are, northward and southward and eastward and west, ¹⁵ for all the land that you see I will give to you and your offspring forever. ¹⁶ I will make your offspring as the dust of the earth, so that if one can count the dust of the earth, your offspring also can be counted. ¹⁷ Arise, walk through the length and the breadth of the land, for I will give it to you." ¹⁸ So Abram moved his tent and came and settled by the oaks of Mamre, which are at Hebron, and there he built an altar to the Lord.

Affirmation: We desire the spiritual maturity that develops through acknowledging God's activity in our lives.

ENGAGE

The lessons of this quarter are a study of worship practices offered as a grateful response to the covenantal relationship God initiates, first with Abraham, and later with the people of Israel. The patterns of worship reflect the gamut of community life, from praising God's goodness and mercy to calling on God for help in times of crisis.

Unit 1, "Leaders Set Worship Example," begins with the example of (Abram) Abraham, who built altars to mark those occasions on which God called him to greater faithfulness. Lesson 2 reveals Solomon's worshipful awareness of people's tendency to sin. Lesson 3 shows us Hezekiah's prayerful realization of what's most important: the Lord alone is God. Lesson 4 demonstrates the importance of spiritual leadership, as evidenced through Josiah's call to bring back the people to the right worship as prescribed in the "book of the covenant."

Throughout life, threshold opportunities arise that determine our future. How do we honor such opportunities with solemnity and gratefulness? Abram built altars to mark those occasions on which God called him to greater faithfulness.

Break into small groups and think about and discuss the following questions and issues: 1.) Share with one another how you may have experienced threshold moments or events either individually through some sort of encounter or as a part of a family occurrence. Describe what happened and the impact it had on you and others immediately and in later life. Were there both positive and adverse effects? Explain. 2.) Do interpersonal conflicts initiate a threshold events? If so, how might reconciliation take place with those in such conflict? How might the experience become a memorable one through the actions and responses of those involved? 3.) Can you recall a time when everyone in the family/ community/church shared a commitment to the peaceful resolution of a dispute? If so, share some of the details and sense of relief. 4.) Can you share an occasion wherein a group memorializes the threshold events that resulted in resolution?

EDUCATE:

Genesis 13:8-13: Three times in Genesis, God's statement of promise to Abraham follows a separation. In 12:1-9, Abraham, separated from his home (11:31; 12:1), traveled the land of Canaan, received it as a promise, and built an altar (*Hope on page 11*)

in response to God's promise. Similarly, after Lot separated to Sodom (13:9, 11, 14), Abraham traveled the land of Canaan, received it a second time as a promise, and built an altar in response. Finally, in Genesis 22, Abraham showed his willingness to be separated from his son Lsaac on an altar, then received the promise a third time. Living and roaming on the land was common in the ancient Near East. The provision for the health of Abram and Lot's herds determined their prospects for survival. Given the scarcity of grazing land and water sources, tempers were short. There were limits as to the size of herds that the land could support. In deferring to Lot, Abraham is on the verge of giving away the Promised Land. But Lot "chose" to go "east." Abraham remained in the land, securing God's promise. Lot became the father of the Ammonites and the Moabites (19:37-38), who proved to be obstacles to Israel's faithfulness (Deuteronomy 23:3-6; Ezra 9:1). Is there some symbolism relating to moving toward the east? The movement away from God in Genesis is toward the east (3:24;4:16; possibly 11:2), perhaps a rhetorical device by the exilic editors of Genesis. Babylonian exile was also to the east. Note the subtle foreshadowing of the destruction of Sodom and Gomorrah (19:22). Lot's choice of a land "toward Zoar," "toward the east" forebodes disaster. The ties between chapter 13 and the destruction of Sodom (Chapter 19) can be seen in verse 10b and verses 12b-13. Interestingly, the New Testament describes Lot as "a righteous man" (2 Peter 2:7-8).

Genesis 13:14-18: An alter is a structure on which offerings are made to a god. The Hebrew word for altar is mizbeah ("to slaughter"); Greek thusiasterion ("a place of sacrifice"). Altars are places of exchange, communication, and influence (see Noah and Elijah). In the patriarchal period, altars were markers of place, commemorating an encounter with God (Genesis 12:7), or physical signs of habitation. The altar built by Abraham near Hebron was located relatively close to those mentioned in 12:6-8, in what would later be the central regions of the kingdoms of Israel and Judah. Mamre refers to an Amorite who resided near Hebron (Genesis 14:13, 24). He owned the place known as "the oaks of Mamre the Amorite" (14:13). Abraham lived in the town or district known as Mamre, which was part of Hebron (13:18; 18:1). The ESV Reformation Study Bible has interesting insight into the fulfilment of the Promised Land implicated in the verse 15: "The promises of the land were fulfilled several times but never consummated. God fulfilled the promise through Joshua (Joshua 21:43-45), but not completely (Joshua 13:1-7); even more so through David and Solomon (1 Kings 4:20-25; Nehemiah 9:8), but still not completely (Psalm 95:11; Hebrews 4:6-8; 11:39, 40). As Israel's Exodus from Egypt through the Passover (Exodus 12:1) is a type of the church's exodus from the condemned world through Christ (1 Corinthians 5:7; 10:1-4), so also old Israel's life in the land is a type of New Israel's life in Christ. Both are a gift (15:7, 18; Deuteronomy 1:8; Roman 6:23), and are received by faith (Numbers 14:26-44; Joshua 7 and John 3:16). Both uniquely possess the blessed presence, life, and rest of God (Exodus 23:20-31; Deuteronomy 11:12; 12:9,10; 28:1-14; John 1:51; 14:9; Matthew 11:28), and demand persevering faith (Deuteronomy 28:15-19; Hebrews 6). The land promises are consummated forever in the new heaven and new earth (Hebrews 11:39, 40; Revelation 21:1-22:6).

