The Message for April 4, 2021
Easter Sunday
"The Empty Tomb"

The tomb was empty!

Did you ever think that as Mary Magdalene and Mary, the mother of James, made their way to the tomb early in the morning, that they might have seen, or perhaps walked right by the empty cross? The place where Jesus was buried was not far from where he died; so, it was perhaps right by the cross that the Mary's had to walk to get to the tomb. They may have tried hard not to look at the cross or even the place where the cross had stood, but it would have been almost impossible for them to not see it. The empty post that held the cross beam in place was still standing.

At the top of the post, they may have seen the dried blood and water that had flowed from his spear-pierced side. Perhaps the crown of thorns still laid in the dirt along with the nails that had held him to the cross. The entire length of the post must have been smeared with the blood from Jesus' back, which had been torn to shreds as he was flogged and beaten before he was crucifixion.

Even the ground around the cross would have been stained with his blood, that first Easter morning. But now, the hill on which the cross had stood was all but empty, It was a clear reminder that Jesus really did die.

They wouldn't have taken Jesus off the cross if he wasn't dead. As they took him down, the soldiers knew he was dead, the bystanders knew he was dead, the religious leaders who wanted him to die knew he was dead, the disciples knew he was dead and Mary, his own mother, knew he was dead After all, she had held his lifeless body in her arms.

The empty cross reminds us that Jesus died, but it also reminds us that we are forgiven, because that's why Jesus died. It is through the death of Jesus that our sins are forgiven.

No one likes to talk about sin. None of us likes to admit that we are sinners but sin is real, sin is universal, and the consequences is death and separation from God. Just like Adam and Eve, we make our own decisions and follow our own desires. Sometimes we make poor decisions so must pay the price for our sinful nature Through Christ, God forgives us. But because loves us so much, he sent his only Son, Jesus, to take our sins onto himself and die in our place. We are forgiven not because of what we have done but because of what Jesus has done for us.

The first promise we see in the empty cross is that God forgives us – not because we have earned it and not because we deserve it. God forgives us simply because he loves us. The empty cross is the sign of God's promise to forgive.

The second promise of Easter is the empty grave. When the women got to the tomb, the stone was rolled away and the tomb was empty. Jesus was gone! Now there are some who think the women went to the wrong tomb. Because of their grief, pain, and confusion they just went to the wrong place; after all it was early in the morning and the sun had not as yet made its appearance. Of course, the problem with that theory is that once word spread about the empty tomb, the disciples raced there to check it out and they would have gone to the right tomb. Someone would have made sure they went to the right place and if the disciples all somehow got it wrong, as news of Jesus spread, the Roman officials and religious leaders would have doubled checked to make sure. They wanted Jesus dead so they would have checked the tomb out for themselves, but since no one stepped forward to correct the disciples – we know that they all had the correct tomb, and the tomb was empty.

Some thought the tomb was empty because the Romans took Jesus' body for safekeeping, but again if that were true, if the Romans or the religious leaders had taken the body, then as the story of Jesus' resurrection spread, they would have produced the body to stop the story. There were still others that said the disciples took the body. Well, beside the fact that the tomb was sealed and guarded, why would the disciples steal the body and then be willing to die for something they knew to be a lie?

The disciples didn't steal the body of Jesus, the Roman government didn't steal the body, the Jewish leaders didn't steal the body, and it was the right tomb the women went to early that morning which all means one thing – the tomb was empty and Jesus was alive.

The resurrection of Jesus tells us that death itself has been defeated and because Jesus is alive, we who believe in him will live also. In the book of Revelation, Jesus says this:

Do not be afraid, I am the First and the Last. I am the living One.

I am alive for ever and ever, and I hold the keys of death and Hades.

The empty grave stands as the promise of eternal life for all of us. The empty grave is the lasting promise that death has lost its power. Death could not hold Jesus and the grave cannot hold those who trust in him. Yes, the wages of sin are death but the gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ. The empty cross reminds us of God's promise to forgive; the empty tomb reminds us of God's gift of eternal life for all who trust in Jesus.

