WICHITA EAST and LAWRENCE high schools are co-state champions of Kansas high school football for 1946. There's no other solution. After the Lawrence Lions won their 25th straight victory by defeating previously undefeated Great Bend, 44-0, there was a day in which they stood on top, but those rankings didn't appear in print. Friday night we asked Coach Bob Briggs, assistant to Coach Heavly Ervin of Topeka, which team was the best. Topeka was the only team in the state which met both Lawrence and East.

Briggs didn't hesitate. "Wichita East gave us our toughest game," he declared. Reminded that Lawrence had taken the Trojans by three touchdowns while East won by only two, Briggs said: "Yes, I know that, but we played our best game of the year against Wichita East." And backing up Briggs' statement, several players who had been on the Trojan grid squad asserted East was the tougher opponent.

At that, Lawrence beat Topeka by three touchdowns and no more could be asked. Nor was it the fault of the Lions that Topeka saved its best game of the year for the Blue Aces. Of a certainty Coach Chalmers Woodard's boys were quite as rugged as could be desired in that Great Bend final. Some recognition must be given to the consistency represented in that 25 game win streak. Lawrence won them all and asked for no soft spots. Moreover the Lions were willing to take a chance in scheduling a late game, and for that earn an extra credit in your bluebook.

STILL STRADDLING the fence, we give you Coaches Ronald "Stub" Mayo of Wichita East and Chalmers Woodard of Lawrence as the 1946 "coaches of the year" in Kansas high school football.

THE AA TEN includes East, Lawrence, Coffeyville, only undefeated teams of their class in the state. Hutchinson lost only to East; Shawnee lost to Lawrence and Wyandotte but was better than Wyandotte from mid-season on. Wellington lost to East and Hutchinson; Wyandotte to Lawrence and Topeka; Haskell to Benton (St. Joseph, Mo.); North to East, Hutchinson and Wellington; Topeka to East, Lawrence, North and End, Okla. The Class A teams, from the Cadets through Augustas are undefeated. We are not certain all "B" teams rated are still classified "B" since the enrollment figure for classification has been altered. Lindsborg was the only "B" school in the Central Prairie League of which it is champion. Nickerson defeated several A teams, but met largely B rivals. Hope, champion of the Smoky Valley League, lost only to Herington, its big Class A neighbor. Luray, Wellsville, Washburn Rural and Ols, like the two leaders, were undefeated. Tribune lost only to Syracuse and won a WKEA title; Clifton lost only to St. John and took the Quivira League. Garnett and Burlington tied for second, behind the great Eureka team, in the Tri-Valley loop.

JUST BITS: Tom Hardy, all-AVL center for Hutch high last year is trying for the team at Gonzaga this season, as is Rich Evans, an outstanding Salina Sacred Hearts last fall. Hutchinson and Lawrence have been trying to schedule a grid game for next fall but haven't yet got together on a date. "I would be a 'natch'." Talk's started in East Kansas again for a league to include Ward, Wyandotte, Topeka, Emporia and Ottawa.

D.P.S. of the Parsons Sun suggests the Coffeyville team might have found "the game" by playing Benton of the state or El Dorado and W.J.E. of the Coffeyville Journal come back with "H.D.P.S. had been around watching closely several years ago, he might have noticed these two teams backing away from contact with the Lyons because of the severity of the competition." Trippi-Justice In Sugar Bowl L.S.U. And Arkansas In Cotton

New Orleans (AP)—Georgia's unbeaten, untied Bulldogs will meet North Carolina's Southern conference champions in the 13th annual Sugar Bowl game here on Jan. 1.

Officials of the Mid-Winter Sports association announced the pairings late Saturday after some long-distance telephoning which followed Georgia's 35-7 thumping of Georgia Tech and the Carolina Tarheels' 40 to 14 victory over Virginia.

The match had been freely predicted as the most likely Sugar Bowl combination if both teams won their games.

The game will feature a duel between two of the country's most spectacular tailbacks—Georgia's triple-threat all-American candidate Charlie Trippi and North Carolina's 160-pound freshman, Charlie Justice.

Georgia's Bulldogs, rated No. 3 behind Army and Notre Dame in last week's Associated Press poll of college football teams, is the country's only unbeaten, untied college eleven besides UCLA.

North Carolina's Tarheels are champions of the Southern conference, with a season's record of eight victories, one tie and one defeat.