ELEVATE:

Respond appropriately to the following as requested: 1.) Explore the spiritual maturity of marking time and space as essential reminders of God-filled moments. Give some specific examples. 2.) Name a significant God-moment you have experienced and build an altar of remembrance and gratitude to God. Explain the significance to the group. 3.) Using watercolors or pastels, invite the learners to paint/draw how they feel led to greater faithfulness during the reading/Bible study. 4.) Explore the spiritual dimensions of conflict resolution. Give an example for the group to consider. 5.) Every morning, face the rising sun in the east, and thank God for the time and space you're been given. How does this make you feel?

1. Explore the concept of liminality, or threshold events, and how God uses it to shape the lives of believers.

2. Share stories of property disputes that resulted in bringing families closer (or not). What was most helpful, or disruptive, to the families in setting the dispute?

Genesis 50:17: I ask you to forgive your brothers the sins and the wrongs they committed in treating you so badly. Now please forgive the sins of the servants of the God of your father.

Exodus 32:32: But now, please forgive their sin.

Leviticus 4:35: In this way the priest will make atonement for them for the sin they have committed, and they will be forgiven.

<u>1 Samuel 25:28</u>: Please forgive your servant's presumption.

Matthew 12:31: And so I tell you, every kind of sin and slander can be forgiven, but blasphemy against the Spirit will not be forgiven.

Luke 5:20: When Jesus saw their faith, he said, "Friend, your sins are forgiven."

For a person to find true forgiveness, he or she must admit the sin. This is called confession. If a person tries to pass off sin as a mere mistake, human failing, or temporary lapse of judgment; or if he or she simply denies the sin altogether, it is a barrier to forgiveness.

<u>1 John 1:8–10</u>: If we claim to be without sin, we deceive ourselves and the truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness. If we claim we have not sinned, we make him out to be a liar and his word is not in us.

God forgives sin, yet this does not mean that He simply "looks the other way" or "sweeps it under the rug." The penalty for sin is death (<u>Romans 6:23</u>), and that penalty must be paid. In the Old Testament, God allowed for a sacrificial animal to take the place of the sinner. Leviticus 5:15–16 says, "When anyone is unfaithful to the Lord by sinning unintentionally in regard to any of the Lord's holy things, they are to bring to the Lord as a penalty a ram from the flock, one without defect and of the proper value in silver, according to the sanctuary shekel. It is a guilt offering. They must make restitution for what they have failed to do in regard to the holy things, pay an additional penalty of a fifth of its value and give it all to the priest. The priest will make atonement for them with the ram as a guilt offering, and they will be forgiven."

The writer of Hebrews observes, "The law requires that nearly everything be cleansed with blood, and without the shedding of blood there is no forgiveness" (Hebrews 9:22). However, the blood took pity on him, canceled the debt and let him go. of sacrificial animals did not actually pay for sin. It simply postponed the judgment until a better sacrifice could be offered to pay the full penalty of sin and make forgiveness possible. Hebrews 10 explains this in depth, but the following excerpts from that chapter outline the flow of the argument:

The law is only a shadow of the good things that are coming—not with me, and I will pay it back." the realities themselves. For this reason it can never, by the same sacrifices repeated endlessly year after year, make perfect those who draw near to worship. Otherwise, would they not have stopped being offered? For the worshipers would have been cleansed once for all, and would no longer have felt guilty for their sins. But those sacrifices master everything that had happened. are an annual reminder of sins. *It is impossible for the blood of* bulls and goats to take away sins. (Hebrews 10:1-4)

Day after day every priest stands and performs his religious duties; again and again he offers the same sacrifices, which can never take away sins. But when this priest had offered for all time one sacrifice for sins, he sat down at the right hand of God. (Hebrews <u>10:11–12</u>)

"This is the covenant I will make with them after that time, says the Lord. I will put my laws in their hearts, and I will write them on their minds." Then he adds: "Their sins and lawless acts I will remember no more. " And where these have been forgiven, sacrifice

for sin is no longer necessary. (Hebrews 10:16-18)

In order for God to forgive us, Jesus gave Himself as the sacrifice for sin. Jesus alluded to that sacrifice at the Last Supper when He told His disciples, "This is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins" (Matthew 26:28). After the resurrection, the apostles carried the message of forgiveness through Jesus Christ throughout the world, preaching to both Jews and Gentiles:

Acts 10:43: All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name.

Acts 13:38: Therefore, my friends, I want you to know that through Jesus the forgiveness of sins is proclaimed to you.

Ephesians 1:7: In [Christ] we have redemption through his blood, the forgiveness of sins, in accordance with the riches of God's grace.

So God forgives people on the basis of the sacrifice of Christ. The only requirement is that sinful people confess their sin, turn from it, and trust in Jesus Christ as Savior. Once a person has experienced the forgiveness of God, he or she is then able (and responsible) to forgive others. "Bear with each other and forgive one another if any of you has a grievance against someone. Forgive as the Lord forgave you" (<u>Colossians 3:13</u>). In fact, those who refuse to forgive betray the fact that they do not understand how much of their own sin they need to have forgiven. Christians should be willing to forgive people who have sinned against them. Every person has wronged God far more than they have been wronged by other people. Jesus illustrates the point in Matthew 18:21-35:

Then Peter came to Jesus and asked, "Lord, how many times shall I forgive my brother or sister who sins against me? Up to seven times?"

Jesus answered, "I tell you, not seven times, but <u>seventy-seven</u> <u>times</u>.

"Therefore, the kingdom of heaven is like a king who wanted to settle accounts with his servants. As he began the settlement, a man who owed him ten thousand bags of gold was brought to him. Since he was not able to pay, the master ordered that he and his wife and his children and all that he had be sold to repay the debt.

"At this the servant fell on his knees before him. 'Be patient with me,' he begged, 'and I will pay back everything.' The servant's master

"But when that servant went out, he found one of his fellow servants who owed him a hundred silver coins. He grabbed him and began to choke him. 'Pay back what you owe me!' he demanded.

