

The Rector writes

Dear Friends

On Facebook recently, I spotted one of those posts about what it was like back in the, in this case, fifties; specifically, food. Amongst its witticisms were statements like "...a Big Mac was what we wore when it was raining," and, "...a takeaway was something to do in arithmetic." What made me think, however, was, "...healthy foods were anything edible." I thought about the piece of fish Jesus had after his resurrection - which was highly unlikely to have passed any hygiene standards today. His nourishment was provided by a piece of broiled leftovers. It's not just that technically his body needed the protein, it's that no lesser a person than the Messiah was perfectly content with what was available.

There are estimates that a third of the world's produced food never gets eaten. (Are you aware of the Bridgnorth Foodbank, you can drop items off at St Mary's church) So, it would seem that despite the constant stream of "perfectly" shaped and sized (and out of season) food, it's not appreciated by a significant number of consumers anyway. Shameful that the millions of people in the world who would appreciate it, the starving or malnourished? - have to go without, while we don't even give a second thought to what we're throwing away.

At least at harvest festival there is a moment to consider and give thanks for what we have and the successful farming of land, sea and waterway which supplies it. We are holding our Harvest Festivals this year on September 29th at 10.30am in St Andrew's Quatt followed by lunch in the village hall and on October 20th at 10.30am in St Mary's, Alveley followed by lunch in the church.

Every culture in every age seems to have regularly given time to be thankful and respectful of what we have to sustain us. In our society now, though, the absence of saying grace by those sharing a meal at dinner tables - indeed, the absence of tables! - means that a harvest festival once a year might be the only time we stop to think how blessed we are to have been born into a society that rarely sees starvation by lack of provisions. My personal overview of history is that decadence becomes the terminal cancer of society when we lose sight of gratitude. Perhaps at this year's harvest thanksgiving we can start turning that around. Naturally, I'm going to suggest that we thank God for what we have; even if you can't bring yourself to do that, at least be thankful. It will be a start.

Claude Monet, the French Impressionist painter, spent many years in his later life recreating his own garden in Giverny - his paintings becoming more abstract (and wonderful!) as his eyesight faded. Monet offered these paintings, 'Water Lilies', to the French State on the day following the Armistice on 11th November 1918, as a symbol of peace. They have been on display in Paris at l'Orangerie in the Jardin des Tuileries since 1927. Throughout the summer in Paris the Olympic flame cauldron can be seen in the Jardin des Tuileries so visiting Monet's painted panels in the elliptical gallery rooms will have to wait until the autumn.

SEVERN VALLEY COUNTRY PARK

Once again our wildflower meadows have been beautiful with a wide range of flowers in bloom. The common spotted orchids were out in their hundreds again and our bee orchids appeared outside the visitor centre this year. We are never sure where they will show up!

Towards the middle of July, after the seeds have dropped the meadows are mowed. We work with Neville Taylor at Little London Farm to help with the traditional hay meadow management. The majority of the hay is baled and used as animal feed during the winter months.

We do keep some of the hay and it is taken to other local sites to help nurture wildflower growth. We have previously taken hay to our site at Stanmore just outside Bridgnorth. This year, the hay has gone further afield as we have worked with both Wyre Forest District Council and National Trust.

We have been a donor site for five of the Wyre Forest locations. These are Blakemarsh Nature Reserve, Spennells Valley Nature Reserve, Stourvale Gateway Nature Reserve, Stourport Riverside Meadows and Britannia Gardens Conservation Area. The Wyre Forest Rangers and their volunteers collected green hay from us as well as Wrens Nest National Nature Reserve to spread on pre-prepared areas of their reserves.

We are working with National Trust Dudmaston in a similar way. They have a number of meadows which border the river and they are working with one of their tenant farmers to restore a species rich floodplain meadow. It's lovely that the park can help with the growth of other wildflower meadows in this way.

September sees the start of a new season for our Four Seasons Calendar Competition. The judges will select the winners of 'Summer' on 8th September and a selection of photographs entered will be on display in the visitor centre. The competition continues with Autumn. Each season visitors will be able to submit 2 photographs. For Autumn we are looking for photographs taken between 1st September and 30th November. Please email svcpcalendarcomp@gmail.com for an entry form which also has the terms and conditions. Photographers whose photograph/s are selected for the calendar will receive a copy of the calendar.

