Principal's News

If you didn't already know by now, it's Catholic Schools Week at St. Paul School and all across the country. If that family does come in and signs up their child, you will receive a discount on your tuition as well (please see me on what your discount would be).

For families with children currently enrolled at St. Paul School, please note that **<u>Registration Forms</u>** will <u>be going home Monday, February</u> <u>3</u>. Please get them in ASAP so that we can begin to see what are needs are in the months & year ahead. We also have to start preparing our 2020-2021 School Budget too which needs to be completed by May 31. The **Registration Fee** of **\$150** which is used to purchase books and other school supplies can come in later on in February.

It's also that time for families who are looking for <u>Financial Assistance</u> for the 2020-2021 school year to begin applying for aid. Go to **www.factsmgt.com** at a fee of \$35 to apply. It only takes 20-25 minutes of your time and depending on your finances, you could receive anywhere from \$600 to \$1,500 worth of assistance towards your child's tuition next year. Even if you don't get any assistance the first time around, because you applied, you could qualify to receive *St. Paul Parish assistance*.

Let me emphasize this once more, if you are looking for St. Paul Parish assistance, you must apply to www.factsmgt.com first. Most of our families don't even belong to St. Paul Parish so please don't automatically think that they have plenty of money to give out if you do not attend St. Paul Church/Mass there. Families that do attend, get parish assistance. However, as I mentioned previously, if you applied to *factsmgt* and didn't receive any financial aid from them, you now could qualify for St. Paul Parish Aid. Also, if you do belong to another parish, ask that pastor if he can help you out with the tuition for your child. If they don't have a school at that parish, they pretty much should give you something!



With the beginning of the third quarter, the sixth grade Math class is preparing for a Chapter test on the topics of patterns and variables. The test will be administered on Friday, Jan. 24th. In Religion, the sixth grade has finished their first test of the quarter on the Israelites' entry into the Promised Land and their capturing of the city of Jericho by extraordinary means.

Grade 8 Science: This past month in science the students started to prepare for the science fair. The science fair will be on Friday March 20 from 1-2pm at the school. In addition to the science fair the students will be starting a unit on electromagnet spectrum in the month of February. Grade 8 Skills: This past week the students just took their unit 7 vocabulary test. The grade for that test is posted on their Sadler Connect accounts. The unit 8 vocabulary test is scheduled for Thursday February 13, 2020.

Grade 8 Literature: Our class had a great visit to the movie theater to see Little Women. We are currently reading Mark Twain's classic novel, The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn. Our focus has been on realism, defining literary motifs, grammatical rules in various dialects, and race relations in the antebellum south. Grade 8 Social Studies: The relationship between the Northern and Southern states has turned from one of economic comradery to hostility after planters and abolitionists argued over the future of slavery. This week, we saw how the rising tension hit a boiling point at Fort Sumter, thus igniting the Civil War.

Grade7 Literature: We have read a non-fiction book, Puritan Girl/Mohawk Girl, by John Demos, as

a supplement to our unit on the French and Indian War. Our literary focus was on defining cultural differences. **Grade 7 Social Studies**: When tension between the French and the British is quelled by the Proclamation of 1763, American Colonists feel constrained by the rule in Britain. Next, we are going to look at the relationship between People and Government, as we see the start of the Revolutionary War.

Grade 6 Literature: We are reading The Runaway King, by Jennifer Neilson. Students should have started working on their book reports! Grade 6 Social Studies: We have been exploring Ancient China. We have learned about the geography, ancient forms of government, major achievements, arts, and culture of Ancient China.