"His fellow servant fell to his knees and begged him, 'Be patient

"But he refused. Instead, he went off and had the man thrown into prison until he could pay the debt. When the other servants saw what had happened, they were outraged and went and told their

"Then the master called the servant in. 'You wicked servant,' he said, 'I canceled all that debt of yours because you begged me to. Shouldn't you have had mercy on your fellow servant just as I had on you?' In anger his master handed him over to the jailers to be tortured, until he should pay back all he owed.

"This is how my heavenly Father will treat each of you unless you forgive your brother or sister from your heart."

We often hear the phrase *forgive and forget*, and this can be misleading. As a rejoinder to this phrase, sometimes we hear, "I'll (Forgiveness on page 13)

forgive, but I will never forget." To forgive and forget does not mean that a person who has been wronged develops some kind of sanctified amnesia. A person who has been abused will never forget that it happened. A person who has suffered from an adulterous spouse will always remember that experience. A parent who has had a child abducted will probably think about that crime every day he or she spends on earth. Yet, it is possible for each of these people who have been sinned against to forgive and also to forget, as long as the biblical definition of forget is in view.

In the Bible, remembering and forgetting do not have to do with retention of information in the brain. In <u>Genesis 8:1</u>, after the flood, "God remembered Noah." Does this imply that for a while God had forgotten about Noah, misplaced him among the flood waters, and then one day He remembered and thought He had better check on him? No, the biblical concept of remembering has to do with "choosing to act," and forgetting means "refusing to act" on the basis of something. When the Bible says God "remembered" Noah, it means that God chose to act on Noah's behalf and sent a wind to help the waters recede more rapidly. God promises that, under the New Covenant, "I will forgive their wickedness and will remember their sins no more" (Jeremiah 31:34; cf. Hebrews 8:12; 10:17). God does not forget that people have sinned, but, when He forgives, He chooses not to act on the basis of those sins. It is similar to the sentiment expressed in <u>1 Corinthians 13:5</u> where "love keeps no record of wrongs." In the phrase forgive and forget, the two terms are really synonyms. Both mean that the person who has forgiven will not continue to hold that sin against the wrongdoer or take it into account in future interactions. A person may remember that it happened, but he or she can choose not to act on it-that is biblical forgetting.

Many wonder about forgiving people who have sinned but have not confessed, repented, or asked for forgiveness. Sometimes in court, the victims of a crime will get to speak to the perpetrator before the sentence is passed. Often the victims will tell how the crime has impacted them and ask the judge to impose the strictest sentence. But, on occasion, the victim will say to the perpetrator, "I forgive you." Is this forgiveness valid if the convicted criminal has not confessed and asked for forgiveness?

The answer is both "yes" and "no." On one hand, the victim often forgives the criminal so that he or she will not be eaten up by hatred for the criminal. The forgiveness granted by the victim in court does not absolve the criminal from any legal penalties, so the state is still right to prosecute. On the other hand, God forgives people when they confess their sin and ask for forgiveness; forgiveness only comes through faith in Christ, which involves a spiritual transformation. In the courtroom example, even if the victim "forgives" the criminal, there can never be the establishment or restoration of a relationship unless the criminal confesses his sin and actually seeks forgiveness.

The goal of biblical forgiveness is not only to benefit the

victim but to restore the sinner. This cannot happen without the acknowledgment of sin on the sinner's part. Therefore, in some cases the one who has been sinned against is right not to "let it go" until the sinner has asked for forgiveness. Good parents should be willing to forgive once their wayward child has confessed and asked for forgiveness, but they are right to withhold forgiveness until their child has taken the steps necessary to allow the reconciliation. It would be foolish for a father to simply forgive his teenage son for disobeying his rules (and the law) by drinking and driving if the son does not acknowledge that what he did was wrong. However, the father should be willing to forgive when the conditions are right. In some situations, granting unrequested forgiveness cheapens the concept and ignores the seriousness of the offense.

A person should always be willing to forgive every time forgiveness is requested, as Jesus taught. It goes without saying that on some of those occasions the request may be insincere, or, even if sincere, the person will commit the same offense against us again at a later time. After all, isn't this what we do to God, and isn't that how He forgives us?

In some cases the one who has been sinned against is right to simply "let it go," even if forgiveness has not been requested, and in other cases the one sinned against needs to wait until the offending party has confessed and asked for forgiveness, so that the relationship can be restored. This is the principle behind church discipline, as outlined in Matthew 18:15–17. If the confrontation of the sinner brings about confession, then reconciliation and forgiveness are offered. If the confrontation is unsuccessful, excommunication from the church is the final result. As a general rule regarding petty slights and offenses in the family and in the church, a person should let them go-"turn the other <u>cheek</u>," as Jesus put it (<u>Matthew 5:39</u>). However, if the offense is such that turning the cheek is not possible, the offended party is obligated to go talk to the offender about it. Under no circumstance does one have the right to harbor <u>resentment</u>, nurture <u>bitterness</u>, or <u>gossip</u> about the offense.

Here are some questions to ponder in relation to forgiveness:

- Have I confessed my sin and received God's forgiveness?
- Is there anyone whom I have sinned against and from whom I need to ask forgiveness?
- Is there anyone who has sinned against me and has asked me for forgiveness, but I have refused to forgive?
- Is there anyone I am holding a grudge against for past wrongs?

• If there is an unresolved issue, will I simply "let it go," or will I go talk to the offender about it? (Continuing to hold a grudge is not a biblical option!)

• Would I be willing to forgive if the offender asked me for forgiveness?

What is salvation? What is the Christian doctrine of salvation?

Salvation is deliverance from danger or suffering. To save is to deliver or protect. The word carries the idea of victory, health, or preservation. Sometimes, the Bible uses the words *saved* or *salvation* to refer to temporal, physical deliverance, such as Paul's deliverance from prison (Philippians 1:19).

More often, the word *salvation* concerns an eternal, spiritual deliverance. When Paul told the Philippian jailer what he must do to be saved, he was referring to the jailer's eternal destiny (Acts 16:30-31). Jesus equated being saved with entering the kingdom of God (Matthew 19:24-25).

