## Q.L.B. HEARS 4 APPLICATIONS FOR DORVAL

A total of 4 applications for liquor permits in Dorval were dealt with at public meetings held last week in Montreal by the Quebec Liquor Board on Monday Tuesday and Wednesday, Jan 22, 23 & 24th.

The application for a license to operate a tavern at 317 Dorval Avenue was "taken under advisement" and contrary to earlier reports that a decision would be made in ten days, it was learned that the decision may be deferred until the outcome of the proposed amendment to the zoning by-law which would re-zone the property to allow the operation of the tavern.


An application for a dining room license at 375 Dorval Avenue was postponed to the next sitting of the board which will probably be in the late spring or early Summer.

Applications for licenses at 2300 & 2340 Herron Rd., were removed from the order of business before the Board and therefore, no ruling was made. It is as pointed out that this does not prevent re-application at a later date.

## CHIEF NOEL APPOINTS NEW LEGAL COUNSEL

Last week, it has been learned, Dorval Police & Fire Chief A.R. Noel appointed a new lawyer to act on his behalf in his year and one half legal dispute with the City of Dorval. He is Mr. Andre Nadeau Q.C. prominent Montreal lawyer.

Mr. Nadeau replaces Jacques Decary, Dorval Lawyer who has handled the case for Chief Noel since proceedings began in August 1960. Since that time, two favourable judgments have been handed down on the City's behalf. Chief Noel continues to receive his salary under the suspension.

## MIMDALE ASSOCIATION STATES ITS CASE

A large group of citizens attended a meeting of the Mimdale Association Inc., a registered Dorval citizens group, last Saturday at Joubert Hall and expressed its indignation and determination to fight, the recent dangerous moves by a city councillor and the Chamber of Commerce to downgrade the area's zoning status.

The proposed moves would open up the main entrance to the City to such establishments as Grills, Cabarets, Motels, Taverns, Dance Studios, Cocktail Lounges, etc.

The controversy was sparked by the opening of a tavern on the east side of Dorval Avenue last December.

Zoning regulations prohibit such establishments in this section. The Tavern operator, fully aware of these regulations, as well as the fact that other areas were available for his type of business, preferred to act on the granting of his license transferral which in fact contravened the existing zoning by-law for the area. Association protests and City Council action resulted in the closing of the Tavern.

The meeting held that the recent moves by a city councillor and Chamber of Commerce to change the zoning by-laws were aimed at facilitating the re-opening of the Tavern.

This situation, the association executive reported, is only a repetition of the many attempts over the past few years to change the city's by-laws for the benefit of individual enterprises. These attempts would have affected various areas of the city and were always detrimental to the residents at large.

With the downgrading of the zoning by-laws, the city would lose control of the orderly development of the main entrance to Dorval. It would be difficult, if not impossible, to prevent undesirable elements associated with such enterprises as cabarets, dance halls, etc. from moving into our city.

General tax revenues have been allocated with the city for the long needed improvements on Dorval Avenue. It would be ironical, they went on to say, if this progressive step only served to profit the less desirable commercial elements.

The meeting felt that it was high time that the residents at large voiced their rejection of infringements on the type of community environment they expected and invested in.

The group could not understand why, in this day of expert planning, confusion in these matters continue to exist in our city. And why they cannot be guaranteed orderly growth with adequate pro-

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## WORK ON NEW WING TO START SOON

Work on Lachine General Hospital's large-scale expansion and re-building program is expected to get underway early this spring according to Grover C. Furr, Jr., president of the Hospital's Board of Management.

Commencement of the work will bring to a successful conclusion long months of study and planning to make Lachine General, one of Montreal's oldest and most respected accredited hospitals, second-to-none.

The full program, which will cost close to \$2,000,000, provides for 140 beds, an increase over present facilities of 84 per cent, and 33 bassinets, together with all the most equipment.

This will be the fourth big landmark in the history of the Lachine General since it was first identified with the Lakeshore in 1909, when it occupied two rented cottages, then, in 1910, the home of the Dawes family was deeded to it and a wing added in 1912.

This was followed by a long period before the next move. In 1951, when a new wing was built containing 50 beds, the emergency department, operating theatres, dining rooms and kitchens, and other essential facilities.

The hospital, then, can be said to have grown in an effort to match the pace of the expanding Lakeshore and even beyond. Calls upon its services, however, have increased considerably, hence the need for a new structure for a population which extends beyond a collective 125,000.

Like many other institutions of its kind Lachine General has been hamstrung through

lack of ready funds, for it is an independent hospital and gift supported. The generosity of its friends has been largely responsible for the present plans. Thanks to them, the expansion of the hospital will provide for enlarged emergency and radiology departments and a laboratory, pharmacy and department medicine on the ground floor. Alterations and improvements will also be made to the dietary department, the surgical suite and other departments.

