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AMANA NEWS AND NOTES

New Year's in Communal Amana

With a long winter to work their way through, the week between Christmas and New Year's was cherished and celebrated with work days made short as possible and time spent visiting relatives and friends.

Did they work at the textile mills and calico dye work from December 24 and January 2? The mill schedule was determined by the outstanding orders, so it's doubtful they took a full week off, but they certainly did take December 26, 31st and New Year's Day off. Meanwhile craftsmen put down their tools and did not light the fire in the stoves of their craft shops, though the general stores remained open as out of town trade continued.

Arranging to borrow a sleigh, wagon or buggy to drive to visit relatives in other villages meant a mid-December call on the farm boss who gave his permission, made a note in his book, and had a word with the boss of the horse barn. Because there were only so many horses and so many wagons, buggies or sleighs, this meant that it did take the whole of

a week or may be longer for those who wanted to borrow a rig to have the opportunity to do so as everyone had to wait their turn. If practical, folks walked from village to village, or hitched a ride with the "mail wagon." Of course, if it was very muddy, icy, very deep snow or very cold, everyone stayed home.

Now the doctors each had a team of horses, a sleigh and a buggy they could use at a moment's notice and so each of the doctor's homes had a small stall barn nextdoor for the horses and someone nearby, a teenager or the doctor's son, was assigned to be on call to hitch up the team immediately while the doctor got his medicines and prepared whatever he might need to bring to the housecall.

My grandmother told the story of the South Amana midwife having to go out in the worst blizzard anyone had seen in years. Now she was the aunt or perhaps great aunt of Emma Setzer who delivered so many Amana Colony babies through the 1940s. This woman knew her duty and never let weather bother her.

But on this particular night in mid-winter when someone came to pound upon the midwife's door to tell her that a telegram had been received in the Lower South Amana railroad

depot stating that she was urgently needed in West Amana, even she had to pause to say a prayer as she got her nurse's bag.

As the howling windstorm of snow and ice would have upset any carriage or sleigh, the teamster who drove her knew they had to take a heavy sledge rather than a light-duty sleigh. So he hitched the sledge up to a team of the steady and stalwart draft horses. Sledges were used to carry heavy loads like lumber or block ice over ice and snow. They were wide and long and had no seat; so the driver stood balanced upon the rack, bracing himself against the cross bar.

The brave midwife, wrapped in wool from head to toe, held onto the driver's waist as they braved the north wind driving from South Amana to West Amana. The narrow bridge was drifted shut so when they came to the Iowa River they had to descend the drifted bank and go across the ice, in the dark, up the next bank. This was highly dangerous for there were felled trees and unseen gullies beneath the drifts that could entrap them. When they came to the first bank, down they plunged and the midwife was swept from the rack and thrown into a snowdrift. The teamster heaved too and dug her out.

"Surely we must go back!" he said. But she was determined, and so off they went again the big horses pulling the sledge up and over the drifts and mounds with jolting strength. Once across the river, they still had the Mill Race to cross. Twice more the midwife was thrown into the snow. And twice more she climbed back on the sledge. By the time they reached West Amana, she was near frozen and had to be unwrapped and defrosted, but she was determined and undaunted and did her job assisting the birth. The doctor, from Middle Amana, had farther to drive and did not reach West Amana in time.

As was the routine then, the midwife stayed nine more days in the newborn's home assisting mother and baby and making sure both were doing well. For a period of many weeks after the midwife would visit the newborn's home frequently to check the new mom and the newborn to see if both thrived. New moms did not return to work at the kitchen house or the village garden and stayed home with their babies until they were three years old or so.

The midwife, a brave and very hardworking woman, took her adventure in stride. Indeed she remained a midwife for many years until Emma Setzer took her place in South Amana.

I wish I knew her name and will have to do some research as to who exactly she was. She might have been a Siegel or a Setzer but she was certainly made of the right stuff.