What are we saved *from*? In the Christian doctrine of salvation, we are saved from "wrath," that is, from God's judgment of sin (Romans 5:9; 1 Thessalonians 5:9). Our sin has separated us from God, and the consequence of sin is death (Romans 6:23). Biblical salvation refers to our deliverance from the consequence of sin and therefore involves the removal of sin. We are saved from both the power and penalty of sin.

Who does the saving? Only God can remove sin and deliver us from sin's penalty (2 Timothy 1:9; Titus 3:5).

How does God save? In the Christian doctrine of salvation, God has rescued us through Jesus Christ (John 3:17). Specifically, it was Jesus' death on the cross and subsequent resurrection that achieved our salvation (Romans 5:10; Ephesians 1:7). Scripture is clear that salvation is the gracious, undeserved gift of God (Ephesians 2:5, 8) and is only available through faith in Jesus Christ (Acts 4:12).

How do we receive salvation? We are saved by *faith*. First, we must *hear* the gospel—the good news of Jesus' death and resurrection (Ephesians 1:13). Then, we must *believe*—fully trust the Lord Jesus (Romans 1:16). This involves repentance, a changing of mind about sin and Christ (Acts 3:19), and calling on the name of the Lord (Romans 10:9-10, 13).

A definition of the Christian doctrine of salvation would be "the deliverance, by the grace of God, from eternal punishment for sin that is granted to those who accept by faith God's conditions of repentance and faith in the Lord Jesus." Salvation is available in Jesus alone (John 14:6; Acts 4:12) and is dependent on God alone for provision and assurance.

What is the plan of salvation?

Salvation is deliverance. All the world religions teach that we need to be delivered, but each has a different understanding of what we need to be delivered from, why we need to be delivered, and how that deliverance can be received or achieved. The Bible makes it abundantly clear, however, that there is only one plan of salvation. The most important thing to understand about the plan of salvation is that it is God's plan, not humanity's plan. Humanity's plan of salvation would be observing religious rituals or obeying certain commands or achieving certain levels of spiritual enlightenment. But none of these things are part of God's plan of salvation.

God's plan of salvation – The Why

In God's plan of salvation, first we must understand why we need to be saved. Simply put, we need to be saved because we have sinned. The Bible declares that everyone has sinned (Ecclesiastes 7:20; Romans 3:23; 1 John 1:8). Sin is rebellion against God. We all choose to actively do things that are wrong. Sin harms others, damages us, and, most importantly, dishonors God. The Bible also teaches that, because God is holy and just, He cannot allow sin to go unpunished. The punishment for sin is death (Romans 6:23) and eternal separation from God (Revelation 20:11–15). Without God's plan of salvation, eternal death is the destiny of every human being.

God's plan of salvation - The What

In God's plan of salvation, God Himself is the only one who can provide for our salvation. We are utterly unable to save ourselves because of our sin and its consequences. God became a human being in the Person of Jesus Christ (John 1:1, 14). Jesus lived a sinless life (2 Corinthians 5:21; Hebrews 4:15; 1 John 3:5) and offered Himself as a perfect sacrifice on our behalf (1 Corinthians 15:3; Colossians 1:22; Hebrews 10:10). Since Jesus is God, His death was of infinite and eternal value. The death of Jesus Christ on the cross fully paid for the sins of the entire world (1 John 2:2). His resurrection from the dead demonstrated that His sacrifice was indeed sufficient and that salvation is now available.


God's plan of salvation – The How

In Acts 16:31, a man asked the apostle Paul how to be saved. Paul's response was, "Believe in the Lord Jesus Christ and you will be saved." The way to follow God's plan of salvation is to believe. That is the only requirement (John 3:16; Ephesians 2:8–9). God has provided for our salvation through Jesus Christ. All we must do is receive it, by faith, fully trusting in Jesus alone as Savior (John 14:6; Acts 4:12). That is God's plan of salvation.

God's plan of salvation – Will you receive it?

If you are ready to follow God's plan of salvation, place your faith in Jesus as your Savior. Change your mind from embracing sin and rejecting God to rejecting sin and embracing God through Jesus Christ. Fully trust in the sacrifice of Jesus as the perfect and complete payment for your sins. If you do this, God's Word promises that you will be saved, your sins will be forgiven, and you will spend eternity in heaven. There is no more important decision. Place your faith in Jesus Christ as your Savior today!

clearly stated. It states that it is part of a series of twelve volumes with the purpose "to present simply, compactly and inexpensively a number of the best available interpretations of the Christian philosophy as a guide to Christian living". "God" is the third in the volume. And Walter M. Horton, I think, did a great job with laying out the Christian idea of God and explaining and expanding on any of the numerous attempts to guide anyone in to holding on to capital of France, because we do not have to alter our lives very his or her beliefs in the Christian God.

The gem of this book, at least from my point of view, is where he explores all the various Reasons for Believing in the Christian God. Rather than paraphrasing this work, I might as well relay exactly what Walter Horton says.

"No one believes in the Christian God, or any rival conception of God, out of purely rational motives. Logical reasoning may help to deliver us from inconsistencies, errors, and subjective fantasies; but it is the whole "logic of life," and no merely intellectual process, that drives some of our contemporaries to cast in their lot with the "anti-God" movement, others to find rest in Nature as their mother and healer, and still others to hold their loyalty to the Christian God in the face of bitter nationalistic persecution. It is because men find strength, security, joy, hope, and lasting satisfaction in their religious (or anti-religious) belief that they continue to hold it. Sound reasoning may help confirm such belief, it is not sufficient to establish it.

The appreciation of this fact should deliver us from any ambition to capture men's allegiance for the Christian God, willynilly, by sheer logical cogency. Unless they are drawn to him by the inherent attractiveness of his nature and convinced of his reality by something stronger than argument, the more skillfully we fling the net of our logic over their heads and the more tightly we constrain them in the well-woven strands of our reasoning, the more they will struggle to escape. In religious argument, the attitude of aggressive onslaught is as inappropriate as the attitude 5. Keep in line with the Will of God. of timid defensiveness.

