




A while back I was asked why didn't I "wash" my hands prior to serving the bread at the altar like Rev. Elizabeth does. Frankly I was not sure because that was not in our Deacon training curriculum. So I asked Rev. Elizabeth and she provided me with this

information. She is not washing away germs over the Lavabo (the small silver bowl used to catch the water when poured over her hands) prior to communion she is preparing her heart for the consecration. It is an outward sign asking God to wash away her iniquity, create in her a clean heart ... she is preparing her heart for the consecration of the bread and wine. As for the germs we let soap, water, and hand sanitizer remove them.

## From Our Rector





The author, Robert Fulghum, tells a story about how when his daughter was little, she would periodically offer him a small, crumpled bag that contained (he later learned) her treasures, bits and pieces of her life's flotsam: pebbles, sea shells, hair ribbons, a marble, a few chocolate kisses. The first time she gave him the bag, he ended up discarding it in the trash along

with the remains of his day's lunch, not realizing the value of what he'd been given. Like most adults, I suspect, he ascertained value primarily based on aesthetics, or monetary value, or usefulness. The items in his daughter's bag fit into none of those categories, and so he threw them away. Later, when he returned home, his daughter asked for her bag back. Her eyes filled with tears when he didn't immediately produce the bag, so afraid was she that he'd lost her special things. Fulghum learned, then, that value didn't derive only from usefulness or beauty, but from the intention of the giver. The crumpled bag of his daughter's treasures became a treasure for him because it came from her, given freely and with love.

At each week's worship, about halfway through the service, the bulletin announces The Offertory. The offertory starts off the second half of the service - Holy Communion, Liturgy of the Table, whatever you'd like to call it - and signals a shift in our attention from encountering God in God's word (in the readings, psalm, sermon, hymns, prayers) to encountering God at God's table. The "encounter" happens not only when we receive the consecrated bread and wine in our hands, but long before, at The Offertory. Our offerings take many different forms: the congregation sings a hymn or the choir leads an anthem in praise of





God; the cruet of wine and plate of bread are carried from the small table by the piano to the altar; the ushers pass the offering plates into which are deposited our checks and cash, and then the plates are brought forward. All of these things represent Us - our breath, our hands (making the bread, creating the wine), our labor, our time, our intellect - and we offer All of Us to God, like the little girl offered her crumpled bag to her dad. The things we offer are not things that God "needs" per se, and they are not things which we're required to give in order to attract God's attention or earn God's love. They are things we give because we can and want to give them. They are things we give in gratitude to the God who first gave them to us. And they are things in which God delights because they are treasures given by the people God adores, and are given freely and with love.

God's gifts and ours meet at the altar table.

participated in everything, some years just a few. But each year I learn and grow, and most importantly, feel God's love more and more.