The only loss was 20-14 to the Tennessee Vols—and this was somewhat discounted by a victory over Wake Forest, which had beaten Tennessee. Virginia Tech tied the Carolinians in their season opener, 14 to 14.

UCLA Ends Perfect Season

Los Angeles (AP)—The Rose Bowl-bound Bruins of UCLA ended a perfect grid campaign Saturday—the first in the 29-year history of the blue and gold—with an 18 to 0 triumph over the Cornhuskers of Nebraska before 52,553 fans in Memorial coliseum.

Scoring two touchdowns in the second quarter and one more in the final period, the UCLA's finished the 1946 schedule with 10 straight wins, no ties, and a total of 313 points to 72 for their opponents.

Thus the slate was clean for UCLA's clash in the Rose Bowl New Year's day with the University of Illinois, whose scouts saw little new in the free-wheeling Bruin machine today.

Coach Bert Labrucherie used his best speed burners, and the Bruins rolled up huge yardage against a stubborn Cornhusker squad that never surrendered until the end.

Three times the Huskers stopped the Bruins inside the ten yard line, once on the one, but they could never mount a sustained drive and crossed the mid-field stripe themselves but twice—the first on the Bruin 48 yard line.

The UCLA's put on three marches that paid off. The first was good for 84 yards, with Quarterback Ernie Case topping it off with a 25 yard pass to Left End Burr Baldwin in the end zone. The second came on a 29-yard thrust, with Fullback Jack Myers going over from the two. A 73-yard parade, with Halfback Al Holch going for the final five, concluded the scoring.

The UCLA's ran up 433 yards to 63 yards via the ground and air, with little Halfback Skip Rowland the day's leading gainer—128 yards in 19 runs with the ball.

The defeat for Nebraska's comparatively green team was the sixth of the year.

Sesher Names Juco Starters

A team of all-Hutchinson players probably will compose the Junior college starting line-up when it opens its basketball season at 8 p. m. Friday against the Central State Teachers college at Convention hall.

Coach Charles Sesher said his probable starters will be Jack Pittman and Gerald Raines, forwards; Hayden Hubbard, center; Dick Woodall and Joe Utterback, guards. All are former Hutchinson high school players.

Other players likely to see action are J. M. Minah, guard from California; Harold Buckner, Maurice Henderahot, Dick Kuhns, Harold DeVuis, Hobart Hillard and Carl Davis.

Georgia Star Hot As Team Takes Tech, 35-7

Athens, Ga. (AP)—Charlie Trippi defeated Georgia Tech Saturday 35-7, with some occasional help from his Georgia teammates and an hour later the Bulldogs voted unanimous acceptance of an invitation to meet North Carolina in the Sugar Bowl game at New Orleans Jan. 1.

Trippi thrilled the capacity crowd of 55,000 with three touchdowns, one on a 68-yard dash after Tech's lone score, and with a touchdown heave to Johnny Rough. The victory gave the Bulldogs their first perfect season since 1936 when the famed Pop Warner steered them through four games.

Cowboys Take Title

Abitene, Tex. (AP)—The Hardin-Simmons Cowboys rolled to an impressive 21 to 6 victory over the Texas Tech Red Raiders before 15,000 fans here Saturday to win the Border conference championship and remain undefeated for the season.

Snobs In Another Ball

New York (AP)—Russia balked Saturday at proposed international supervision of return of Jewish property in former enemy countries as the foreign ministers council bogged down in a mass of technicalities surrounding peace pacts for the Axis satellites.

Municipal Stadium, Philadelphia (AP)—Army's overzealous Cadets wound up their three-year run unbeaten Saturday, but only by the squeaky margin of three extra points 21 to 18 as the Navy plucked itself off the floor from its worst season in history to battle the mightiest gridiron machine of a generation to a standstill.

The only reason the impossible didn't happen was because the "monster and his play-mate"—Doc Blanchard and Glenn Davis—set off all their sizzling fireworks in the first half, and the Middle-kicking toes couldn't hit the bulls-eye.

From the start of the second half it was Navy's ball game, as the up-to-now meek Middles, maulled and manhandled in seven straight starts, gave the Cadets the fight of their lives.

The fiercely fighting future admirals put up a fight that they dug in on Army's five yard line and still rolling when the clock ran out, to end what appeared the makings of one of the most amazing upsets the game of molecskin mayhem has ever seen.