The third promise found in emptiness is perhaps the most powerful of all. It's the promise we find in the empty grave clothes. Look at John 20:6-7. When Jesus rose from the dead, the shroud or grave clothes that had held him remained in the tomb and all of them except the covering of his head were undisturbed. The empty grave clothes means that the body of Jesus was up and walking around. The resurrected Jesus was not a ghost, he was not a spirit; Jesus himself was alive and present with his friends. He was there to continue his relationship with them. Mary sees him, hears him, and touches him. In time, all the disciples will see him, hear him, walk with him, and eat with him once again. The empty grave clothes promise us that an ongoing relationship with Jesus is possible.

It's not just the knowledge of forgiveness or the hope of eternal life which we celebrate, but we also celebrate the truth that Jesus is alive, here and now, and calls us into a deeper personal relationship with him. One of the promises of Easter is the promise of a relationship with God through the death of his Son on the cross. It's a free gift offered without reservation.

The best of life is experienced in our relationship with God; the promise of the empty grave is that, through Jesus, we can enter into that relationship. We can know God through Jesus. We can experience life in all its fullness, in all its purpose, in all its power when we are willing to walk with him and listen to and open our lives up to him. The empty grave promises that if we give our lives to God, God will enter into the fullness of life within us.

So, in the fullness of Easter, we see three powerful promises: the promise of forgiveness, the promise of eternal life and the promise of a personal relationship with God right here, *right now*. An empty cross tells us that Jesus *did die* and because of his death, we are forgiven. An empty tomb tells us that death has been defeated and we have the hope of eternal life, and the empty grave tell us that Jesus is alive and here with us today. Mark 16:7 tells us these words of Jesus as he spoke to Mary at the tomb, early that first Easter morning:

"Go, tell my disciples and Peter, say that I am going ahead of you into Galilee.

There they will see me, just as I told you."

He is risen and because He lives you will live also. Matthew 28:1-20 tells us this: about 40 days later, the 11 disciples went to Galilee, to the mountain where Jesus had told them to go. Then Jesus appeared to them once again and said:

"All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me.

Therefore, go and make disciples of all nations,
baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit,
and teach them to obey everything I have commanded you.

And know this, surely, I am with you always, even to the very end of the age."

It's quite a story, but the best part is that it happened just as the writers of the Gospels said. People ask me, "Do you really believe this story of the resurrection the story of Jesus?" And my answer is always the same:

I not only believe it, I counting on it.

And I hope you are counting on it too.

Music for Easter

Written by Charles Wesley in 1739, the first year of his conversion, this joyful hymn is right at the top in popularity with his *Hark! the Herald Angels Sing*. The "Alleluia" refrains were added much later by editors and are thought to be a reminder of an ancient Easter greeting. But one of the most powerful features of the text is that it is written in the present tense: "Christ the Lord <u>IS</u> risen today!" In an article written for the UMC Discipleship Ministries, Peyton Stouth writes, "...it places us in community with those who witnessed the resurrection in their own lifetimes, and reaffirms our own hope of being set free from death." Alleluia!

Some thoughts about Handel and the "Hallelujah Chorus"...

On composing the "Hallelujah Chorus" Handel is said to have remarked,

"Whether I was in my body or out of my body as I wrote it, I know not. God knows."

Why do we stand for the "Hallelujah Chorus"? When the choir began singing it during the first performance in London, King George II reportedly stood; the audience joined him, of course, and they all remained standing until the final "Hallelujah!" The tradition continues to this day.

At a time when illiteracy was widespread and written copies of the Bible were expensive and rare, Handel designed the "oratorio" to teach the scriptures by setting them to music. He wanted to take the message of the scriptures to the streets and specifically with the intent that they would be heard in secular theaters. The church was outraged and protested, but Handel persisted, even though doing this also meant little or no profit from his endeavors.

Earnings from many of the early performances were used to benefit hospitals, and assist the poor, the needy, orphaned children, the widowed, and the sick.
