National Nursing Assistants week has been celebrated during the month of June since 1977.


The Omnibus Reconciliation Act of 1987 encouraged the hiring of CNAs in Medicaid and Medicare-approved medical facilities all across the country.

Midwest Career Source

Midwest Career Source (**MCS**), located at 9100 Lebanon Road, Belleville, Illinois provide the life skills and vocational/technical training opportunities, tutoring, career guidance necessary for individuals seeking career advancements to attain employment. MCS believes that "education is a journey not a destination. MCS is approved by the Illinois Board of Higher Education (IBHE) and Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH).

MCS provide the following courses:

Information Technology course -an introductory program into the information systems discipline. It prepares students with techniques, tools and methods used today in the development and use of computerbased applications. Upon successful completion of the course, students receive a certificate of completion. Course objective: to teach and to prepare students for a wide variety of IT areas to include but not limited to: basic fundamentals of the computer, common information technology terminology, basic computer based applications, software platforms such as: Microsoft word, Excel, Power Point, Moodle and security systems

Medical Unit Secretary – Provide medical clerical training to individuals on how to process physician orders in a hospital, nursing home or physician office. Unit clerks play a vital role in managing information flow in hospitals, nursing homes and doctor's offices. Upon completion, individuals receive a certificate of completion and can be employed as medical secretaries in clinics, hospitals, nursing homes, doctor's offices.

Basic Nursing Assistant - To teach and train individuals to help care for patients and to provide support to members of the nursing team. BNAs provide care to patients and provide support to members of the nursing team under the supervision of a registered nurse and licensed practical nurse. Upon completion, individuals receive a certificate of completion and are eligible to take the State Exam to become certified. After successfully passing, the State Exam individuals can be employed as C N A in clinics, hospitals, nursing homes, doctor's offices.

Psychiatric Rehabilitation Technician -

to obtain a basic psychiatric rehabilitation technician certificateusing skills acquired listed in training objectives. To teach and train individuals to help care for patients and to provide support to members of the nursing team under the supervision of a registered professional and licensed practical nurse. The Illinois Department of Public Health's Program model will be used. Upon successful completion, students will receive a certificate of completion and be eligible to take the State Examination as a Certified Nursing Assistant with a Certificate as a Psychiatric Rehabilitation Technician. Graduates can work in clinics, nursing homes, hospitals. Upon successfully passing the State exam, students become Certified Nurse Assistants and eligible to use the term Psychiatric Rehabilitation Technician.

LPN program soon to come.

MCS has a partnership with WIOA, Cahokia Unit School District and Memorial Hospital (BJC) to provide jobtraining skills.

Black History Month

The celebration of Black History Month began as "Negro History Week," which was created in 1926 by Carter G. Woodson, a noted African American historian, scholar, educator and publisher. It became a month-long celebration in 1976. The month of February was chosen to coincide with the birthdays of Frederick Douglass and Abraham Lincoln.

NAACP: On February 12, 2019, the NAACP marked its 110th anniversary. Spurred by growing racial violence in the early 20th century, and particularly by 1908 race riots in Springfield, Illinois, a group of African American leaders joined together to form a new permanent civil rights organization, the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP). February 12, 1909, was chosen because it was the centennial anniversary of the birth of Abraham Lincoln.

Heavyweight Champ: Jack Johnson became the first African American man to hold the World Heavyweight Champion boxing title in 1908. He held onto the belt until 1915.

First Lawyer: John Mercer Langston was the first Black man to become a lawyer when he passed the bar in Ohio in 1854. When he was elected to the post of Town Clerk for Brownhelm, Ohio, in 1855 Langston became one of the first African Americans ever elected to public office in America. John Mercer Langston was also the great-uncle of Langston Hughes, famed poet of the Harlem Renaissance.

Famous Protestors and

Activists: While Rosa Parks is credited with helping to spark the Civil Rights movement when h she refused to give up her public bus seat to a white man in Montgomery, Alabama in 1955–inspiring the Montgomery Bus Boycott—the lesser-known Claudette Colvin was arrested nine months prior for not giving up her bus seat to white passengers.

Supreme Court Justice: Thurgood Marshall was the first African American ever appointed to the U.S. Supreme Court. He was appointed by President Lyndon B. Johnson and served on the court from 1967 to 1991.

Eminent Scientist: George Washington Carver developed 300 derivative products from peanuts among them cheese, milk, coffee, flour, ink, dyes, plastics, wood stains, soap, linoleum, medicinal oils and cosmetics.

First Senator: Hiram Rhodes Revels was the first African American ever elected to the U.S. Senate. He represented the state of Mississippi from February 1870 to March 1871.

First Woman

Representative: Shirley Chisholm was the first African American woman elected to the House of Representatives. She was elected in 1968 and represented the state of New York. She broke ground again four years later in 1972 when she was the first major party African American candidate and the first female candidate for president of the United States.

Self-Made Millionaire: Madam C.J. Walker was born on a cotton plantation in Louisiana and became wealthy after inventing a line of African American hair care products. She established Madame C.J. Walker Laboratories and was also known for her philanthropy. **Oscar Winner:** In 1940, Hattie McDaniel was the first African American performer to win an Academy Award—the film industry's highest honor—for her portrayal of a loyal slave governess in *Gone With the Wind*.

First Professional Black Baseball

Player: On April 5, 1947, Jackie Robinson became the first African American to play Major League Baseball when he joined the Brooklyn Dodgers. He led the league in stolen bases that season and was named Rookie of the Year.

First Black

Billionaire: Before Oprah Winfrey and Michael Jordan joined the billionaire's club, Robert Johnson became the first African American billionaire when he sold the cable station he founded, Black Entertainment Television (BET) in 2001.

First Black President: In 2008, Barack Obama became the first Black president of the United States.

First Black Vice President: In

2021, Kamala Harris became the first woman of African or Asian descent to become vice president. Harris's mother immigrated to the United States from India and her father immigrated from Jamaica.

Population Growth: The Black population of the United States in 1870 was 4.8 million; in 2018, the number of Black residents of the United States 43.8 million.