On the first floor there will be 23 maternity beds and 33 bassinets. The second floor will contain a 14-bed children's ward and medical-surgical units totalling 54 beds.

Additional medical-surgical units will be contained on the third floor.

Estimated cost of the expansion program has been put at \$1,400,000 for the new construction and \$400,000 for alterations, modernization, furnishings and equipment.

Those associated with the Lachine General's plans are justly proud and grateful to those who have promised financial aid and those who have already given so freely, says Mr. Furr. Without that friendship and generosity a growing area might have had to face more years without a hospital capable of attending to expanding needs.

## DEFICIT FOR CANADA'S

### NON-MERCHANDISE SPENDING

MONTREAL, Jan. 26 --- Canada's deficit for "invisible" or non-merchandise transactions abroad has just about trebled in a decade, according to the Bank of Montreal's Business Review for January, just issued.

The review says Canada's receipts from non-merchandise transactions were \$1.4 billion in 1951, rising to \$1.8 billion by 1960, and representing a quarter of the nation's total current account receipts.

However, in the same decade, Canadian Payments rose by more than \$1 billion, to reach \$2.8 billion in 1960, or 34 per cent of current international payments, versus 30 per cent ten years earlier. Thus, "with payments increasing more rapidly than receipts, the resulting deficit from invisibles nearly trebled during the decade, exceeding \$1 billion in both 1959 and 1960," the B of M says.

### MORE FOREIGN TRAVEL

One important contributor to the situation is the cost of travelling, with Canadians spending about 50 per cent more for travel abroad than foreigners spend here - \$627 million against \$420 million in 1960.

Interest and dividend payments are the largest single deficit item, with \$669 million paid out in 1960, against receipts of \$178 million, the review says.

The decline of the Canadian merchant marine has meant growing dependence on ships of foreign registry, so that Canada's payments for freight and shipping have increased substantially.

Statistics for the first nine months of 1961 point to continuation of these trends, although the travel deficit may be falling off, the review continues.

"Another noteworthy development is that there may


have been an export surplus on merchandise account (in 1961) for the first time since 1954 and therefore the total current account deficit will have arisen from invisible transactions."

Concluding, the B of M review says it does not necessarily follow that the present trend towards a growing deficit will continue. However, it adds, unless there are substantial changes in other accounts, "a very considerable improvement" will be needed in merchandise trade to offset the over-all deficit in "invisibles".

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

## NEW CURLING CLUB OPENS

Madame Claire Kirkland Casgrain, MLA for Jacques Cartier, will throw the first rock at the official opening of the Bonaventure Curling Club on the Côte de Liesse Road, tonight at 8 p.m. The Club introduces pay-as-you-play curling to the province of Quebec.

Many curling clubs in the Montreal and outlying districts will be represented at the opening when clubs rinks participate in a bonspiel. A parade of prominent guests and curlers will be led around the 12-sheet ice surface by the traditional Scotch pipers.

About 300 guests are expected to attend the opening of the Bonaventure Curling Club whose luxurious decor stresses a "habitant" theme. The 180 foot long spectator

lounge has redwood walls, indirect lighting with specially designed wall brackets in the form of wooden picture frames featuring scroll iron work. The briar walnut furniture is Thibault from Ste. Thérèse, Que. Some settees and arm chairs are covered in deep rich red fabric of habitant weave. Others are in fabrics of a multi-coloured folk weave.

The carpet has been specially woven and repeats dramatically part of the club crest which is a blue fleur de lis atop a brown curling stone. Background of the carpet is a mixture of red and yellow which gives an orange effect.


The fire-proof drapes are in a natural colour called "Cypress" designed to cut the sunlight as the Club faces due south.

The lobby area with terrazzo floor, again bearing the club crest, and glazed brick walls is accented by two settees in satin chrome with walnut arms and black upholstery.

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# IN FOCUS

**TEST YOURSELF:** Thirty-one fourth year students of St. Stephen's High School, Dorval, were given a vocabulary test of educational attainment prepared by Dr. George Gallup of Gallup Polls, Mr. Wm. Davies, Principal, had reason to be proud of the results. Standard results on the 18 word test showed that High School graduates should be able to define 2 words, third year college students should know 5, college graduates 8, St. Stephen's came through with four students defining two words, eight who defined three, two who scored four, five knowing five words, two with six, two with seven and one at the college graduate level of eight. Only one pupil scored zero, and six scored below high school graduate level with one correct answer.

Of American High School graduates tested recently in a National sampling, one in three could not define a single word correctly, a later testing showed that fully half could not describe a single one of the words. Matched against the results of these graduates and other American students, St. Stephen's grade eleven students showed high marks.

The importance of the test is the correlation of vocabulary with scholastic ability. Students who possess verbal facility tend to score highest in college entrance examinations.



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
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# LACHINE HIGH REPORTS
