We plan to notify winners and have yard signs posted by December 18th. Decorate your house for the holidays and you may be a winner.



HISTORY OF THANKSGIVING TRADITIONS

People follow traditions because "that's the way it's always been done," but every custom started somewhere. Why turkey? What's up with the wishbone? And who started the parade?

Eating turkey. Turkey was not the star of the show at the first feast in 1621; that didn't happen until the mid-1800s. Magazine editor Sarah Josepha Hale read about the 1621 feast and used it as a model for an annual holiday dinner. She published recipes for turkey, stuffing and pumpkin pie, launching traditions that had nothing to do with the colonists. Today, nearly 88% of Americans eat turkey on Thanksgiving.

The Macy's Parade. In the early 1900s, people began associating Thanksgiving with the holiday shopping season. To capitalize on this, Macy's announced it would treat New York to a special event in 1924—the first Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade. Soon after, Macy's partnered with NBC to broadcast the parade so people around the country could tune in.

Breaking the wishbone. This tradition dates back to ancient Roman times, when Etruscans fought over chicken and hen bones, which they believed would bring good fortune. The English inherited this tradition and introduced it to the New World. When they discovered the land was rampant with wild turkeys, they applied the custom to that bird instead.

Presidential turkey pardon. Every year, the President frees one lucky turkey—this fairly recent tradition began with President George H.W. Bush. He gave the first official pardon to a turkey in 1989. The survivor lived out its days at a Virginia petting zoo.

HOLIDAY SAFETY TIPS

Cars loaded with gifts and left in parking lots can become easy targets for thieves, so remember to lock your vehicle, even when you expect to be in and out of a store quickly. Keep packages in your trunk and out of sight.

Park your car in a well-lit, heavily traveled area, and never leave the keys in your vehicle. Use only Christmas tree lights that have the "UL" tag attached to it. This means that the lights have been tested by the Underwriters Laboratories and are safe.

However, before you put the lights on the tree, (new or old), check them for broken or cracked sockets, broken or exposed wire and/or any loose connections. If any one of the problems is present, throw the light set away. Damaged lights can shock a person or start a fire. If you use an extension cord, use no more than 3 sets of lights attached to it.

HOW TO ORGANIZE YOUR TRAVEL PLANS



Traveling soon? Don't just rely on Post-it notes and your email inbox. Thanks to all the travel apps and websites that have popped up in recent years, organizing your travel plans has never been easier.

Here are a few of the most popular:

For finding airfare: Google Flights, Kayak and SkyScanner help you draw a quick baseline for the cost of flights. They also suggest alternative days to travel if you can be flexible on your travel dates to save a little money.

For researching hotels: The professional photos a hotel posts on its website aren't always reflective of the truth. TripAdvisor offers thousands of consumer reviews along with photos that have been uploaded by travelers rather than advertising professionals. If you do arrive at a hotel and don't like it, apps HotelTonight and Roomer can help you find a suitable (and likely discounted) alternative there on the spot.

For keeping track of your details: Flight times, your hotel's address, rental car info, confirmation numbers—so many numbers you want at your fingertips when traveling. TripIt and TripCase are two apps that strip out unnecessary information and put what you need to know from confirmation emails into a well-ordered itinerary. They're both free, but you can pay \$49 annually for a more robust TripIt Pro with extra features like notifications of gate changes and alerts when a better seat becomes available.

For road trips: iExit tells you what services are where at various U.S. highway exits so you can decide whether to wait or turn off now. Roadtrippers finds all the great American roadside attractions as well as restaurants and other services that are close. And GasBuddy compares gas prices of all the nearest stations.