If our God cannot defend himself, we cannot defend him; if he is not strong enough to find his own way to human hearts by the logic of life, we cannot make a way to him by verbal stratagems. The only appropriate attitude in religious argument is that of candidly recognizing the magnitude and difficulty of the religious quest in which we all participate as human beings, and gratefully sharing with fellow-wayfarers whatever truth has come to light us on our way."

After giving out some wonderful reasons why the Christian God is the one to believe in, Walter Horton concludes this brilliant book with further analysis of how to live in accordance with God's will

Here again, I will recall what he says here, rather than attempt to paraphrase.

"The reader of this book will by this time be prepared for an important principle that has been hinted at more than once: God, in the Christian meaning of the word, is not to be found by the intellect alone; and when found, is soon lost again unless he becomes master of every side of our nature. The solution of the problem of God is not yet reached when intellectual difficulties have been cleared away, and something clicks in the brain, as at the solution of a proposition in geometry. God intellectually accepted is like a life-partner coolly and calculatingly selected on points, from a list of suitable prospects, but still unmet, unwooed, and unwon. There is a knowledge of God available only to those who take a further and more decisive step, which brings them into vital accord with his will and power – an accord which is often compared to that which exists between a responsive, obedient child and the parent whom he loves and trusts.

All ideas have a tendency to come into gradual command of our emotions and our actions, if accepted as true and hospitably entertained over a sufficient length of time; yet some ideas encounter terrific resistance from our whole established systems of habits, because they require so much of us, and imply so many radical changes that we are not ready to make. The idea of God is one of these ideas. It is easy to accept the idea that Paris is the much in order to admit this truth. But to accept the idea that God is like Christ is hard, because it may require us to take up our cross and follow him toward Calvary; and all our pleasantest habits and dearest associated, when they sense that we are being drawn in that direction, combine to make us feel like fools and fanatics.

Although the act of 'self-surrender' to God is such a private, individual act, which every one must perform for him or herself and although the inhibitions and difficulties that bar the way to it are peculiar to each individual, there are some suggestions that may prove helpful to those who stand – as many do actually stand in early life - at a point where they can dimly see what God is best to serve, but have not yet established vital contact with that sustaining and directing power called "the Will of God". No one suggestion is equally applicable for all. The best rule is, if one path fails, try another; leave no avenue unexplored that may possibly lead you into face to face relations with Him you seek".

Here are a set of suggested approaches to having a successful life-affirming association with God.

- 1. Establish contact with the Will of God.
- 2. Establish a practice of prayer as the medium of communicating with God.
- 3. Drop grudges and right wrongs within your circle of life.
- 4. Take up a neglected duty.

The book provides a summary to living in accord with God's will by advocating to the reader to keep trying and never to give up. It says; "No one who has once learned to know the feel of the will of God, and taken it for his own, will be able to drift back easily into a careless or irresponsible life. He has acquired a taste and a thirst for the 'water of life', and can never be content again with the 'flesh-pots of Egypt'. Yet the routines of every day, the oblivion of every night, continually makes us deviate by slight and unobserved degrees from the path that the will of God marks out so plainly before us in our great moments; and unless we continually and skillfully endeavor to keep in line with it, we shall be everlastingly reproaching ourselves for perpetual small treasons that may easily grow into great treasons before we know

It concludes this way – "Every loyal servant of God must impose upon himself some kind of self-discipline. Even if we stray off from time to time, it is encouraging to know that if we are notably deficient – as most of us are – on one or two sides of the religious life, it is still possible to find God by another path. What each person needs to do, in working out his or her own method of self-discipline, is to begin with sort of practice most congenial to his religious type, and then enrich and correct it by practices that enshrines the Will of God in your heart".

Amen – that's what I said, at the end of this fascinating, even if rare and out of print book, for the moment. There are a few on the web for sale as "used" but worth the price.

It is my number 1 book for now.

Read: Acts 12:5-7

So Peter was kept in prison, but the church was earnestly praying to God for him. Acts 12:5

When I was a pastor, I often visited residents in rest homes. I'll never forget one dear elderly lady I met. She was blind and had been bedridden for seven years, yet she remained sweet and radiant. One day she told me about a dream she had. She was in a beautiful garden where the grass was a luxuriant carpet beneath her and the fragrance of flowers filled the air.

She dropped to her knees, entranced by the scene. As her thoughts were drawn heavenward, she felt the need to pray for her own pastor, for me, and for others. When she awakened, however, she discovered that she was still in her hospital bed. With a smile she said to me, "You know, Pastor, at first I was a bit disappointed. But in a sense the dream was true. This old bed has been a garden of prayer these seven years!" prayer had made her room a holy place of meditation and blessings.

Prayer also made a difference when Peter was in prison (Acts 12). It isn't always easy to pray, for real intercession takes self-discipline. Many of us lapse into saying fine-sounding words without truly praying. THE SONG OF MARY

Read: Luke 1:39-56

And Mary said, "My soul glorifies the Lord." Luke 1:46

Mary was troubled. She had just heard the words, "Greetings, you who are highly favored! The Lord is with you" (Luke 1:28). Comforting words, it would seem, but startling because they were spoken by an angel.

Mary was about to be presented with the most magnificent news ever, yet she

was fearful. And when the angel told her she would have a baby, she exclaimed, "How will this be,...since I am a virgin?" (v. 34).

Those two facts about Mary—that she was troubled and that she questioned the angel—tell us she was a person like us, with normal concerns.

Yet after listening to the angel, Mary called herself "the Lord's servant," and she said, "May your word to me be fulfilled" (v. 38). She was a humble, godly servant, with a willingness to do God's will.

We, see more of Mary's heart in her

eloquent prayer, known as the Magnificat, the Song of Mary (vv. 46-55). Here she rejoiced in God's holiness (v. 49), His mercy (v. 50), His strength (vv. 51-52), His care for the hungry (v. 53), and His goodness to His people (vv. 54-55).

Question: "Is the ACTS formula for prayer a good way to pray?"

