

Now when the multitudes saw it, they marveled and glorified God, who had given such power to men.

Forgiving sins and Healing

In the Orthodox Christian tradition, the account of Jesus forgiving sins and healing the paralytic is rich with theological significance. Here's a detailed exploration from an Orthodox perspective:

Orthodox Perspective on Forgiveness of Sins and Healing

Forgiving Sins & Healing

1. The Incarnation and Divine Authority:

- **Jesus as the Incarnate Word**: The Orthodox Church emphasizes the Incarnation, where Jesus, the Son of God, took on human flesh. His ability to forgive sins and heal the sick is a direct manifestation of His divine authority.


5. The Authority of the Church:

In the Orthodox tradition, the story of Jesus forgiving sins and healing the paralytic is a profound testament to His divine authority and the holistic nature of salvation. It underscores the importance of the sacraments, the power of faith and community, and the ongoing ministry of the Church in continuing Christ's work on earth. Through participation in the life of the Church, believers experience the forgiveness and healing that Christ offers, anticipating the fullness of the Kingdom of God.



Matthew 9:2

Significance of Friends and Community

The story of friends bringing the paralytic to Jesus (found in Mark 2:1-12, Matthew 9:1-8, and Luke 5:17-26) is deeply significant and offers profound insights into the importance of community, intercession, and love.



The Story

The story narrates how a group of friends, unable to reach Jesus due to the crowd, lower their paralyzed friend through the roof of the house where Jesus is teaching. Jesus, seeing their faith, forgives the man's sins and heals him, allowing him to walk again.

What do we learn?

- 1. **Intercession and Faith**: The friends' actions demonstrate the power of intercession and communal faith. Their determination and faith play a crucial role in the paralytic's healing. This emphasizes the importance of praying for and supporting one another within the church community.
- 2. **Community and Fellowship**: Orthodox Christianity places a strong emphasis on the communal aspect of faith. The story illustrates how members of the community are responsible for each other's well-being, both spiritually and physically. Caring for one another is a reflection of Christ's love and a manifestation of the Body of Christ at work.
- 3. **Compassion and Love**: The friends' compassion and love for the paralytic reflect the Christian call to love one's neighbor. This selfless act of bringing the paralytic to Jesus underscores the importance of being attentive to the needs of others and acting with love and mercy.
- 4. **Forgiveness and Healing**: Jesus' response to the paralytic shows that spiritual healing (forgiveness of sins) is as important as physical healing. The Orthodox Church teaches that the sacraments, particularly Confession and the Eucharist, are means through which believers receive spiritual healing and grace.
- 5. **Participation in Divine Grace**: By bringing the paralytic to Jesus, the friends facilitate an encounter with divine grace. This demonstrates the role of the faithful in helping others experience God's love and mercy. In Orthodox thought, believers are called to be conduits of God's grace, aiding in the spiritual and physical healing of those around them.


The story of the friends bringing the paralytic to Jesus is a powerful reminder of the essential role of community in the life of faith. It highlights the importance of caring for one another, interceding in prayer, and acting with compassion and love. Through such acts, believers not only support each other but also participate in the divine work of healing and salvation.

Jesus Forgives and Heals a Paralyzed Man (Mark 2: 1-12)

2 A few days later, when Jesus again entered Capernaum, the people heard that he had come home. ² They gathered in such large numbers that there was no room left, not even outside the door, and he preached the word to them. ³ Some men came, bringing to him a paralyzed man, carried by four of them. ⁴ Since they could not get him to Jesus because of the crowd, they made an opening in the roof above Jesus by digging through it and then lowered the mat the man was lying on. ⁵ When Jesus saw their faith, he said to the paralyzed man, "Son, your sins are forgiven."

⁶ Now some teachers of the law were sitting there, thinking to themselves, ⁷ "Why does this fellow talk like that? He's blaspheming! Who can forgive sins but God alone?"

⁸ Immediately Jesus knew in his spirit that this was what they were thinking in their hearts, and he said to them, "Why are you thinking these things? ⁹ Which is easier: to say to this paralyzed man, 'Your sins are forgiven,' or to say, 'Get up, take your mat and walk'? ¹⁰ But I want you to know that the Son of Man has authority on earth to forgive sins." So he said to the man, ¹¹ "I tell you, get up, take your mat and go home." ¹² He got up, took his mat and walked out in full view of them all. This amazed everyone and they praised God, saying, "We have never seen anything like this!"
