

HOLY WEEK

Getting the Most Out of Lent

Our Lady of the Visitation Catholic Church

The Most Important, Most Holy, and Most Transformative Week of the entire year is upon us...Holy Week!

All of Jesus' actions while He was here on this earth are important for us to reflect on, but this last week of His life should change the way we view the world, the way we view God, and the way we view ourselves.

Jesus enters as a celebrity into Jerusalem to shouts and cheers and songs from the crowds...however, it will not be long before those same crowds are crying out, "Crucify Him! Crucify Him!!"



On Holy Thursday evening, Jesus deeply desired to eat the Jewish Passover meal with His apostles, however, Jesus stops the normal flow of that ancient Jewish ritual and establishes a new ritual and new covenant meal with his 12 apostles—the Catholic Mass!!


On Good Friday, Jesus suffers both physically in a brutal and humiliating way through scourging, the crown of thorns, carrying the cross, and crucifixion itself, but also, he suffers spiritually for our sins deep within His heart and soul. We can't begin to imagine this burden and the love it takes to freely choose to suffer for someone in this way (and Jesus, God become man does this for the entire world...and for you in a very specific and particular way—because He loves you).

On Holy Saturday, the world is silent. Jesus appears simply dead in the tomb. All the main tabernacles in Catholic Churches around the world are empty (the Blessed Sacrament is safely kept in reserved tabernacles on this day). However, Jesus is active. He is conquering sin and death, and He is preparing the world for the greatest event we could ever fathom.

On the Easter Vigil Night, every Catholic Church around the world starts in the pitch black darkness of night (to symbolize the brokenness of the world and the silence of Jesus in the tomb), but then the holy fire is lit, it is blessed, the people follow the flame into the Church as hope spreads with the candle light around the church building and into the hearts of mankind. Hundreds of candles light up the church building, as the ancient Exultet hymn is chanted by the priest or deacon. Jesus has risen from the dead! The gates of heaven are open. The invitation is given to the entire world—come follow me. Be my disciple. Repent and believe in the Gospel—in the good news! Receive the Holy Spirit! And Go forth to the ends of the earth! Live & love in Christ & for Christ!



Please consider coming to our many liturgies, prayer services, Masses, and events throughout this week if you can according to your schedule. Christ wants to surprise you with His love, mercy, presence, and grace. If you show up, and open your heart, Jesus is never outdone in generosity. God Bless you. - Fr. Ben Dunkelberger



Today is Palm Sunday. Mass began with a Gospel reading that tells us about Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem. Then we read the entire passion, beginning with the Last Supper.

Jesus makes the ultimate sacrifice. He gives his very life for us. He is willing to do the hardest thing someone could do. Jesus does what God the Father wants him to do. We call this kind of love self-giving love.

Simon and Joseph act out of self-giving love. Simon is pressed by the Roman soldiers to help Jesus carry his cross. Simon joins Jesus in his struggle and walks with him.

After Jesus died, a man named Joseph asks Pilot for Jesus' body. With help of some women, Joseph prepares Jesus' body for burial and places him in a tomb.
