

Parish Membership: Every family and single adult to be considered active members of St. Bartholomew's Parish must be properly registered in the parish, receiving and regularly using the parish weekly donation envelopes. Only in this way can the parish issue documents attesting to parish membership and Catholic practice, e.g. a letter to be a Godparent or Sponsor. New parishioners are requested to visit the parish office.

**Sick & Shut-ins**: The priests are available to administer the Sacraments to those who are unable to come to Church. The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is part of the healing ministry of the Church, and should be received early in an illness or before a serious operation.

**Baptisms**: Please call the parish office to make arrangements.

**Marriages**: In order to provide sufficient time for the Marriage Preparation Course, please call the parish office and ask to speak with the pastor at least six months in advance of the wedding.

Parish Council: Meets on Wednesday evening quarterly.

**Holy Name Society**: Meets on the Monday evening after the second Sunday of the month. President, Joseph Chimenti

**Rosary Altar Society**: Meets on the Monday evening after the first Sunday of the month.

#### "Faith That Moves Mountains Begins With Trust"



Brothers and sisters, today's readings remind us that faith is not about having all the answers but about learning to trust God in every circumstance. The prophet Habakkuk looks around and sees violence and destruction, and he cries out, "How long, O Lord?" God's response is simple yet profound: "The vision still has its time; if it delays, wait for it, it will surely come." Faith begins by waiting on God's promises with trust, even when life feels uncertain.

St. Paul, writing to Timothy, strengthens this call. He tells him to "stir into flame the gift of God" and reminds him that the Spirit is not one of fear but of "power, love, and self-control." Faith is not passive; it requires courage and perseverance. To live by faith means to guard the treasure of the Gospel, to witness with love, and to endure hardship with confidence in God's strength.

In the Gospel, the apostles ask, "Lord, increase our faith." Jesus tells them that even faith as small as a mustard seed can uproot trees and plant them in the sea. True faith is not measured by size but by its depth of trust. And Jesus adds that faith is shown in humble service. Like servants who do their duty without seeking reward, we are called to live our faith by serving others, not for applause, but simply because we belong to the Lord.



So where does this leave us? Faith that moves mountains begins with trust—trust that God's vision will come, trust that His Spirit gives us courage, and trust that serving Him in love is enough. This week, let us ask not just for "more faith," but for a faith that trusts, perseveres, and serves. Even a mustard seed of such faith can transform our lives and the world around us.


#### CATHOLIC TRIVIA – JUST FOR FUN

#### Be Careful What You Wish For

You've probably heard the phrase "Be careful what you wish for." In my experience, it's not often utilized with a lot of charity. You usually hear it said as a warning. The unspoken sentiment behind it is this: You're not as strong as you think you are.

As Christians we shouldn't be surprised to look ourselves in the mirror and own that reality. We are not as strong as we may think. We are time and time again shocked and dismayed by our own weaknesses, our own fears, our own shortcomings.

Should we be careful what we wish for? The apostles asked Jesus to increase their faith, and He told them it would take work. It would take suffering. It would take patience. But He didn't say it was impossible.

As everyday stewards, we need to continue wishing recklessly. Ask God for anything and everything, come to Him with all your needs. Beg Him for grace without limit.

When we hear God's voice, it does not always say what we want to hear. But it always speaks the perfect truth. If it tells us of a hardship that we think we cannot bear, let us take solace in the knowledge that we are the stewards — not the landlord. LPI

#### EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP - RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS How Much Is Enough?

During a conversation about good stewardship of money and time, my daughter shared that sometimes doing the best thing was so hard for her to do. It wasn't always a matter of right and wrong, black and white, but a matter of better and best. I began to reflect on the truth of her statement. When confronted with a decision, we can sometimes be given a choice of good, better, and best. We fool ourselves into believing that the good choice is not a bad one, so it must be enough. However, we have essentially placed a limit on our generosity or commitment with our false sense of good stewardship.

Jesus calls us in different ways every day. Sometimes the cost to us is clear. Yet sometimes there is no clear metric. When called to love, how much love is enough? When someone needs our time, how many hours is enough? When a small gift will bring about a positive outcome, what could a larger gift accomplish?

Don't be fooled by Jesus' teaching of the mustard seed. He was speaking to those who were caught up in concerns of status, uncertainty of heart, and lack of true faith. Jesus taught with parables and then demonstrated true faith and generosity by his crucifixion. Perhaps the mustard seed of faith allows us to move mountains and trees so that we may see through to the horizon of the cross. In the cross, we find the real metric of love and generosity that is for all who follow Him.
