## Fourth Grade News

Happy Spring! Our first year of our looping experience has been exciting and eventful. The class is finishing up their class books and will be sending them out to the publishing company
next week. Looking forward to reading their published stories. In

Social Studies, we've just begun a unit on the Midwest, the class is reading and researching landforms, animal, and plant life in the Midwest and eventually how it was settled. We've just finished our lessons on the South and they'll be presenting their Native American research papers on tribes in the Southern regions during the time of early settlement.
After completing Harry Potter, we've taken a break from the wizarding world and are into Maniac Magee. The class is very invested in our chapter books and love reading and discussing the books together as well as working on writing assignments that deal with the themes and characters of the book. In the Spring, after our performance of Lion King on May 17th, we'll be planning an end of the year field trip. More information to follow once it's booked.

## Fifth Grade News

Grade 5 students have been working hard on creating their own books to be published by Student Treasures Publishing. Each student chose a topic, near and dear to his/her heart, and researched seven separate items about that topic. They are very proud of the work they have done so far.
The students have been enjoying our read-a-loud book A Single Shard and have learned a bit about creating pottery. This information will come in handy when we visit Sturbridge Village, in June, and attend a session on pottery making in the New England Colonies.
In math, we have been working on adding and subtracting fractions, mixed numbers and whole numbers. We will next tackle multiplication and division of these same kinds of numbers.
During this Lenten season, we have been participating in our own "March Madness Bracket" which is focused on saints. This Lent Bracket teaches students about two different saints each day and the students vote on who
they believe should advance in the brackets. Let's just say, Mrs. Vargas' Bracket was busted by day four.

## Sixth Grade News

Social Studies: Students spent the week learning about Athens and Sparta, two Greek city-states with many differences. Sparta placed an enormous amount of emphasis on an individual's duty to the city-state, and maintaining military strength, whereas Athens placed emphasis on art and literature. Their essay this week will ask them to compare the two, and discuss whether they have more similarities or more differences. Ask your child to explain how the attitude of the people of Athens led to their downfall?
Next week, students will work on Chapter 6 Section 4: The Spread of Greek Culture. To prepare for this section, ask your child who their heroes are? Are there people living today or in the past whom they admire? Why are they your child's heroes? What can your child do to become more like them? The essential questions for this section are: What role did the conquests of Alexander the Great play in spreading Greek culture? What advances in science did the Greeks make after Alexander's death? The key terms of this section are: barbarian, assassinate, Hellenistic. The key people and places are: King Phillip, Macedonia, Alexander the Great, Alexandria, Euclid, Archimedes.
Terms to review are: peninsula, epic, acropolis, city-state, aristocrat, tyrant, democracy, tribute, immortal, philosopher, tragedy, agora. Key people and places to review are: Sparta, Persia, Marathon, Athens, Pericles, Parthenon, Socrates, Homer, Solon, Troy
Literature: Students have completed the entire Ascendance Trilogy by Jennifer Nielsen. Ask your child about their favorite character, and if they have a preference for one of the three
books over the others. Next, we will begin an exciting Independent Reading Unit, in which students will learn and review skills in choosing a book to read on their own from the library. We will be taking a walking field trip to the William Hall Library next week to select books. Students will be expected to report on their book selections at the end of the unit. Vocab- In Vocabulary, the students are working on unit 11 and will be having their unit test before vacation. As previously mentioned you can follow your students progress in Vocabulary by signing into their Sadlier account.
Science- Congratulations to all the students for all the hard work they put into their science fair projects! The students have started a unit on owls. In this unit, they will learn about different types of owls, the owl's food web, how owls hunt, and about owl pellets. Before we go on break, the students will be dissecting owl pellets.
Math-Currently, the sixth grade Math class is finishing a section demonstrating the two methods of subtracting mixed numbers and will be beginning to use them in equations. In their Religion class, they are learning about the effect that Israel's division into two kingdoms negatively impacted their relationship with God.


## Seventh Grade News

Vocab-In Vocabulary, the students just took their unit 10 test. The
students will be starting Unit 11 this week. As previously mentioned you can follow your students progress in Vocabulary by signing into their Sadlier account.
Science- Congratulations to all the students for all the hard work they put into their science fair projects. The students are currently working in groups and learning about different types of water pollution. After learning about water pollution, we will start a unit on nonrenewable energy. Social Studies: Students have been looking at the creation of the Articles of Confederation, and the origins of American Federalism. Special care and attention is being paid to terminology. Ask your child to explain what a government is, what a constitution is, what a republic is, and what the term "bicameral" means. Ask your child what the main goal of the founding fathers was in the creation of an American central government.
Literature: Students have selected books to read and report on in an Independent Reading Unit. The goal of this unit is to support students as they select books that they are interested in reading along the lines of theme, genre, length, and reading level. I want students to enjoy reading and to have necessary skills in selecting books based on their personal preferences. Ask your child what book they have selected, why they selected it, and how they plan on reporting on it.
Math-The seventh grade math class has been performing the four basic operations with fractions and their usage in real world situations. In Religion, the seventh graders have started a chapter explaining Jesus' s role as Savior and its' relationship to salvation history.

## Eighth Grade News

Social Studies: We have moved from the frontier to the big cities! The theme of this unit is Industrialization, Urbanization, and Immigration specifically, how these themes are
interdependent on one another.
Students did an activity this week to demonstrate how factories contributed to immigration and urbanization - the formation of cities. Ask your child what happens when a developer builds a factory in the early 1900's. Students this week are looking specifically of the challenges of the immigrants coming into a newly urbanized and industrialized United States, such as a voyage in steerage, screenings at Ellis Island, and dangerous work in the factories. As we enter the age of photography and modern reporting, students have had access to a wide array of primary sources to aid in their understanding. Students used newspaper articles reporting on the sinking of the Titanic, as well as primary sources related to the Triangle Shirtwaist Factory Fire. Ask your child about the challenges immigrants faced. Ask your child to compare the challenges of frontier life with the challenges of city life.
Literature: Students continue to be mature readers of Mark Twain's The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn, in which themes of racism, responsibility, adolescence, nature, society, and civil disobedience abound. Ask your child how Huck Finn has changed over the course of his travels so far. Ask your child about Huck Finn's attitude towards the King and the Duke, versus his attitude towards Jim. Ask your child about why Jim feels guilty about an interaction with his daughter. Vocab-In Vocabulary, the students took their unit 10 test last week. The students will be starting Unit 11 this week and will have their unit 11 test before the break. As previously mentioned you can follow your students progress in Vocabulary by signing into their Sadlier account. Science- Congratulations to all the students for all the hard work they put into their science fair projects. This month the eighth graders will be doing an egg drop project. From this project, the students will learn about motion,
force, gravity, acceleration, and the conservation of energy.
Math- A review of Rational numbers has been the focus for the eighth grade Math class as they begin their study of Formulas and the Pythagorean Theorem.
Religion- In Religion, the class is finishing one of the saddest period in its' history. The Crusades, The corruption within the Church, and the violence of the Spanish Inquisition will lead many people to questioning their faith. However, the papacy of Pope Gregory VII and Pope Innocent III will be instrumental in reforming the Church and its' practices.

Just a few reminders: Middle School Students are required to complete Community Services Hours. These hours are to be completed by May 1st and contribute to their final grade in Religion. The final payment of the eighth grade Graduation fee of $\$ 150.00$ is due on Friday. March 28th.