Answer: The ACTS formula for prayer has been taught to children and new believers for many years. *ACTS* is an acronym that gives a basic model on how to pray: with <u>A</u>doration, with <u>C</u>onfession, with <u>T</u>hanksgiving, and with <u>S</u>upplication. While prayer formulas can help us learn to pray, they do not necessarily make our prayers more effective or ensure that our prayers will be answered. This model for prayer is loosely based on the Lord's Prayer (Matthew 6:9–13), except for thanksgiving.

The ACTS model for prayer includes these elements:

Adoration – The *A* in the ACTS model stands for adoration, which means worship—glorying and exalting God. Through adoration, we show our loyalty and admiration of our Father. As we pray, we are called to worship God in adoration. This could be a song of praise to Him, praying a psalm of worship, declaring His attributes, or a myriad of other forms of worship.

Confession – The *C* in the ACTS model stands for confession. The word *confess* means "to agree with." When we confess our sins, we agree with God that we are wrong and that we have sinned against Him by what we have said, thought, or done. God forgives us and restores our fellowship with Him (1 John 1:9).

Thanksgiving – The *T* represents thanksgiving. Philippians 4:6 says, "With thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God" (ESV). How is thanksgiving different from adoration? The difference is that worship focuses on who God is; thanksgiving focuses on what God has done. We can thank God for many things including His love, salvation, protection, and provision.

Supplication – The *S* stands for supplication, which refers to prayer for our and others' needs. A supplication is a request or petition. We may pray for mercy (Psalm 4:1), leading (Psalm 5:8), wisdom (James 1:5), and much more. Paul encouraged us to make "supplication for all the saints" (Ephesians 6:18, ESV), which means to pray diligently for our brothers and sisters in Christ.

Is the ACTS formula for prayer biblical? The acronym itself isn't found in the Bible, but it can serve as a guide, especially when we are learning how to pray. Remember, prayer isn't a formula, and each prayer doesn't have to cover every type of prayer. God wants us to talk from our hearts and express ourselves to Him. As we grow in our love for Jesus Christ, we will naturally desire to talk to Him more.



Question: "What is the five-finger prayer?"

Answer: The five-finger prayer is a method to help people remember categories of people to pray for. It is a memory device used as an aid to prayer.

The little finger, or the pinkie, is the smallest finger, and it represents the individual who is praying. We need to pray for ourselves, but in humility we need to remember that we are the least important.

The ring finger this is usually the weakest of our fingers, and it reminds us to pray for the weak and the sick among us.

The middle finger is the tallest finger, and it reminds us to pray for our leaders.

The pointer finger, or the index finger, reminds us to pray for people who point the way—teachers and church leaders.

The thumb is the thickest and strongest digit, and when the hand is at rest, the thumb is the nearest to the rest of the body, reminding us to pray for family and friends—people who are closest to us.

The five-finger prayer has been popularized by Pope Francis. There is nothing specifically Roman Catholic about the fivefinger prayer; it is simply one method to help people remember whom to pray for, similar to a prayer list. Since we always have our hands with us, the reminder of those in need of prayer is constant.

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RUNNING FROM GOD

From deep in the realm of the dead I called for help, and you listened to my cry. Jonah 2:2

Julie and Liz kayaked off the coast of California, scouting for humpback whales. Humpbacks are known for being active near the surface, making them easy to spot. The two women got the surprise of their lives when one surfaced directly underneath them. An onlooker caught footage of their encounter that showed the large month of the whale dwarfing the women and their kayaks. After briefly going underwater, the women escaped unharmed.

Their experience offers perspective on the biblical account of the prophet Jonah being swallowed by a "huge fish" (Jonah 1:17). God had instructed him to preach to the Ninevites, but because they'd rejected God, Jonah didn't feel they were worthy of His forgiveness. Instead of obeying, he ran away and took passage on a ship. God sent a dangerous storm, and he was thrown overboard.

God provided a way to preserve Jonah from certain death on the high seas, sparing him the far-worse consequences of his actions. Jonah "called to the Lord" and God listened (2:2). After Jonah admitted his wrongdoing and expressed his praise and acknowledgment of God's goodness, he was—at His command expelled from the fish "onto dry land" (V. 10).

By God's grace, when we acknowledge our sin and express faith in Jesus' sacrifice, we're spared the spiritual death we deserve and experience new life through Him. Kirsten Holmberg

INSIGHT

God's pursuit of Jonah is remarkable because at first, everything and everyone obeyed God except the prophet Jonah! In chapter 1, the wind (V. 4), the tempest (V. 15), and the pagan sailors (VV. 12-15) obey God, as does the great fish (V. 17). In chapter 2, the fish still obeys (V. 10), and in chapter 3, the pagan population of Nineveh obey God in repentant faith (V. 5). In chapter 4, the wind and the worm obey Him (VV. 7-8). God pursued Jonah every step of the way, and when the second call came, the prophet himself finally obeyed (VV. 3:1-3). Bill Crowder

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GETTING RID OF BAGGAGE

Esau ran to meet Jacob and embraced him. Genesis 33:4

In college, I studied William Shakespeare's writing for a semester. The class required a giant textbook containing everything Shakespeare had ever written. The book weighed several pounds, and I had to carry it for hours at a time. Lugging that weight around caused my back to hurt, and it eventually broke a metal fastener on my bookbag!

Some things are just too heavy for us to carry. Emotional baggage from past hurt, for example, can weigh us down with bitterness and hatred. But God wants us to have freedom through forgiving people and, when possible, reconciling with them (Colossians 3:13). The deeper the pain, the longer this may take. That's okay. It took many years for Esau to forgive Jacob for stealing his birthright and blessings (Genesis 27:36).

When the two finally reunited, Esau graciously forgave his brother and even "embraced him" (V. 33:4). Not a word was exchanged before they both burst into tears. Over time, Esau had let go of the anger that made him consider murder (V. 27:41). And all those years gave Jacob the chance to see the magnitude of how he'd harmed his brother. He was humble and respectful throughout the reunion (VV. 33:8-11).