It left the 102,000 spectators hanging on the ropes and gasping as the Middles stopped B. and D. to a slow walk in the final two periods and sailed down-field for two touchdowns on their own.

President Truman, the former artilleryman who is strictly neutral in this brawl every year, sat in his 50-yard line box on the Navy side of the field through the first half and saw the Black Knights of the Hudson pull the customers out of their seats as Davis dashed 13 yards for the first score, Blanchard bulled his way 52 yards for a second and then Davis hit Blanchard with a 57-yard pass in the end zone for a third to give Army a 21-0 edge at the half.

Jack Ray, the Texan with the thread-a-needle toe, booted the point after each one of these tallies.

In Abeyes (Base) Baysinger, tall, slim Syracuse, N. Y., quarterback who never did any signallying before the Notre Dame clash three weeks ago, and Bill Hawkins of Richmond, Va., fresh off the hospital list, the Navy had the scoring punch. Base scored the first marker on a one-yard sneak through the line, climbing an 82 yard march, and Hawkins hit the jackpot for the second, from two yards, after the team had march 73.

They got the opportunity for the last one when Arnold Tucker called for a fourth-down rush well in his own territory and Blanchard failed to make the distance. Bill Earl, a tiny 160-pound pitcher from Arlington, Va., tossed a short one which Leon Bramlett, the Navy captain from Clarksdale, Miss., caught in the end zone.

Nine of Army's starting 11—headed by D. and B.—wound up their careers with a win, squeaky as it was. It's the end of the road for them, and for a football star that probably won't be seen again in a long, long time if ever. For it's the end of the wartime football that loaded the two service schools with talent at the expense of many of the other colleges.

As for Navy, with most of its present squad returning, it may mark the beginning of a run in which the Middles can catch up somewhat on their Army rivals.

Arizona pushed over two touchdowns in the final period before sending in its reserves.

Kansas State lost to all Big Six conference foes and to Hardin-Simmons, San Francisco, New Mexico and Arizona in non-league games.

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Coachless Irish In Undefeated Season, Trounce Trojans, 26-6

South Bend, Ind. (AP)—A tiny Texan, 160-pound Coy McGee, fired Notre Dame to a relentless 26 to 6 closing triumph over stubborn Southern California to give absent Irish Coach Frank Leahy his first undefeated season since 1941 before a capacity crowd of 66,000 at Notre Dame Stadium Saturday.

As slashing and explosive as the "coachless" Irish were in piling up their eighth victory against a scoreless tie with Army for the season, they couldn't stop the inspired Trojans from scoring the first touchdown against Notre Dame's first stringers and making it 13 to 6 ball game until the final period.

McGee streaked 77 yards for the first Irish score in the second quarter, seconds after he galloped 50 yards on another break-away. The Longview, Tex., fireball launched a 18-point Irish attack in the final period with an eight-yard payoff jaunt around end.

With Leahy at home bed-ridden with a cold and "nervous exhaustion," the Irish ploughed to 26 first downs against Southern California's nine and an amazing 517 yards by rushing against 108.

Yet, it took McGee's phantom-like flitting to spark them to their brace of six-pointers in the second and fourth period.

Southern California, held beyond the 50 the first half, exploded for a 45-yard-touchdown drive late in the third period when Johnny Naumu squirmed over from the one-foot stripe.

Good Trapping Season Predicted By Leahy

Pratt (AP)—Dave Leahy, fish and game director, said Saturday there is a plentiful supply of muskrat and raccoon in Kansas as the trapping season opens Sunday. The season closes Jan. 31.

Leahy reminded trappers that state regulations prohibit the use of more than 20 traps in operations.

A heavy increase in number of raccoons was shown this year, Leahy said, particularly in the western portion of the state. The muskrat situation also looks favorable, he added, and trappers probably will get more for the animals this year.

Rice Owls Wallop Baylor, 38 To 6

Houston, Tex. (AP)—The Rice Owls defeated the Baylor Bears 38 to 6 before 30,000 fans here Saturday to become co-champions of the Southwest conference with the Arkansas Razorbacks.

The victory made it five out of six conference games for the Owls, and cleared the decks for their Orange Bowl battle with Tennessee in Miami on Monday night. Dr. E. E. Boyd will be the toastmaster and S. F. Pascock will give the welcoming address.
