Agriculture to Irrigation – a Natural Succession

Our member highlight features an irrigation service company arising out of agriculture. Agriculture Precision Supply owner, Mark McCormick, was raised on a farm in the Floydada area and earned his BS and MS



Degrees in business and finance from Texas Tech University. Following a few years in Dallas he returned to Floydada in 1989 to join his dad in the farming operations. With hands-on experience managing and maintaining center pivot sprinklers, Mark became a dealer for Pierce Corporation and expanded the service on



his own systems to other owners and operators in the community. In 2014 he purchased Payne Irrigation in Ralls including the Reinke dealership. APS currently operates from two locations, Ralls and Floydada; designing and selling Reinke center pivots and continues to service all makes of center pivot machines. The stores stock a complete line of drip parts but do not handle design or installation of drip irrigation systems.

APS is agricultural supply in its broadest sense. In addition to selling all types of irrigation parts and accessories; from hand cleaners to hand tools; from flow meters to fertilizer applicators; other larger equipment such as fertilizer tanks and tillage equipment can be purchased from or through them as well.

APS is a family owned and operated business. Mark's wife, Kelly, is the accountant/chief financial officer and manages the store in Floydada. Their son, McCrae, graduates from West Texas A&M in May and will join the family business with a degree in Ag Business. Their daughter, Madolyn, is a sophomore in Business Administration at Texas A&M, College Station.

In addition to the irrigation business, Mark currently farms 5000 acres in Floyd and Hale counties,

producing mainly cotton with some corn and wheat. Over half of the farms are irrigated, mostly under center pivots. Mark joined TAIA in 2012 following invitations from members of the organization and after reviewing its goals and purposes. He is currently serving on the TAIA Board of Directors as the West Region Representative. Mark and Kelly received the Farm Bureau Young Farmer and Rancher Award in 1998.



Mark has been active in Farm Bureau at both the county and state levels; serving as president of Floyd County Farm Bureau and on various committees at the state level. Mark also served on the Floydada School Board.

From Around Texas....

The following is an excerpt from a recent press release from the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board, entitled **Every Acre is Unique**.

Temple— While all other things wither and decay land alone has the capability to sustain or regenerate it-self. Land, marked with a vast array of soils is the origin of food, clothing, manufactured products, building materials, and home to every living thing on this planet. Franklin Delano Roosevelt once wisely said, "The nation that destroys its soil, destroys itself."

Farmers and ranchers hold title to the vast majority of acreage in Texas. In fact, according to the Texas Department of Agriculture, rural lands, including privately owned forests, total 142 million acres or 84% of the state's total land area.

The economic impact of the food and fiber sector in the state totals more than \$100 billion annually. Texas leads the nation in cattle, cotton, hay, sheep, goats and mohair production. Texas A&M Forest Service recently completed a new study of the economic contribution provided by forestry-driven, wood-based industries in Texas. The report shows that the total economic contributions of the Texas forest sector include \$30.3 billion in industry output, supporting more than 130,600 jobs.

Behind the phenomenal success of the Texas agriculture story is sound conservation planning to treat every acre according to its needs. For 75 years since the dust bowl days of the 1930's, generations of agricultural producers have been applying voluntary conservation practices on their land to conserve and improve the soil, water, and related natural resources to which they hold stewardship.