In the end, both brothers came to the place where neither required anything from the other (VV. 9, 15). It was enough to forgive and be forgiven and walk away free from the heavy baggage of the past. Jennifer Benson Schuldt

Today's Scripture: Genesis 33:1-11

¹ Jacob looked up and there was Esau, coming with his four hundred men; so he divided the children among Leah, Rachel and the two female servants. ² He put the female servants and their children in front, Leah and her children next, and Rachel and Joseph in the ³ He himself went on ahead and bowed down to the ground rear. ⁴ But Esau ran to meet Jacob and embraced him; he threw his

arms around his neck and kissed him. And they wept. ⁵ Then Esau looked up and saw the women and children. "Who are these with you?" he asked.

Jacob answered, "They are the children God has graciously given your servant." ⁶ Then the female servants and their children approached and bowed down. ⁷ Next, Leah and her children came and bowed down. Last of all came Joseph and Rachel, and they too bowed down. ⁸ Esau asked, "What's the meaning of all these flocks and herds I met?"

"To find favor in your eyes, my Lord," he said.

⁹ But Esau said, :l already have plenty, my brother. Keep what

you have for yourself." ¹⁰ "No, please!" said Jacob. "If I have found favor in your eyes, accept this gift from me. For to see your face is like seeing the face of God, now that you have received me favorably. ¹¹ Please accept the present that was brough to you, for God has been gracious to me and I have all I need." And because Jacob insisted, Esau accepted it.

INSIGHT

Jacob and Esau were twins born to Isaac and Rebekah. Before their birth, God told Rebekah: "Two nations are in your womb...; one people will be stronger than the other, and the older will serve the younger" (Genesis 25:23). From Esau's line sprang the Edomites (36:9), enemies of the Israelites. From Jacob, the younger, sprang the twelve tribes of Israel. Jacob convinced Esau to sell his birthright for a bowl of stew (VV. 29-34) and tricked his father into giving him the firstborn's blessings that was due to Esau (VV. 27:1-29). Although they had a rocky relationship, we read of their reunion and Esau's forgiveness in today's text (VV33:1-9).

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How can I learn to trust that God is in control?

Before we can learn to trust that God is in control of all of life's circumstances, we have to answer four questions: Is God really in control? How much control does He have? If He is not in complete control, then who/what is? How can I learn to trust that He is in control and rest in that?

Is God really in control? The concept of the control of God over everything is called the "sovereignty" of God. Nothing gives us strength and confidence like an understanding of the sovereignty of God in our lives. God's sovereignty is defined as His complete and total independent control over every creature, event, and circumstance at every moment in history. Subject to none, influenced by none, absolutely independent, God does what He pleases, only as He pleases, always as He pleases. God is in complete control of every molecule in the universe at every moment, and everything that happens is either caused or allowed by Him for His own perfect purposes.

"The LORD of hosts has sworn, saying, 'Surely, as I have thought, so it shall come to pass, And as I have purposed, so it shall stand" (Isaiah 14:24). Nothing is random or comes by chance, especially not in the lives of believers. He "purposed" it. That means to deliberately resolve to do something. God has resolved to do what He will do, and nothing and no one stands in His way. "I make known the end from the beginning, from ancient times, what is still to come. I say: My purpose will stand, and I will do all that I please" (Isaiah 46:10). This is our powerful, purposeful God who is in control of everything. That should bring us great comfort and help to alleviate our fears.

But exactly how much control does God have? God's total sovereignty over all creation directly contradicts the philosophy of open theism, which states that God doesn't know what's going to happen in the future any more than we do, so He has to constantly be changing His plans and reacting to what the sinful creatures do as they exercise their free will. God isn't finding out what's going to happen as events unfold. He is continuously, actively running things—ALL things—here and now. But to think He needs our cooperation, our help, or the exercise of our free will to bring His plans to pass puts us in control over Him, which makes us God. Where have we heard that lie before? It's a rehash of Satan's same old lie from the Garden—you shall be like God (Genesis 3:5). Our wills are only free to the extent that God allows us that freedom and no farther. "All the peoples of the earth are regarded as nothing. He does as he pleases with the powers of heaven and the peoples of the earth. No one can hold back his hand or say to him: 'What have you done?''' (Daniel 4:35). No one's free will trumps the sovereignty of God.

Some people find it appealing to think that Satan has control over a certain amount of life, that God is constantly revising His plans to accommodate Satan's tricks. The book of Job is a clear illustration of just who has the sovereign power and who doesn't. Satan came to God and, in effect, said, "Job only serves you because you protect him." So God gave Satan permission to do certain things to Job but no more (Job 1:6–22). Could Satan do more than that? No. God is in control over Satan and his demons who try to thwart God's plans at every step.

Satan knew from the Old Testament that God's plan was for Jesus to come to the earth, be betrayed, crucified and resurrected, and provide salvation for millions, and if there was any way to keep that from happening, Satan would have done it. If just one of the hundreds of prophecies about the Messiah could have been caused by Satan to fail to come to pass, the whole thing would have collapsed. But the numbers of independent, "free will" decisions made by thousands of people were designed by God to bring His plan to pass in exactly the way He had planned it from the beginning, and Satan couldn't do a thing about it.

Jesus was "delivered by the determined purpose and foreknowledge of God" (Acts 2:23). No action by the Romans, the Pharisees, Judas, or anyone else kept God's plan from unfolding exactly the way He purposed it from before the foundation of the world. Ephesians 1 says we were chosen in Him before the world was even created. We were in the mind of God to be saved by faith in Christ. That means God knit together Satan's rebellion, Adam and Eve's sin, the fall of the human race, and the death and crucifixion of Christ—all seemingly terrible events—to save us before He created us. Here is a perfect example of God working all things together for good (Romans 8:28).

Unlimited in power, unrivalled in majesty, and not thwarted by anything outside Himself, our God is in complete control of all circumstances, causing or allowing them for His own good purposes and plans to be fulfilled exactly as He has foreordained.