SUSTAINABLE BRIDGNORTH

Sustainable Bridgnorth's AGM will take place on 12th Sept at 7.30pm. We have had a change of venue and will now be holding the event at the Platform 10 Café, 10 Bank Street, Bridgnorth (rear of Our Green Shop). At the last meeting, we were short of nominations for the Chair and Vice-Chair roles and other key roles I'm now standing down from including promotion, social media, correspondence, representative on SAS, Refill etc. We have candidates for Meetings Secretary, Membership Secretary and Treasurer. You don't have to be able to attend meetings to support the group, e.g. with social media and promotion. On the understanding that we may not get a last-minute stampede of volunteers, we are in discussions with Our Green Shop about the two groups working more closely together, and potentially sharing a committee or officers in the future.

Following the AGM part of the meeting, there will be a set of three speakers that each run/are involved in Repair Cafés presenting to attendees. Repair Cafés are community-based initiatives where people come together to repair various items, such as electronics, clothing, furniture, and appliances, instead of discarding them. Functions:

- 1. Repair Assistance: Volunteers with repair skills help attendees fix their broken items.
- 2. Workshops: Some Repair Cafés offer workshops to teach repair skills and techniques.
- 3. Community Building: They serve as a gathering place for community members to connect and share knowledge.
- 4. Resource Sharing: Tools and materials are often provided for use during the repair sessions.

Benefits:

- 1. Waste Reduction: By repairing items, Repair Cafés help to reduce waste and promote a culture of reuse.
- 2. Cost Savings: Participants can save by fixing items instead of buying new ones.
- 3. Skill Development: Attendees can learn valuable repair skills, fostering a sense of empowerment.
- 4. Environmental Awareness: Repair Cafés raise awareness about sustainability and the importance of reducing consumption.

Everybody is welcome, and it is free entry with a ticket booked via Eventbrite, so we can track numbers (search: Eventbrite Sustainable Bridgnorth Repair Café), or get in touch if you have any problems/queries). The venue will have a limit on attendees due to its size, but if there are sufficient numbers, Platform 10 will sell refreshments.

CAN PIGEONS READ?

If the National Gallery in London were to buy an expensive painting and then hide it away in a darkened room with difficult and limited access you might be a little puzzled to put it mildly. Well, something similar has been happening in churches all over England for centuries. When bells were first cast for churches in the early middle ages they were just the basic shape but as casting techniques improved so did the sound and decorations started to be added along with inscriptions. These inscriptions are beautifully cast and are the height of the bell founders' craft but then the bells are hoisted into a dark and dirty belfry to be unseen other than by the steeple keeper or pigeons. As if this wasn't enough many of these inscriptions are in Latin which very few can read. This, however, did not stop Tony Head's grandfather. He was a church warden at St Leonard's in Bridgnorth and took it upon himself to visit and record the inscriptions on all the bells in the Bridgnorth District. His notes have helped with this article. Before installation and being covered in cobwebs and bird droppings bells would often be displayed on the floor of the church and anyone could inspect them. They are normally blessed and occasionally consecrated.

During the 18th century bells made by the Rudhall foundry in Gloucester were considered to be the Rolls-Royce of their day. You will be pleased to note that the bells in St Mary's are Rudhalls and although I may be accused of bias they are one of the best peals in the district. The inscriptions on our bells are as follows. 1. PEACE AND GOOD NEIGHBOURHOOD. The lighter and therefore the highest note bell is always called the Treble. 2. FEAR GOD AND HONOUR THE KING. In 1779 this was George the 3rd, the first king of England to use English as his first language. 3. PROSPERITY TO THIS PARISH. Obviously! 4. THOS RUDHALL GLOUCESTER FOUNDER. Thomas Rudhall was from a family of bell founders who between 1684 and 1835 cast more than 5000 bells. 5. GEORGE NECHEL MINISTER. It is fairly unusual to have the vicar or rector's name on a bell indicating he was well loved or gave money for the bell or probably both! 6. Wm CROW. STEPHEN CRESSWELL CHURCH WARDENS. This is not unusual. Church wardens were normally wealthy men. William Crow was a farmer and paper mill owner and Stephen Cresswell a farmer. Interestingly his great great great-great granddaughter is one of our current bellringers. A similar bell today would cost around £23,000. All the bells are inscribed 1779 which is also the year the Ironbridge in Telford was cast. The heaviest bell which would have the lowest note is always called the Tenor. The Tenor at Upper Arley (cast 1753) is inscribed TO THE CHURCH THE LIVING CALL. AND TO THE GRAVE I SUMMON ALL. It is the Tenor that is tolled at a funeral. One blow for every year of a person's life. Another Tenor says I SOUND TO BID THE SICK REPENT. IN HOPE OF LIFE WHEN BREATH IS SPENT. Yet another tells you to listen to the sermon. I SWEETLY TOLLING MEN DO CALL. TO TASTE OF MEATS TO FEED THE SOUL.

The employed were not ignored. I RING AT SIX TO LET MEN KNOW. WHEN TO AND FROM THEIR WORK TO GO. The bell founders liked to brag. MY SOUND IS GOOD MY

SHAPE IS NEAT. SOMEBODY MADE ME ALL COMPLEAT. Spelling was a little fluid back then! And after a re-casting more bragging. BADGEWORTH RINGERS THEY WERE MAD. BECAUSE RIGBE MADE ME BAD. BUT ABEL RUDHALL AS YOU SEE. HAS MADE ME BETTER THAN RIGBE. In 1701 some bells were re-cast to make a lighter ring. JOHN GILBERD DID CONTRIVE. TO CAST FROM FOUR THIS PEAL OF FIVE. One of the St Leonard's bells says UP SEVERN AND DOWN MORFE. SAY THE BELLS OF BRIDGNORTH. When a bell sounds it is said to "speak" so this inscription means they could be heard both north and south of the town. (The Morfe forest stretched to Alveley). At Ewell in Surrey 1767. OUR VOICES SHALL WITH JOY-FUL SOUND. MAKE HILLS AND VALLEYS ECHO ROUND. And generous or not so generous donors get a mention. Two church wardens from Aldbourne in Wiltshire had a bell cast in 1787. MUSIC AND SINGING WE LIKE SO WELL. AND FOR THAT REASON WE GAVE THIS BELL. And in 1700. ALL YOU OF BATH THAT HERE ME SOUND. THANK LADY HOPTONS HUNDRED POUND. (About £21,000 in today's money). In 1827. SQUIRE ARUNDEL THE GREAT MY WHOLE EXPENSE DID RAISE. NOR SHALL OUR TONGUES ABATE TO CELEBRATE HIS PRAISE. In a church in Glastonbury in 1776 the Treble was inscribed PUBLIC SUBSCRIPTION GAVE US BIRTH. NOW OUR DEAR TONES SHALL JOIN IN MIRTH. But the second was inscribed OUR TONES WOULD ALL HAVE BEEN MUCH DEEPER. IF CONTRIBUTIONS HAD BEEN GREATER. And finally, a bell in Sherbourne Abbey used exclusively as a fire alarm, cast in 1652 said LORD QUENCH THIS FURIOUS FLAME. ARISE, RUN, HELP, PUT OUT THE SAME. Another fire bell said. WHEN BACKWARDS RUNG WE TELL OF FIRE. THINK HOW THE WORLD SHALL THUS EXPIRE. Bells are normally rung with the lightest bell first unless we change the order to get different combinations. These are " called changes" or where the ringers memorise the changes which are called "methods" but I'll save that for another time.

Those who look after our land, cultivate it and provide food for our tables are remembered and thanked. We may moan about the price of vegetables, for example, but given weather conditions some years it is a marvel that our farmers and their staff manage to produce anything at all! This year's weather must have been particularly difficult for them with seemingly non-stop rain for weeks on end and odd patches of scorching weather. How do you plan your ground preparation, planting and harvesting under such conditions?

I am reminded of the old story of the man who begged a farmer to let him use a corner of a field that the plough didn't reach. It was covered with brambles and thistles and the old man got to work and turned it into an allotment. His peas and beans were growing in neat rows when the local vicar passed by. The reverend gentleman leaned on the gate, greeted the old man and said: 'Well, George, you and the Almighty have made a good job of that, haven't you?' George looked at the vicar and said: 'You should have seen it when the Almighty had it to himself.' Ian