Finally, the only way to trust in God's sovereign control and rest in it is to know God. Know His attributes, know what He has done in the past, and this builds confidence in Him. Daniel 11:32b says, "The people who know their God shall be strong, and carry out great exploits." Imagine that kind of power in the hands of an evil, unjust god. Or a god that really doesn't care about us. But we can rejoice in our God's sovereignty, because it is overshadowed by His goodness, His love, His mercy, His compassion, His faithfulness, and His holiness.

But we can't trust someone we don't know, and there is only one way to know God—through His Word. There is no magic formula to make us spiritual giants overnight, no mystical prayer to pray three times a day to mature us, build our faith, and make us towers of strength and confidence. There is only the Bible, the single source of power that will change our lives from the inside out. But it takes effort, diligent, everyday effort, to know the God who controls everything. If we drink deeply of His Word and let it fill our minds and hearts, the sovereignty of God will become clear to us, and we will rejoice in it because we will know intimately and trust completely the God who controls all things for His perfect purpose.

Condemnation, guilt and shame work off of momentum, if you stop them early, they lose their power, but once they get rolling, they're hard to stop. Third, think of facing temptation as normal life. If you're expecting a fight, you'll always be ready. Fourth, avoid areas of weakness. Don't put yourself in situations where you can easily fall. There are 39 books in the Old Testament library. There are four types of writing in the Old Testament: Law, History, Poetry, Prophecy.

It is helpful to know which kind of literature you are reading before you start: is it poetry, or is it history?

LAW Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers, Deuteronomy.

The first five books of the Bible are sometimes called the a Law of Moses. They give many of God's laws about how to live.

HISTORY Joshua, Judges, Ruth, 1&2 Samuel, 1&2 Kings, 1&2 Chronicles, Ezra, Nehemiah, Esther.

These 12 historical books cover the occupation of the Promised Land, the time of the Judges, Israel's kings, the fall of the two kingdoms and a return to Jerusalem.

POETRY Job, Psalms, Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, Song of Songs.

Nearly one third of the Old Testament is written in poetry. These five poetical books ask profound questions about evil, pain, love, wisdom and God.

PROPHECY

Isaiah, Jeremiah, Lamentations, Ezekiel, Daniel, Hosea, Joel, Amos, Obadiah, Jonah, Micah, Nahum, Habakkuk, Zephaniah, Haggai, Zechariah, Malachi.

The 17 prophetical books account for almost a quarter of the Bible. They are divided into "Major Prophets" (the first five books) and, "Minor

New Testament

There are 27 books in the New Testament library There are three types of writing in the New Testament: History, Letters, Prophecy.

Before you study a New Testament book it helps to consider what kind of literature you are reading: is it a letter or is it history?

HISTORY Matthew, Mark, Luke, John, Acts

The first four books, called gospels, are not like our modern biographies. But they do give four portraits of Jesus. Acts is part two of Luke, about the early church.

LETTERS PAUL'S LETTERS

Romans, 1 Corinthians, 2 Corinthians, Galatians, Ephesians, Philippians, Colossians, 1 Thessalonians, 2 Thessalonians, 1 Timothy, 2 Timothy, Titus, Philemon.

We have 13 of Paul's letters. Expect for one personal one, Philemon, they were all written to groups of Christians.

OTHER LETTERS Hebrews, James, 1 Peter, 2 Peter, 1 John, 2 John, 3 John, Jude.

We don't know who wrote Hebrews. Tradition states that all the writers of the New Testament, except for John, were martyred.

PHOPHECY Revelation

Written by the apostle John, this book has seven letters to churches and numerous visions about God.



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HUMBLY ASKING FOR HELP

All the believers were together and had everything in common. Acts 2:44

As our party approached, my wife and I started planning. With many people coming, should we pay a caterer to cook? If we do the cooking ourselves, should we buy a barbeque? With a small chance of rain on the day, should we buy a tent too? Soon our party was getting expensive, and even a little antisocial. By trying to provide everything ourselves, we were missing an opportunity to receive the help of others.

The Bible's vision of community is one of both giving and receiving. Even before the fall, Adam needed help (Gensis 2:18), and we're called to seek others' advice (Proverbs 15:22) and share our burdens (Galatians 6:2). The early church held "everything in common," benefiting from each other's "property and possessions" (Acts 2:44-45). Instead of living independently, they shared, borrowed, gave, and received in beautiful interdependence.

We ended up asking guest to bring a salad or dessert to our party. Our neighbors brought their barbeque, and a friend brought his tent. Asking for help enabled us to forge closer relationships, and the food people made brought variety and delight. In an age like ours, being self-sufficient can be a source of pride. But God gives His grace "to the humble" (James 4:6), including those who humbly ask for help. Sheridan Voysey

What stops you from asking for help? What do you currently need that you could borrow instead of buy?

Dear God, thank You for making us relational creatures. Please help me to live humbly, sharing both my wealth and needs with others.


Today Scripture: Acts 2:42-47

⁴² They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer. ⁴³ Everyone was filled with awe at the many wonders and signs performed by the apostles. ⁴⁴ All the believers were together and had everything in common. ⁴⁵ They sold property and possession to give to anyone who had need. ⁴⁶ Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts, ⁴⁷ praising God and enjoying the favor of all the people. And the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved.

INSIGHT

Acts 2:44 pictures the unity and interdependence of the church: "All the believers were together and had everything in common." This same idea comes into view again in chapter 4: "All the believers were one in heart and mind. No one claimed that any of their possession was their own, but they shared everything they had" (V. 32). The English words common (2:44) and shared (4:32) are translations of the Greek word koinos, which means "common," "ordinary," "belonging to generality." In addition, it can refer to things that are ceremonially unclean. In Acts 4:32, we also find a word with the opposite meaning, idios, which is translated "their own": "No one claimed that any of their possessions was their own." The early church snapshots in these chapters reveal a dynamic, spirit-formed unity and humility that led believers to selflessly give and receive. Arthur Jackson
